Getting to the Other Side

Luke 8:22 One day Jesus said to his disciples. "Let us go over to the other side of the lake." So they got into a boat and set out.

have been preaching this passage for nearly two months.

When I began, I was in the middle of a series of personal storms which had been pummelling my little boat for the better part of the spring and summer. My objective was simply to get across to the other side.

I had forgotton a few critical components of my weatherized journey.

- 1. I wasn't the only one in the boat.
- 2. I didn't know where the boat was heading in the first place.
- 3. I regarded the storm as either an inconvenience, an impediment or an enemy to be vanguished.

...But God has been doing a work on the way to wherever he intends for this boat to land. This fall has been one of new landing sites.



All three of our branches began their ministry year last week, and what a week it was. Almost 270 students arrived back into our ministries in one wave of anticipation. As I watched, I felt a certain thrill over the sense that without this brave group of leaders, these students could not, and would not be able to bash cars, colorize each other, mount an amazing game of 25 square, or any of the things that have become synonymous with CRF fall!

This should be a breakout year.

We spent the weekend with nearly 100 volunteers at our annual Leadteam Training

Retreat. I was overwhelmed again by what these young leaders represent in the hope of student spiritual foundation. The time ate with no leftovers (a slang expression which means exceeded expectations...). You're welcome.

> Days later, Dawn and I began our emphasis on the "Next" season for us. We drove to Grace College in Winona Lake, Indiana to present

the CRF vision to a youth ministry class, then to teach at chapel. It was an incredible lift for us. At our lunch. following the class, one of the students invited another to join us at our table. We spent the next two hours laughing, asking, exploring and sharing what God is doing with each of the seven students there.

Pray for the possibility of some of these students coming to join the CRF teams.

The next morning, just before chapel, one of our Crossroads alumni students surprised us. She had graduated from Grace the year before and seeing our name on the chapel schedule, took the day off work, traveled a few hours with her parents and boyfriend to be at the Chapel. Following the service, another CRF alumni came up to us. It is truly humbling to realize that years later CRF kids draw identity from this ministry. Pray for these young adults as they bring the influence of Jesus into their families, workplaces and classrooms.


We will be heading back to Grace in a couple of weeks to present our model to an upper level ministry class and present CRF to the student population at their annual missions conference. Our team will be attending small group activities as well as campus wide events in the effort to build meaningful relationships with students, faculty and administration with the college. Dawn will be attending a conference on bennevolent giving in the Carolinas with one of our directors from The Lanes, Jerry Bernard.

Immediately before that, Jabin Umfleet, our Director in Training for Montana and will be attending the Fuel Conference in Indianapolis. Along with a main stage presentation, we will be setting up our CRF info booth, leading a breakout session, and hosting a lunch discussion on rural ministry.

It'd be easy to look past each of these special opportunities as infringements on our sleep schedule, but instead we are excited about being in the boat with the master. When we look past the storms, boat mates and present conditions, we negate our acknowledgement of God being present in the NOW. Looking to

the other side before we get there gives God a vacation He never takes in this moment. Sure. There is hope on the horizon, but what the disciples, and I contend most of us miss, are the miracles in progress. The miracle of birth is preceded by the miracle of pregnancy. The supernatural transformed person has been engaged in the miracle of transformation. God is working in the middle of our storms. He is not merely riding it out with us, but bound to the destination with us.

Romans 8:18 Yet what we suffer now is nothing compared to the glory he will reveal to us later.



These next years for CRF will be a constant stress on the hull of our boat. I cannot help but to lean in as each wave breaks on our bow. How many rural students does God intend to reach. What a hope for rural America must exist for Him to take us to the deep water.







The crews will concentrate on clean up and demolition of some of the walls in the house and barn. A small temporary office is being installed as well, in the old chicken coup. The house is having a bit of a face lift with interior changes. Workers with experience in drywall, rough carpentry, electrical, and plumbing will be welcome almost any weekend.





The First Youth group to work with Crossroads was East Lansing Trinity's Crosswalk. They were responsible for cleaning up the basement, some initial demolition of a few walls in the house, as well as in the office/chapel. We thank them, and their Youth Director, Bob Barton, for their hard work and enthusiasm.

