From the Pastor

A "Very Present" Help

(Psalm 46)

October is the month of the Protestant Reformation. And what would any commemoration of the Protestant Reformation be without the singing of the hymn, "A Mighty Fortress"? I ask that question because this iconic hymn in our hymn book (LSB 657) is based on Psalm 46, a psalm most widely known for those words of the Lord Almighty to anyone beset by distress to merely "Be still and know that I am God" (46:10). Those are beloved and beautiful words, to be sure! Here's something else worth contemplating this year as we hear the words of the Psalm: Our God is a "very present help in trouble."

I don't know about you, but that's something I know I need to hear about again this year. Trouble at times seems to be all around. There are the statistics we have all heard proving how random violence directed at people of faith is not as unusual in our country today as it once was.



And then there is all the other trouble that never seems to change that much from year to year. Jesus is not someone far away... someone you have to make sure you have on speed dial whenever trouble finds you. He is close at hand. He is, as the Hebrew words behind "very present" literally read, "always findable." Not only has Jesus proved himself to be One who would bring

the world rescue from sin, death, and the Devil during his earthly ministry at just the right time. Now, the Lord God promises never to remove Himself from His people in their distress in the first place! He is always available... always found... in His life-giving Word! As the Psalmist writes, "The Lord Almighty is with us. The God of Jacob is our fortress!"

Ever wonder why Jesus tells you to hate your family, make friends by unrighteous wealth, fear God, or that divorce is adultery?


We will be specifically looking at these challenging words of Jesus, because even His hard words matter for our relationship with Him and the people He gives us.

Sleep in Heavenly Peace

Helping Children in Need Sleep Better

All children deserve a safe, comfortable place to lay their heads. Across the country, too many boys and girls go without a bed — or even a pillow — to sleep on. These children end up sleeping on couches, blankets, and even floors. This can affect their happiness and health.

That's where Sleep in Heavenly Peace comes in. We are volunteers who are dedicated to building, assembling, and delivering top-notch bunk beds to children and families in need.

Sleep in Heavenly Peace (SHP) provides the bed, mattress, and bedding to each child. Bedlessness is a real problem in the US with 2-3% of the population sleeping without beds.

A volunteer crew delivered to a family of three little girls that had all been sleeping on the same (broken) twin size bed. That same night, a bed was delivered to a 17-year-old that had never had a bed of his own.

SHP provides all the tools and expertise that allow people with little or no experience to build all components for a solid, wood bunk bed. It is always a fun-filled half day that ends with branding the beds. Fellowship is wonderful and the ability to solve a problem for others leaves everyone feeling a bit better about the world! We need many volunteers for the build.




Stephen Ministry


Hope Beyond an Empty Cradle

One of the main things people associate with Stephen Ministry is helping people through grief, and so it isn't surprising that the next couple of themed months will focus on different aspects of grief.

In October, and specifically on October 15th, we recognize National Infancy and Infant Loss Awareness Month, and the international wave of light invites people to light a candle at 7:00 pm on October 15th to show support to those who are grieving the loss. There are no words for parents who lose a child either prior to birth or during early childhood. And there is literally no word to describe a parent who loses their child: children can be "orphans"; spouses may be a "widow/er", but there is no word to describe parents who lose a child.

Stephen Ministry can be a great resource when there are no words to describe the loss and no words to describe the emotion. While Stephen Ministry is not designed to replace professionally trained counselors or medical providers, we are well-equipped to support people during challenging times in life.





The Christ-centered approach provides a message of hope. Stephen Ministers are called "Care Givers," but we know that only Christ is the "Cure Giver". It is through that relationship that Stephen Ministers can be that safe space for people to express their grief. It is our "ministry of presence" and sometimes all people need is to know that someone is with them.

You can find the book pictured here in the Stephen Ministry section of the RLC Library (located next to the gym). There are no words... and sometimes silence communicates all that is needed in that moment.

Mission Minute

Ilea Kuo — Mission Trip to Southeast Asia, Summer 2025

This summer was such an amazing opportunity to challenge and grow my faith in the midst of a different country and culture, and to ultimately investigate what it might be like to pursue global missions long term. Going into the trip, I already had some limited experience with sharing the Gospel with strangers; I participated in various campus and city outreach events that focused on sharing with many people, as opposed to establishing deep connections with a few. Nervous as I was to try a different approach, I was excited to see what it would be like to forge relationships first, and through them, get to share the Good News. I think the biggest obstacle of sharing the Gospel this summer was the cultural barrier. It is difficult to describe what it feels like as a Christian to go from a Christian-based country to a Muslim-based country. The power of the devil was palpable and felt heavy the whole time we were there. Instead of being surrounded by churches and people that knew the Grace of Jesus, we were surrounded by mosques and people trying their best to be "good enough" for God. Each time the call to prayer would go off (five times a day), we were reminded of how lost the people around us were and the Truth that they were missing out on. It was heartbreaking, but encouraged our convictions about why we were there.

