Rescue Me

We are experiencing the joy of a baby who



is getting to be more mobile each day. At six months old, she is rolling one way and then the other. She pushes herself high on her belly using her hands, sometimes pushing herself backwards from the momentum of it. With more mobility comes more freedom, and with more freedom, comes more trouble. She finds herself, at times, in predicaments that she doesn't know how to get herself out of. Because she can't.

She rolls up against the side of the couch and doesn't know how to maneuver out of it. She cries in frustration as if saying, "rescue me!"

I don't know about everyone else, but over and over again in my



parenting years, I see pictures of my relationship with God being played out through my relationship with my children. God gives me freedom, and with it comes more

trouble. I find myself in predicaments I don't know how to get myself out of. Because I can't. Sometimes after a short period of frustration and sometimes after an embarrassingly long one, I cry out to God, "rescue me!"

I think we often see the need for being rescued as a situation others have caused or that happened by chance. But upon further reflection, I am realizing that the majority of the situations in which I (we) need rescuing are of our own causing. And because we cause so much trouble, it is all the more critical that we keep ourselves in close proximity to God.

Psalm 91, in its entirety, shows us this example. (I'd highly encourage you to read it now.) Verse one talks about us "dwelling in the shelter of the Most High"; that is, being close to God. Then He can cover us (v. 4) and keep the plague at bay (v. 10) and of course, we can call to Him when we need help. "Because he holds fast to Me in love, I will deliver him; I will protect him, because he knows My name. When he calls to Me, I will answer him; I will be with him in trouble; I will rescue him and honor him." (v. 14-15)

Dear God, help us stay close to You. Cover us. Keep us. Rescue us. Amen.

SUN AND SURF, SIN AND SALVATION

"Wonderful, merciful Savior, precious Redeemer and Friend; Who would have thought that a Lamb could rescue the souls of men? Oh, You rescue the souls of men."

Those are lyrics from a lovely hymn written near the end of the 20th century. The original setting was done not with organ, but with what we might refer to as an acoustic "praise band" today. And it was penned during probably the most significant spiritual movement among youth that America has seen to date, "The Jesus Movement." It was marked by large swaths of "hippies" drawn from the California beaches to churches who would open their doors to these wandering souls. And not many churches did.

One, known as Calvary Chapel in Costa Mesa, was the hub. A nondenominational congregation where the pastor loved surfing just as much as some of those with whom he shared the good news. It was surfing in the morning, witness and prayer on the beach into the evening hours. Hundreds, then thousands began to listen. Chuck Smith was used by our Lord to cast nets from the California

shore and many, many were caught for Jesus.



The lyrics from the first verse of the hymn point to Jesus' mission. The word "rescue" sits prominently in verse one as part of a question, "Who would have thought a Lamb could rescue the souls of men?" Who, indeed.

But that is God's program. Sacrifice, blood, death. LIFE. And it is a full-fledged rescue. I think perhaps we forget that angle. The psalmist knew it well. The Good News translation of Psalm 68:20 reads, "Our God is a God who saves; He is the LORD, our Lord, who rescues us from death." Other translations use "escape" or "deliverance" and other similar forms. But I like "rescues." It points to the fact that we have no options. It is rescue or certain destruction. But then, that is what the gospel provides, isn't it?

Whether it's long-haired social outcasts or the sharpest and most well-educated CEO, we all have this in common: we need to be rescued. And because of Jesus Christ, sin, death, and the devil flee as the "Rescuer" reclaims us from their cold grip. As I think back on those days where Chuck Smith and others courageously said "yes" to thousands that no one else acknowledged, what he was offering

them was not just an alternative to their alternatives, but a rescue from death. So very many responded and the work of Christ, by the Holy Spirit, produced nets filled with souls. The wind and waves, sun and sand, of southern California gave place for the work of rescue. And God be praised, thousands found life. Real life.



RESCUE

Then the Lord commanded the fish, and it vomited Jonah up onto the dry land.

Jonah 2:10

Eeeww! Have you noticed that a rescue is rarely a thing of beauty? When someone or something needs rescue, it's usually banged up, bleeding, broken, or bedraggled and messy.



