HAVE COURAGE

After Moses' death, Joshua was tasked with leading the people of Israel into the promised land. Before them, there were enemies that they would have to go to war against. What a terrifying situation. Yet, Joshua is persistent in



the task at hand. He encourages the people of Israel, reminding them of Yahweh's promises. **Note the number**

of times the word courageous is used! This exchange is found in Joshua 1:1-9.

"After the death of Moses the servant of the LORD, the LORD said to Joshua the son of Nun. Moses' assistant. 2 Moses my servant is dead. Now therefore arise, go over this Jordan, you and all this people, into the land that I am giving to them, to the people of Israel. ³Every place that the sole of your foot will tread upon I have given to you, just as I promised to Moses. 4From the wilderness and this Lebanon as far as the great river, the river Euphrates, all the land of the Hittites to the Great Sea toward the going down of the sun shall be your territory. 5No man shall be able to stand before you all the days of your life. lust as I was with Moses, so I will be with you. I will not leave you or forsake you. 6 Be strong and courageous, for you shall cause this people to inherit the land that I swore to their fathers to give them. 7 Only be strong and very courageous, being careful to do according to all the law that Moses My servant commanded you. Do not turn from it to the right hand or to the left, that you may have good success wherever you go. 8This Book of the Law shall not depart from your mouth, but you shall meditate on it day and night, so that you may be careful to do according to all that is written in

it. For then you will make your way prosperous, and then you will have good success. Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be frightened, and do not be dismayed, for the LORD your God is with you wherever you go."


We live in a world that is quite frightening. We know the depth of the broken world and experience it even in our personal lives. There are days when we find ourselves fearful, struggling,



and in need of encouragement. The truth of the matter is that we can be courageous and strong. Not because of our own strength or might, but because of Jesus. God is with us always. Jesus has redeemed us, defeated all our enemies, and has eternity prepared for us.

I love how the Apostle Paul puts it in Romans 8:31-39, "31 What then shall we say to these things? If God is for us, who can be against us? 32 He who did not spare His own Son but gave Him up for us all, how will He not also with Him graciously give us all things? 33 Who shall bring any charge against God's elect? It is God who justifies. 34Who is to condemn? Christ lesus is the One who died—more than that, who was raised—who is at the right hand of God, who indeed is interceding for us. 35 Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or danger, or sword? ³⁶As it is written, 'For your sake we are

being killed all the day long; we are regarded as sheep to be slaughtered.' ³⁷No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through Him who loved us. ³⁸For I am sure that neither death nor life, nor angels nor rulers, nor things present nor things to come, nor powers, ³⁹nor height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our LORD."



I have a dear friend back in Wisconsin who always reminded me that I have the King of Kings and LORD of Lords standing right beside me. It's true. The LORD is with us always! His mercy is new every morning and His grace is sufficient. So, let us take all courage and not be afraid.

DOUBLE DARE

"I double-dared myself to do it, but then I didn't do it." The words were coming at me, but I was still trying to make sense of them. "I knew I wasn't supposed to do it, so even though I double-dared myself, I didn't do it!"



This five-year old was describing temptation, though I'm sure they didn't intend to. The moment I realized it, I explained what it was. "That feeling is temptation and it's really great that you didn't do it. The Holy Spirit helped you."

If you don't spend a lot of time with five-year olds, you might not have the opportunity to learn these sorts of deep theological lessons. Put twenty adults in a room together and ask them to define temptation and I bet not a single one of them would think of it as double-daring yourself to do something you know you're not supposed to do. We need children around us. They can explain things in ways that we can't. And they unearth truths which we don't see. I'm not saying learn ALL of your theology from them. But I am saying, learning doesn't just happen from our elders or the more learned among us.

After this exchange, I was reflecting on temptation. When we are decades

deeper into our sinfulness, I think we are desensitized to it a bit. Oh sure, we can see other people's sins readily. But our own sin doesn't so much as give us a second thought let alone make our hearts pang for forgiveness from the depths of our depravity. That's because sinful is our nature. Do I even think about temptation as being temptation anymore? Or do I see it as part of the laundry list of decisions I make in a day, equal in importance, equal in mundanity?

