


the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." Please let us know your prayer requests that we may rejoice, give thanks, and pray and walk with you through whatever you are going through.

Dear Partners in Mission,

In January, Joyce and I traveled to Nairobi, Kenya. We spent a week with our small group of pastors from Kenya, South Sudan, Uganda, and Ghana. I have been working with these men for almost three years. They are studying in the online Master of Arts in Theology



degree through Concordia Seminary in St. Louis. Apart from this January one-week, in-person class, we meet in Zoom sessions over the computer every Tuesday throughout the rest of the year.

Getting everyone in the same place at the same time and to have everyone ready for intensive studies is a definite logistical challenge. But with a lot of help under God's care, we succeeded!

The pastors in this group are all



senior men. Some of them are already instructors in Lutheran seminaries in their own countries. Some of them are responsible for the other pastors in their districts. Some of them serve as assistants to their church presidents and bishops. This is to say, they are a special group of men who are very influential in the churches in their own countries.

One of the best parts for Joyce and me was to stay with these men, to have all our meals and evenings together at a nearby Catholic convent guesthouse.

Our instructor from the St. Louis seminary was Dr. Benjamin Haupt. He taught a great course on Law and Gospel. This was not a new topic for our pastors. Yet, they really enjoyed and appreciated spending the week



going into depth in the Scriptures, the Lutheran Confessions, Luther, CFW Walther, and holding a lot of practical ministry discussions.

My role is to make sure all the dynamics work for the program and each individual course. Even just getting textbooks to these men was a challenge. I make sure the men understand what the instructor is talking about and make sure the instructor also understands what the men are saying. These men hold a special place in our hearts.

This course in January was the last regular course for their degree work. These men have now started the process of writing the required M.A. thesis.

measure, and I know the opportunity to pay it forward is there for the taking.



DANCE AND WHISPER

Just add water. This is a key piece of parenting advice I've heard and read over and over again. When kids are grumpy, or arguing, or moods are generally sour, just add water. Whether it be splashing in the bathtub or running through the sprinkler, or even playing with cups and measures at a water table or the kitchen table, adding water has a way of calming what needs

to be calmed, and cheering what needs to be cheered. This sage advice has proven true.



Another piece of advice that I learned from my kids is: just have a dance party! There can be weeping and fighting and whining and complaining,

but they get the bug to turn on their favorite songs and pretty soon, they are dancing all over the living room and jamming and singing and full of glee. All that was feeling stressful is quickly forgotten. Music and water are similar blessings to us in their ability to relax us. When the tenor of our home has changed, I often whisper a prayer of thanks to God for this gift.

I was reflecting on what a simple song and dance can do to lift our spirits, both in the doing and in the watching. It somehow seems to push the pause button on life for a few minutes. I don't know about you, but I could sure use a few more "pause button" moments. I could use a few more moments of reckless abandon. I could use a few more opportunities that remind me so obviously to whisper a prayer of thanksgiving to God. (The moments are there, but sometimes I don't see them as readily.)

Life's simple joys are something we can all be looking for, seeking ways that God is at work blessing us through the ordinary. And when you start to look, you'll surely see, His blessings are all around us!

DANCE

"Wearing a linen ephod, David was dancing before the LORD with all his might, while he and all Israel were bringing up the Ark of the LORD with shouts and the sound of trumpets."

2 Samuel 6:14-15

As the Ark of the Covenant was returned to Jerusalem, King David

danced before the Lord as an act of personal and communal celebration and worship as God's chosen Leader for Israel, God's chosen people. His dance was a spontaneous expression of joy and reverence, rooted in his deep relationship with God and his desire to lead the nation in honoring the Lord.

Despite criticism, David remained steadfast in his commitment to worship



God with all his might, setting an example for believers throughout the ages. His dance before the Ark of the Covenant is a good reminder to us to set aside pretenses, and concentrate our worship with eyes turned to God and to pleasing Him in all that we do.

The "linen ephod" he wore was a type of apron worn by the High Priest of Israel in the Old Testament to show service to Almighty God, here also an act of reverence and joy on David's part. The ephod garment was part of the ceremonial rules of priestly preparation for times of worship in the tabernacle and temple. This garment represented the holy status of the priesthood to the people, a choice of God, even as King David was chosen by God.

All through the Scriptures, we see examples of people dancing for joy in the Lord or celebrating their God-given victories with dance. What a jubilant form of expression God has blessed us with!



"Then Miriam the prophetess,
Aaron's sister, took a tambourine and
led all the women as they played their
tambourines and danced. And Miriam
sang this song: 'Sing to the Lord, for He
has triumphed gloriously...'"

Exodus 15:20-21

Do you ever dance with joy? With your children? Does music fill you with so much happiness that standing still is not an option? Do you feel God's presence as you dance? The joy of the Lord is a wonderful part of life!

I can remember many times snatching my children, and later my Grands, up in my arms and dancing around, giggling and laughing with them, praising God for these incredible blessings I held tightly to my heart. Dancing was not an option. It was a spontaneous act of praise and worship of God, joyful thanksgiving for all He has given me. This is the same God who has caused kings to fall to their knees before Him, the same God who blesses us daily with beauty, laughter, and love.

Does He expect us all to dance? What do you think? Is His Body, the Church, only gifted in dance? If so, who would

keep the books? Or preach the sermons? Or teach the children? Or fix the food? Or clean and repair and organize? Or... well, you get the picture. There are many ways God's people show their joy in the Lord, and dance is one of them. God loves a cheerful giver, so whatever you do, do it well for the Lord. That is *His* gift to you, and yours to Him. Using *His* gifts for *His* service is the height of sacrifice for the love of God. And if you dance...

