

THERE'S A "T" IN THE

Sometimes when my mindset is on Jesus, I don't think of my dad or brother first, but of my mom and my sister. Do you know why? Because there is in this rock-solid identity of a Jewish carpenter/rabbi from Nazareth, the stream of what we would call compassion, empathy, or "heart" that we usually associate with women.

Now, I make that statement with the full understanding of what our culture has allowed on this issue of gender identity. But I stand by my previous assertion. This is Biblical stuff here and I can tell you that I see, in my mom, my sister, and my other Christian sisters, this capacity to bend low to serve with compassion, not out of weakness, but out of immense strength. Now, lest you think this article a treatise on women only, I also see immense compassion (which means to suffer with) and empathy (which I define as "trading the places of the heart") in many men in my

life. And in that I do include my dad and brother.

No, these qualities, while exemplified so beautifully in so many women, can be owned and operated by men as well. I am thankful for the expression in both. But there is a danger zone in compassion, in empathy. And that is when we lose truth, better Truth, as our guiding star or compass in the giving of the heart to those in need.

Now please don't think that I am arguing for some cold, calculating test or parameters that must be applied to persons or situations before we deem them fitting for our help. But we do need to recognize the fact that our emotions, apart from the truth of God's Word and apart from the God who is truth itself, are easily swayed by what we perceive.

I remember hearing from someone driving a fishing boat long ago, "It don't matter how heavy the anchor is if the chain ain't long enough." And if you



want a boat to stay in place, especially in a moving current, you must have something that provides that

stability. That's what truth does, and that's why the truth takes first place in living out compassion.

Jesus came to us to save us. He did it for two reasons primarily. First, was love for His Father and the desire that His Truth be vindicated. And second, His love for lost sinners that for some amazing reason He wants to spend

eternity with. Now, no one would accuse our God of coldness in dealing with humanity through His Son. But in our world, we've learned a form of "goodness," or "concern," that simply gives to others what they want, often before we take the time and effort to determine what they need. The two points above, pointing to why Jesus came to us, are both based in reason. On something that is true. Love is included. But love is secondary and serves the truth.

"Speak the truth in love," writes St. Paul to the Ephesian Christians. Faltering and failing at either will not give the desired result. But the truth is first. Jesus spoke to the woman at the well in John chapter 4, that the Father seeks those who worship Him in spirit (Spirit) and truth. Because even the good intentions of spirituality can be sidetracked without the moorings of faithful teaching. The truth is first.

Our world in our time, as in all times, is filled with people with genuine. rubber-meets-the-road needs. There is absolutely no question about that. You and I as children of the Living God, the God of the Bible, are commanded to live with compassion toward others. Think of it: compassion that is commanded cannot be devoid of truth because the authority behind the command demands truthfulness for compassion to be genuine. The truth is first. I want to be compassionate to those in need. I want to follow the example of Jesus I've experienced in my mom, in my sister, and in so many others. But I cannot be truly loving or truly compassionate if the truth of what is needful doesn't enter my mind and heart first.