We are doing the Armor of God right now in Sunday School, specifically the Breastplate of Righteousness. Did you know that the function of the Breastplate of Righteousness is not only to protect our hearts against the devil's schemes that seek to draw us away from following God's ways, but also to protect our hearts from our own selves and our propensity to return to our sinful folly? ("Like a dog to his vomit..." Proverbs 26:11) How alarmed we all should be that our sinfulness is so great that we need armor to protect us from our own selves! Thanks be to God



that He has given us this Armor and the Holy Spirit to live in us!

I think we would all do well to recognize when we "double-dare ourselves" to do the things that we know we shouldn't be

doing and stand up against it. And when we do the double dares, to turn back to God in repentance. Even faithful five-year olds are showing us how to do it.

ABOUNDING

Therefore, my dear brothers and sisters, stand firm. Let nothing move you. Always give yourselves fully to the work of the Lord, because you know that your labor in the Lord is not in vain. 1 Corinthians 15:58

In Scripture, the word "abounding" means "to overflow." Let's look at three "abounding" Scriptures and see what we can learn:

1) Abounding iniquity. "Because iniquity shall abound, the love of many shall wax cold" (Matthew 24:12). The word "iniquity" means "lawlessness." Do you remember your life before you met Jesus? You had no boundaries. You were ruled by your impulses. You'd go

anywhere, do anything, and say whatever you pleased. Now, we're not bringing up your past to make you feel bad, but to make you grateful and to show you how far God has brought you. And what was God's solution to your sin problem?

- 2) Abounding grace. "Where sin abounded, grace abounded much more" (Romans 5:20). God's grace cannot be earned or merited. And that's a good thing because we were all spiritually bankrupt. But as Martin Luther said, "The recognition of sin is the beginning of salvation." It's feeling bad about your sin that leads to feeling good about God's grace. Do you remember the day Jesus found you, saved you, brought you into His family, and showered you with His blessings? What should your response to such grace be?
- 3) Abounding in the work of the Lord. "Therefore, my beloved brethren, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that your labour is not in vain in the Lord." You were saved to serve! When you don't, you'll feel like a fish out of water. So pray the prayer below.

COURAGE

It's a new year! Have courage!

Someone with courage is bold and brave, unafraid to face tough challenges. The Cowardly Lion in the



Wizard of Oz traveled with Dorothy to the Emerald City to get courage from the Wizard because he was afraid of everything.

Having courage means acting when others are afraid of the danger, or simply acting without fear of failing. As the American poet Robert Frost advised, "Have courage and a little willingness to venture and be defeated." Courage could also be described as a quality of spirit that enables one to face danger or pain without showing fear.

Winston Churchill once said, "Courage is what it takes to stand up and speak; courage is also what it takes to sit down and listen."

Showing courage is often thought of as facing daunting or scary situations without fear, but it also involves facing them despite fear. In other words, someone who has courage might not be fearless at all, but they face the dangerous, difficult, or frightening situation in spite of it. But courage doesn't always involve facing danger either. Something as simple as telling the truth when it will result in negative

consequences requires a great deal of courage.

A new year also requires a bit of courage from each one of us. What's ahead for the next year? It's a mystery, known only to God. But we are the King's Kids, no matter our ages, and He has this new year under control. We have only to trust Him and follow His guidance in each step on the way through 2025. He will be our path if we have courage enough to let Him have control of the lead.



COURAGE ON THE WAY TO GRAY... AND BEYOND

"Now also when I am old and gray-headed, O God, do not forsake me, until I declare Your strength to this generation, Your power to everyone who is to come."

Psalm 71:18, NKJV

I am getting older. I realize it by the calendar and by some other metrics as well. Of course, every new day brings an advance in age for everyone, but for most of that "maturing," we don't notice it much. Then comes the first time you miss comments at the table, or getting up from that table takes just a bit more effort. If you've experienced that, then you know exactly what I'm getting at.

