BEGIN WITH WHAT YOU KNOW

We live in a time of chaos. Noticed? The month just passed saw unspeakable acts of violence in our nation. Unspeakable from an ultimate standard point of view. But therein lies the issue. There is no "ultimate standard" any longer. No over-arching word of law and authority that rings true in the heart and mind of every person, nor the

collective of our nation. Now, as a disclaimer, there are individuals who recognize transcendent truth. And that's because they know a God who speaks. And He speaks to them, they listen, and by His grace acknowledge His Word to be true. They know it.

A wise teacher once told me that while you are working on untying knotty problems, whether they are mathematical or philosophical, a good rule of thumb is to begin with what you know. Go back—even to the very roots of what you are considering, those "2+2" places. Go back to gain footing so that you know that each step after the first is grounded on something solid. That's what Martin Luther did.

Martin lived in an age of chaos, too. Theological chaos (among other issues). The deeper the Lord took him into the rage of his day, the less footing he had, until he returned to those things he knew to be true.

Now in Martin's case, he had to become familiar with foundational truth. Luther had *not* read the New Testament before his time at the seminary. And so, he received counsel to go back to the sources. It was a movement in the education processes of his day, so God was at work in and outside of the church. But the counsel came from a wise father in the faith



who knew where to look for truth: God's Holy Word. Martin looked where his mentor sent him. A spark grew into a flame, and then a raging fire. But it was not a fire of destruction, but of purification.

The opponents of Martin Luther accused him of fomenting revolution. religious and political. Such was not the case. Luther lived in a highly charged political culture, as we do. But that was not his emphasis. Luther wanted to share what God was teaching from His Word, but there needed to be change. Not revolution, but reformation. What is the distinction? Revolution destroys what was before it to build from the ashes. Reformation seeks to utilize the foundation previously laid. Read Jude 1-3. That's just three verses, not three chapters; Jude only has one of those. But just as the biblical author took his readers back to their beginnings, so Luther attempted to bring the church of Christ back to what they had always known

Yes, fifteen centuries after the "starting line" of the church, the need arose to go back to study just what the church knew when the gun fired, and they were set speeding on their way to win the world. In other words, Luther's reforms began with what he knew, what the church had always known. And that's where we should be today. There's an adage that "the church is always reforming," but it's not building the new and novel. It's a reforming of foundational truths, the things we know. The things we have always known. God grant us to love, treasure. and share freely the things we know. Amen!

LIVE IN THE 'HERE AND NOW'

"But Ruth replied, "Don't urge me to leave you or to turn back from you. Where you go, I will go, and where you stay, I will stay. Your people will be my people and your God my God."

Ruth 1:16

The book of Ruth illustrates the difference between those who step out in faith and take risks and those who give in to fear, play it safe, and miss God's best for them. The book begins with these words:

"There was a famine in the land. And a certain man of Bethlehem in Judah, went to dwell in the country of Moab, he and his wife [Naomi] and his two sons."

Things went well for a while, then tragedy struck. First, Naomi's husband Elimelech died, and she was left with her two sons. They married local girls named Orpah and Ruth, and then the sons died. Overwhelmed with grief, Naomi decides to return home to Bethlehem and advises her two daughters-in-law to stay in Moab and hopefully find husbands and raise families.

This is where the difference shows up in the two girls. Orpah decided to stay in Moab, even though it was a place of heartache and hard times. Why? Because it was the place she knew. It was her comfort zone. She didn't have the faith to go forward. Ruth was different. She said to Naomi: 'Wherever you go, I will go; and wherever you lodge, I will lodge; your people shall be my people, and your God, my God' (v. 16).

Orpah went back, Ruth went forward. And it paid off. Back in Bethlehem, she met Boaz, her new husband. Not only was he wealthy, but he took good care of her, and they had a son from whom descended both King David and our Jesus. God rewards faith, not fear. So, the word for today is—it's time to break with the past and move forward.

PRAYER

Heavenly Father, help me put aside my fears and have faith to move where You are leading—even though I do not know where You are leading, I do know You are leading. In Jesus' name, Amen.

REFORM

Reform: to put or change into an improved form or condition; to amend or improve by change of form or removal of faults or abuses.

There are a lot of similarities between when Jesus came, confronting the Sadduces because they had strayed from God's original laws, and when Martin Luther nailed the 95 theses to the Church door in Wittenburg,

Germany. Neither were meant to "tear down religion," but to "reform" or return God's laws to His original context or intention. Man-made laws and Indulgences were never mentioned in God's law for His people.




In both cases, the people drifted away from what God originally said, and the blame fell squarely on the religious leaders in both cases. That does NOT mean the people were blameless. But it does mean that the people AND the leaders must always be aware of what God says before adding or subtracting from His Words.



Reform or changes are not always the answer to every problem. Change for the sake of change is never the way to go. But when change or "new" is suggested, we are expected to make informed choices for what is God's will in any given situation. Just as Martin Luther went back to the early church sources, so must we use our resources and pray as we step forward in each new venture.

God speaks, but we need to listen. Prayer and study of God's Word will give us the directions we need in each new situation or endeavor. Reform does not mean to tear down. Reform means to re-form what has become distorted or needs repair. It does NOT mean "destroy everything that has gone before."

As we move forward with building plans at Redeemer, let's make sure we bathe the process in prayer. God willing, we will build His House in this place with Him, and His Word and Sacraments, as our foundation for the generations to come. We build on Him. For His work. He is our one foundation. We build and re-form for His glory in this place.