BEING FRIENDS WITH GOD

Moses said to the LORD, "You have been telling me, 'Lead these people,' but You have not let me know whom You will send with me. You have said, 'I know you by name and you have found favor with me.' (Exodus 33:12)

Moses talked with God like a friend, sharing what he felt and thought. And God wanted it that way. Here is how the conversation went: 'Moses said to the

Lord, "You have been telling me, 'Lead these people,'...You have said, 'I know you by name and you have found favour with me."" Moses is mirroring back to God what God had previously said to him. Remember saying to your spouse or your best friend, 'You were the one who said ... ? That's what Moses is doing here: reminding God of His own words. And God wants you to remember His Word and to speak it back to Him (see Isaiah 43:26). Not because He needs to be reminded, but because you do! And because His Word is the only Word that He is committed to fulfill (see Matthew 24:35).

When you pray using God's Word, you are praying in His will, and you're guaranteed to get a hearing. So, learn and memorize Scriptures that touch on



your needs and desires, and when you talk to God, recall them, and pray them back to Him.

For example, when you pray, 'Therefore I tell you, whatever you ask for in prayer, believe that you have received it, and it will be yours' (Mark 11:24). God will acknowledge it! The more you learn of His Word, the more your prayer time will conform to His will and the more you will feel aligned with Him. Keep your Bible handy when you talk to God so that He can direct your thoughts to the words He wants you to pray.

PRAYER

Heavenly Father, let Your Word guide me - and let me listen to where in that Word You will guide me. In Jesus' Name, Amen.



The 5 Finger Prayer

Thumb: Those closest to you, your family.

Pointer: Those that point you in the right direction (teachers, doctors, priests) ask for wisdom & support.

Index: (tallest) Those that lead us, (Government) ask for guidance & wisdom.

Ring: (weakest) Those
that are weak, in trouble, or in pain. We cannot pray too much for them.

Pinkie: (smallest) Our prayers for ourselves & our own needs.

Did you know that stories in the Bible are not always about nice guys? Did you also know that even the nice guys (and gals) in the Bible often do bad things? Does that sound kinda like your own life? Yes? Guess what? That's real life for us all—even Mom and Dad.

"In heist [robbery] movies, the bad guys and girls have all the fun. Exotic places, elegant hotels and decked-out mansions, high-tech toys for robberies—who wouldn't want that? Even better, they seldom get caught. Add in designer clothes, souped-up cars, and priceless treasures; it's clear that movie crime is tons of fun... Robbing a bank, punching someone in the face, making up a nasty lie about that kid you don't like...

"Not all the guilty criminals in this book are what we think of as villains though. Abraham, Rebekah, King David—those are heroes of the faith, right? But at times they all failed to trust God. That's sin in a nutshell: lack of trust in God. It never starts well and it never ends well."

A few of the criminals included in this book are: Adam and Eve, King Saul, Jezebel and her husband King Ahab [a very gory story], Rahab, Haman, Pilate, and more.

This is a great book that can easily be used as a family Bible study or devotion. The stories are short, with Bible quotes and connections to history that support the truth of the stories. Literature and word definitions are interspersed to verify and help us understand what the story means. It even includes the "why" for the story to be in the Bible in the first place.



What a fun way for a family to study the Bible together! Check it out!

PEN TO PAPER

Last month, in the newsletter, I encouraged you (and myself) to become more aware of our surroundings as avenues for

prayer. Open your eyes and ears, (even your nose). Those are magnificent tools from our LORD to take in smells and sounds, sights and voices. You may hear laughter or cries for help. You may smell the "char" of a burning home or stand at a distance taking in the grandeur of the Lake Michigan shoreline. Our senses are given for just that: to *sense* what is around us and to, at times, translate those to prayer.

This month I want to encourage another "help" for prayer. This one takes some effort, and it may feel completely unnatural. At least at the beginning. But what I am going to suggest is writing your prayers down as you pray, or after you pray them. Just write. People have been writing pravers for millennia. Someone either heard and copied every prayer recorded in Scripture or wrote them down themselves as part of their discipline. Again, it may seem a bit unnatural, but you write a grocery list, or a note to vour children tacked on the front of the refrigerator. It doesn't have to be any more unnatural than that. And, unlike a grocery list, it can be an ongoing blessing. What would the world have missed had David not penned Psalm 23 or Psalm 51 or any of his inspired cries to God? And while your prayers and mine do not have the divine stamp of

inspiration behind them, they do come from redeemed hearts and minds made new by God's grace.

The other day, I wrote a devotion that highlighted how clarity comes to us when we get a strong glimpse of Jesus. Clarity and focus might be wonderful byproducts of writing our prayers, too. No need to be profound or wordy. But honest expression is important. Because our focus is aided and recalled by words made "permanent." One of the joys, for example, of praying the Psalms is that we can recall emotions appropriate to each one whenever we read. And that can come from our own prayers as well.

And just one other thought: begin with a prayer for someone you hold close to your heart, because emotion and thought about someone you treasure can help you put down on paper thoughts that might be more difficult over a more general petition.



So, pick up a pen or pencil, and when thoughts of Christ and a loved one next come to mind, jot them down. Begin to garner the gift of prayer to be kept and made more permanent for you and those you love.
