ALWAYS SOMETHING TO SAY

Always something to say? Is that true? In a recent study, it is proposed that the average American speaks roughly 16,000 words per day. That's over 900 words per hour, taking on average

nearly two hours to speak them. Of course, this can vary widely. But it is no wonder that the Bible says so much about saying. From Proverbs and the Psalter to the Gospels, and in nearly every corner of the Bible, there are instructions about what to say, what not to say, and indeed, how words should be spoken. Here's an example: "Let no corrupt word proceed out of vour mouth, but what is good for necessary edification, that it may impart grace to the hearers." So, St. Paul writes to the Ephesian Christians. I imagine they took it to heart as we might. I am equally sure that they faltered in keeping the charge of the great apostle. As did he. Lord. have mercy.



As we read the Bible and encounter passage after passage regarding the power of our speech, it is well for us to remember that everything that is, began with speech. God's speech. And as Psalm 12 reminds us, "The words of the LORD are pure words." Perhaps it would be well for us to muse on that

text the next time we open our mouths or even think to. I am often guilty of speaking what may hurt or damage others. Just as often, I realize that I did far too little thinking before opening my mouth.

Purposely, this article is short on words. While speech takes the form of the written text just now, I encourage us all, especially where the world seems to be heading, to take additional time to think before we speak, to realize our words are a reflection and product of our hearts. And to remember, the chief use of our words is the exaltation of our great God.

FOOLS, TONGUES, AND SLANDEROUS WORDS

"...in the Old Testament... a fool is a godless, and immoral person (cf. Ps. 14:1; Prov. 9:13-18; 14:9). He is a wicked reprobate, destitute of spirituality. Further, and most significantly, many... translators see the epithet, "You fool!" as implying a curse... as, "You cursed fool" [i.e. 'You damned fool!']... or you, fool, are damned!

Out of hateful and malicious anger, one individual is sitting in judgment on another (in effect, taking the place of God) and calling down eternal destruction on the object of his hateful wrath. This bears little relation to our current use of the word (fool) ..." https://wordwisebiblestudies.com/the-fool

It does, however, give us a close-up view of just how despicable one would have to be to get the label of fool.

When we couple the derogatory term "fool" with "slander," we are given a terrifying glimpse of the damage and ultimate carnage that can be caused by the sin of slander, and why it should be avoided. All this is presented to show us God's view of how vile and appalling



slander is to Him.

In this day and age, I think we've lost the value of the depth and power of some of the old words used often in the Bible. Words like wrath, hellfire, and damnation don't have the shock-value that they used to hold. Maybe we need to be reminded of the abject pain and grief that are part and parcel to slanderous remarks or mean-spirited comments. With that in mind, we should weigh our words carefully before we speak, because those words have power and should be used with discrimination. Consider the healing or the damage that our words can cause before we open our mouths. A single




word spoken in haste can be hurtful beyond measure.

Last month, in this newsletter, we

deliberated on the adverse effects of gossip and how hurtful it can be. Bear in mind, slander is a malicious older cousin to gossip. The Bible warns about "lying lips, spreading strife, and slanderers separating close friends." The evils of gossip are magnified in the wickedness of slander.

As God's people, let's be ever vigilant in guarding our thoughts and words against anything that would intentionally harm another. Our lives should always reflect our Redeemer.

A novel by Tracie Peterson


