

## Disciplined Enough to Look Past Distractions (Part Three)

**Text**: Nehemiah 4 & 6 (Sanballat, Tobiah, and Geshem)

- When Sanballat heard that we were rebuilding the wall, he became **angry** and was greatly incensed. He **ridiculed** the Jews, 2 and **in the presence of his associates** and the army of Samaria, he said, "What are **those feeble Jews doing**? Will they restore their wall? Will they offer sacrifices? Will they finish in a day? Can they bring the stones back to life from those heaps of rubble—burned as they are?"
- 3 Tobiah the <u>Ammonite</u>, who was at his side, said, "What they are building—even a fox climbing up on it would break down their wall of stones!" (<u>Nehemiah 4:1–3</u>, NIV)


#### I. Four Foolish Distractions

- 1. They expressed misplaced anger (v.1)
- 2. They **ridiculed** what they could not control (v.1)
- 3. They tried to publicly **humiliate** them (v.2 "In the presence of his associates...)
- 4. They **doubted** their abilities (vv.2-3, He called them feeble)

Note: I included eight tactics used to discourage and distract Nehemiah in the bonus notes below.

#### **Ouestion**:

- What person or group intimidates and distracts you?
- What is the real reason people in your life struggle with your dream?
- Who or what thoughts mock you unfairly?
- Who or what thoughts define your limits?





Note: What Were the Real Issues?

- In this story Sanballat was the governor of Samaria and felt threatened by the potential re-emerging of a restored Israel.
- The King of Persia found favor in Nehemiah and stepped over the insecurity of these leaders
  - Tobiah the Ammonite belonged to a group historically opposed to Israel (see Deuteronomy 23:3–4)
  - Geshem was probably motivated by financial concerns<sup>1</sup>

### II. How Did They Respond To the Distractions

**Hear us, our God**, for we are despised. Turn their insults back on their own heads. **Give them over as plunder in a land of captivity**. 5 Do not cover up their guilt or blot out their sins from your sight, for they have thrown insults in the face of the builders. 6 So **we rebuilt the wall** till all of it reached half its height, for the people worked with all their heart. (Nehemiah 4:4–6, NIV)

- 1. They **prayed** (v4)
- 2. They let God to handle them (v4-5)
- 3. They **kept on building** (v6)
- 4. They worked with excitement (v6)

### III. What Do We Learn From Their Response

- 1. Know your enemy
- 2. Plan for your enemy
- 3. Trust God to help you
- 4. Keep your eyes open and don't be naive (They divided by family and prepared)

#### **Bonus Notes**

### Major Events Used to Discourage and Distract Nehemiah

- 1. Mockery and Ridicule (Nehemiah 2:19; 4:1–3)
  - Sanballat, Tobiah, and Geshem mocked Nehemiah's plan.
  - They said things like: "What are these feeble Jews doing?" and "Even a fox climbing up on it would break down their wall!"
  - Purpose: Make them feel foolish and incapable.

# 2. Conspiracy of Violence (Nehemiah 4:7–8)

- Enemies (Sanballat, Tobiah, Arabs, Ammonites, Ashdodites) plotted to attack
  Jerusalem and create confusion.
- Purpose: Intimidate them with the threat of physical harm.

### 3. Discouragement from Fear and Exhaustion (Nehemiah 4:10–12)

- The Jews themselves started saying:
  - "The strength of the laborers is giving out."
  - "We can't rebuild the wall."
  - And they feared enemy attacks.
- Purpose: Break their spirits internally through fear and tiredness.
- 4. Internal Conflict Economic Oppression (Nehemiah 5:1–13)





- Some Jewish nobles and officials were charging interest and taking property from poor Jewish families.
- Purpose: Create division and injustice inside the community, distracting from the mission.

# 5. Political Plots — Fake Meetings (Nehemiah 6:1–4)

- Sanballat and Geshem invited Nehemiah to meet on the plain of Ono five times.
- It was a trap to harm him.
- Purpose: Isolate and ambush Nehemiah away from his support system.

# 6. False Accusations and Smear Campaigns (Nehemiah 6:5–9)

- They spread rumors that Nehemiah was trying to make himself king and rebel against Persia.
- They even wrote an "open letter" so everyone would hear the false accusation.
- Purpose: Turn political authorities against Nehemiah and cause panic.

## 7. Religious Manipulation — Hiring a False Prophet (Nehemiah 6:10–14)

- Shemaiah (a supposed prophet) was paid by Tobiah and Sanballat to trick
  Nehemiah into hiding in the temple (which would be a sin for a layman).
- Purpose: Destroy Nehemiah's credibility by making him look cowardly or disobedient to God.

## 8. Noble Betrayal and Secret Communications (Nehemiah 6:17–19)

- Some Judah nobles were loyal to Tobiah because of family marriages.
- They praised Tobiah to Nehemiah and spied for Tobiah.
- Tobiah also sent threatening letters to scare Nehemiah.
- Purpose: Undermine Nehemiah's leadership internally and pressure him through intimidation.