Well, I'm there. And while I don't consider aging to be something detrimental, it is real, and it comes with some cost. But, and this is important, it also comes with some real blessings. The Bible speaks often of the elderly person, and much of what it says of that age group is full of honor. You know, increased wisdom, experience, and hopefully humility from the longer trek.

The past two professional positions I have held have given me the great privilege of working with senior adults. Over twenty years ago I served as a hospice chaplain and, although some of my "friends" were in younger categories, the majority were well into their graying. I loved that work, and



God granted me grace to grow in my love for that community. Now, after nearly twenty years serving on a church staff, much of my work is teaching people in that age group as I was blessed enough to "inherit" teaching duties at two of our community's senior facilities. I wouldn't trade those weekly Bible classes for anything. And I'd do it even if I weren't paid.

I'd like to share one other trait that I have come to appreciate in those who are walking the later laps of life: **Courage.** In both my hospice and



church positions. I have seen courage exhibited by those whose increased time of living may have delivered to them difficulties beyond their conceiving. At least we might say challenges that they thought they might never encounter. Loss of loved ones. Especially devoted spouses or children. I've had conversations with those past 100 years of age concerned for their "81-year-old daughter who lives in a nursing facility in the next town over." Imagine that reality. I've walked with people whose levels of pain, even with medication, would cause the bravest among us to howl. And even more than that, I've seen people who have loved the Lord their entire lives begin to ask the most wrenching of questions. Not so much filled with doubts as the ugly

realization that they simply didn't expect their lives to "end up like this."

The psalm I quoted at the beginning is a plea. And the "cause" mentioned in it shows a different type of courage. The writer pleads with his God to not forsake him in his old age. And why? "Because I'm still on Your mission, Lord," might very well be the answer. It's not, "Please give me more days to enjoy," or "I can't leave my family yet." No. This plea comes from a heart that has received much grace and mercy and knows it. And beyond that, the writer knows there are many in younger generations who have yet to meet the source of such grand gifts. I have seen



that courage in so many. Men and women both. Those with formal education and those who "grew up with no plumbing or electricity until after I married at 18. And then we were side-by-side on the farm the next many decades." One thing I know for certain, and it is something I thank God for, is that God *does* give wisdom to His children. Not all the same wisdom for every person. But the wisdom He knows will best serve them. Really, it has been stunning to watch and learn over these many years.

Then, there is the privilege, and I mean that, of walking many dear ones to the final steps and breaths of this world delivering them to the nearer

presence of Christ. And that takes courage. Not mine, but theirs. And not



because they lack faith or any such thing. But simply because it is the biggest journey that none of us here have ever taken. Even with a hand outstretched to the waiting hand of the Master, it takes courage. I've seen it with the most "seasoned saints," and I've seen it in babes in Christ who are perhaps wearing diapers for the second stretch in their lives. Yes, with new converts, it is breathtaking to watch.

What makes this courage a reality? Perhaps the better question is, Who makes this courage a reality? Well, you and I know that it's that wonderful "first grade Sunday School answer" that is always appropriate: JESUS. Indeed, it is. And it comes from those lips that have been promised a constant presence and have been assured that "I will never fail you or forsake you." And perhaps one more precious quote from the lips of the Savior: "Let the little children come to me." Wait a minute. I thought we were talking about those advanced in age. I am. You see, there may be no greater time for courage, and it is truly exhibited at those moments by those who have learned that with all their

experience, what they have really discovered is that they *are* still children. Young they are and ever young they will be. Jesus does not forsake us as our heads gray. Rather He opens doors to treasures we would never see without that experience. I



have been and am blessed by being in the presence of real courage, and the Lord lets me experience it nearly every day. I couldn't be more thankful for watching time go by.

"These things I have spoken to you, so that in Me you may have peace. In the world you have tribulation, but take courage; I have overcome the world."