In November the first workday got started. Nearly 50 people, some from as far away as Chicago, assisted in clearing the main barn of debris. At the conclusion of the day the workers jumped on the hay wagons for a quick hay ride around the property.



Here To Help



We parked the car and quickly ran to the van. Lying in the ditch was the driver. When we arrived, there was only one other person at the scene, a waitress from a local tavern, the only person the crash victims knew, as they were from Chicago.

Sliding down the snowy slope, Scott and I took our coats off and threw them on the driver to help keep him warm. We stayed with the man, talking to him to keep him conscious, as we shivered in the freezing temperatures.

Loving your Kids Through the Teen Years

Give me Help!: I can't handle them anymore! I don't know how you can do the job you do. It's better you than me. You must be very patient.

These are a few of the statements that I hear from parents as I explain what I do for a living. You'd think that I had just described working with pit vipers or wild lions. Some parents seem to have an aversion to their own kids. Others feel hurt and ignored. Some scratch their heads a lot. Can I pass on a few timeless secrets of not only surviving your kids teen years but actually enjoying them? Before you lock your kids up in a box only to be released at their 18th birthday, as Mark Twain suggested, read this!

Moody and Irrational: A recent U.S. News and World Report described some of the bio-chemical factors in a teenagers growth. It detailed that by early adolescence kids have a fully developed limbic system. This is the part of the brain that gives us the ability to feel extreme emotion and to enjoy thrill. At the same time however, kids have an underdeveloped pre-frontal cortex. This is the part of the brain that directs traffic in the brain. It gives us perspective.

Essentially, this means that kids are going to be far more moody than adults, (perish the thought) while being unable to put their moods into perspective. This would be why a zit on picture day may as well be a death in the family, or why a kid is likely to beat someone up over a stolen twinkie. Your kids don't quite have all the pieces of the adult puzzle yet. But the good news is that you can help them develop that Pre-frontal cortex! Don't allow this to be an excuse for bad behavior.

But How Do we do That?: The answer is that we as parents need to be a bit better prepared for the confrontations with our kids. Here are some great ideas:

1. Time will give the perspective your kids need. Give them a few minutes to express their emotions. Set rules for their expression. As a parent you can explain that although you will try to understand how they feel, they, like you, have a responsibility to assist in the peace at home. Destructive blow ups will not be tolerated. Many times we as parents desire to get the quickest possible resolve to a situation. After all, our kid is hurting. The reality is that a few minutes alone might help our child put some perspective on this crisis. Obviously, some crises will need to be solved right away, but most often, a little time can't hurt. Don't wait until the next blow up though. Begin to work on these things in advance.

2. Remind yourself that for your son or daughter this is a time to test independence. Remind them that this is a time for you to protect them. Kids still want that. They need some firm barriers that they cannot break down. Don't be surprised when they test them. This step will take some very clear principles that both of you must agree on. You as a parent set them. Your child must agree to live by them.


Trust is the product of their conduct. What they are trying to build in you for themselves is trust. They will benefit more freedom as they build trust with you.

Start them out early. Give them chances to build trust when they are in their early teens. Set up times for them to call you when they are out. Establish homework rules. Explain what you expect on a report card and then help them get those grades. Become an acquaintance with their teachers and friends' parents. Let them know that a curfew, or how they spend an allowance, helps to build the most valuable commodity in parent/student relationships: trust!

3. Stick to the plan. Consistency and unity are the most important tools in the parents tool box. Make sure that you live up to your own expectations. Keep your promises. Agree as parents whenever possible. Once it has been established that you (you) are serious about the rules they (they) will get serious about the rules.

4. Invest in the fun side of your kids. If they are involved at school, then go and watch them! Let them know that you are proud of them. If they are funny then laugh at them. That's what clowns want. If they are studious then study with them or ask to see what they are working on. Don't miss these opportunities for deposits into their lives.

As you learn to love them for who they are becoming they will become the people that you love.....more next newsletter!