Many days, I feel like that. It may just be a mental muddle or fugue, or it may be a physically obvious meltdown. But from time to time, we all need rescue. Every year, my sisters and I do a girls' weekend together (which has expanded in recent years to five days) because we all need rescue from our "real lives" occasionally. Some might call it an escape, which really is what happens with a rescue, isn't it? We escape from a bad situation, a nasty accident, a life-threatening condition, or a deadly fate. But a rescue can't happen without help. From someone. It's seldom possible to rescue ourselves.

When Jonah was swallowed by the huge fish, he knew it was his own fault. He knew better than to ignore God's will and run away, but he did it anyway. He risked his own life and the lives of others with that disobedience.

God, in His mercy, rescued Jonah by having the fish swallow him. Can you imagine how disgusting that was? Undigested food. Sea water mixed with smaller fish and sea creatures, probably in various stages of digestion. Yuck! And only God knows how Jonah was able to breathe inside that fish.

"I called to the Lord and He answered me... engulfing waters threatened me.



the deep surrounded me, seaweed wrapped around my head... when my life was ebbing away... my prayer arose to You..." ~ from Jonah's Prayer (Jonah 2:2, 5, 7)

But Jonah realized that as disobedient and messy as he was, God had kept him alive for a reason.

"... I, with a song of thanksgiving, will sacrifice to You" (Jonah 2:9a)

God rescued Jonah: "...and it [the huge fish] vomited Jonah up onto the dry land." Disgustingly messy and nasty. Foul and revolting. But God rescued Jonah so that Jonah could bring God's Word to the Ninevites. And "more than a hundred and twenty thousand people and... many animals" (Jonah 4:11) were saved.

Rescue was *not* pretty for Jonah. But he couldn't save himself. He needed help. His help came from a loving God who bothered to care enough for a city full of sinners, to discipline and save the reluctant prophet Jonah, so that he could preach repentance to them. Wow! It took the miracle of Jonah and the huge fish to allow the miraculous redemption of Ninaveh. What a lot of work the Lord went through to save one prophet. One city.

The Book of Jonah is only 3 ½ pages long in my Bible, but there's a lot in there. It's the only "cliff-hanger" in the Bible, as far as I know. It ends with a question and gives us a taste of the frustration God must so often feel when dealing with humanity. Thank God that He rescued us through His Son, to give us new life and another chance.

Read the account of Jonah. It's a great fish story.

T'S NOT TOO SMALL FOR GOD

The man of God asked, "Where did it fall?" When he showed him the place, Elisha cut a stick and threw it there, and made the iron float. 2 Kings 6:6



Second Kings 6 tells of a prophet chopping trees near a river when his iron axe head falls in. He said to Elisha: "Alas, master! For it was borrowed" (v. 5). He uses the past tense. As far as he is concerned, this axe head is gone forever. He has no expectation whatsoever that the axe head will be retrieved. He shows Elisha where he lost it. Elisha cuts a stick and flings it into the water, and something happens that most likely never happened before or since. "And the iron did swim."

Notice, this isn't a life-or-death situation. Yes, it's a loaned axe head. Yes, it disappeared. But if that's the worst thing you have gone through, you have led a pretty sheltered life. You could put this into the same category as Jesus turning water into wine at a

wedding party. Why waste your first miracle on helping a bride and groom avoid embarrassment because they didn't stock enough wine for their reception?

This reveals something about God. He concerns Himself with the little things, like wedding receptions and borrowed axe heads. Nothing is too big for our great God, and nothing is too small for Him either. "Casting all your care upon Him, for He cares for you" (1 Peter 5:7). Note the words "all your care." If it matters to you, it matters to your loving heavenly Father. "In all your ways acknowledge Him, and He shall direct your paths" (Proverbs 3:6 NKJV). Note the words "all your ways." Today God wants you to share every detail of your life with Him.

PRAYER

Heavenly Father, forgive me when I do not turn things over to You because I don't want to bother You. Help me lay it all before You every day!
[Rescue me, even in the little things.]
In Jesus' name, Amen.