Although we did not have any friends that accepted Christ while we were there, many had lots of questions about our faith and about their own that they wanted to investigate. We were able to connect them with the long term staff that live in the area so they can continue to explore Christianity. I still chat with my friends to see how they are doing and update them on my life as well. I am praying that eventually, the seed planted in them would sprout and lead them to Christ.

This trip also taught me a lot about my own relationship with Christ, and what I might do in the future. For the past year, I have been considering long term mission work, and this trip served as a taste of what that life might look like. Being among those people for 7 weeks and making friends with some of the college students there grew my heart for the Indonesian people, and for Muslim people worldwide. I cannot imagine how discouraging it must be to live your whole life trying to be "good enough" while never knowing if you have actually done enough. I wanted my friends to know the Gospel and be freed from that life of fear. Coming back to the States, I remembered walking into my first church service the day after we got back, and being in awe of a room full of believers, proudly singing praises to God. Although we had our own worship services in a staff member's house during the summer, it was so incredible to be back at a place, surrounded by other Christians and be able to openly proclaim our faith. However, I also felt a conviction towards the nations where a church service like that could not be possible. There are so many strong believers in America that can share with the folks here but don't have the ability to go to the nations. I have that freedom and capability of doing so now, and I don't want to take that for granted. This summer encouraged me to keep my yes on the table for moving overseas as a missionary and to take steps toward that goal.

This trip was truly an incredible experience and one that I am so grateful for. The Lord challenged and grew me in ways that I was not expecting, and continually reminded me of the beauty of the Gospel. I want to thank you all for supporting me through this trip and wanting to see the Nations reached. It is such a blessing and honor to be able to be a part of God's mission of salvation for all people, and one that I will continue in for the rest of my life.

The History of Fire Prevention: Fire Prevention Week was established to commemorate the Great Chicago Fire in 1871. Tragically this conflagration killed more than 250 people, left 100,000 people homeless, destroyed more than 17,400 structures and burned more than 2,000 acres.

The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) has sponsored the event since 1922 and continues to provide resources and information each year. The organization's goal is to educate the public about fire safety by providing educational activities, such as practicing escape plans and testing smoke alarms. Each year a new theme is chosen to highlight a specific fire safety topic. This year's theme for Fire Prevention Week™ (October 5–11, 2025) is: "Charge into Fire Safety™: Lithium-Ion Batteries in Your Home."

From Phones to Power Tools: Know the Risks of Lithium-Ion Batteries

Most of the electronics we use in our homes every day, like smartphones, tablets, power and lawn tools, laptops, e-cigarettes, headphones, and toys, to name just a few, are powered by lithium-ion batteries. In fact, most everything that's rechargeable uses this type of battery.

If not used correctly or if damaged, lithium-ion batteries can overheat, start a fire, or even explode. To reduce these risks, look around your home — it's important to know which devices are powered by them. Lithium-ion batteries are powerful, convenient, and they're just about everywhere. This year's campaign helps people understand the importance of using these batteries correctly to prevent fires in the home and to follow the **Buy, Charge, and Recycle Safely** approach.

Buy only listed products.

- When buying a product that uses a lithium-ion battery, take time to research it. Look for a stamp from a nationally recognized testing lab on the packaging and product, which means that it meets important safety standards.
- Many products sold online and in stores may not meet safety standards and could increase risk of fire.

Charge devices safely.

- Always use cords that came with the product to charge it. Follow the instructions from the manufacturer.
- If you need a new charger, buy one from the manufacturer or one that the manufacturer has approved.
- Charge your device on a hard surface. Don't charge it under a pillow, on a bed, or on a couch. This could cause a fire.
- Don't overcharge your device. Unplug it or remove the battery when it's fully charged.

Recycle batteries responsibly.

- Don't throw lithium-ion batteries in the trash or regular recycling bins because they could catch fire.
- Recycling your device or battery at a safe battery recycling location is the best way to dispose of them. Visit <u>call2recycle.org</u> to find a recycling spot near you.

Lithium-ion fires can be caused by several other factors, including internal short circuits, overheating, physical damage, electric shock, environmental risks, manufacturing defects, age and wear.

There is no guarantee that a fire will never happen in your home. That's why it is important to be prepared and take steps to reduce the risk of a house fire.

The Stewardship of Life and Health want to encourage everyone to be aware of their devices, follow the *Buy, Charge, and Recycle Safely* approach, and support this year's FPW theme, "Charge into Fire Safety™."


is when it comes to working with a team made up of unique individuals. They worked together to solve problems and make sure each group member successfully completed each obstacle.
