From the Pastor

The Wisdom of Numbering Our Days

(Psalm 90:4, 12-14)

The comparison/contrast between eternity on the one hand and time measured by watches and hourglasses on the other has always been a mindblower for me. Once upon a time when I was a little guy, my grandpa repeated Hendrik van Loon's parable in *The Story of Mankind*: "Imagine a mountain 100 miles high and 100 miles long. Every thousand years a tiny bird comes to this mountain to sharpen its beak. Once that entire mountain has been worn away, one day in eternity will have passed!" Wow. Then — and now — I realized my finite brain cannot easily comprehend the notion. But once every 365 days we turn the calendar from one year to the next. It is a moment to remember just how short our lives here truly are.

"Teach us to number our days," the Psalmist asks of God, "so that we may gain a heart of wisdom" (Psalm 90:12). Though the brevity of life may seem like an issue best ignored or simply put out of mind as we advance from one calendar year to the next... the Psalmist indicates that wisdom is found in lingering a bit on that topic. Doing so we may find the end of the year to be an opportune time once again to find our heart's rest in our God of



forgiveness. We need not continue to look back with regret over what might be left unaccomplished in the past year. And we have every reason to look ahead to what is coming in the new year! Our God restores us and reconciles us to Himself time and time again. Every morning gifted by God is a morning to find satisfaction in God's "unfailing love, that we may sing for joy and be glad all our days" (90:14). This new year will bring

The Christmas Store

Many thanks to our generous congregation! This year, we collected double the amount of toys compared to 2024. The donations filled a huge Econline van and 2 SUVs. The Christmas Store operated December 12-13. The Human Care Committee thought you might like to know how it works, so we share with you the description from United Church at 820 East Williams Street (Hwy. 55) in Apex, North Carolina:

Once the Christmas Store begins and clients arrive, they are greeted, checked in for their appointment, and treated to holiday music, decorations and refreshments with the help of volunteers. Free childcare is provided by volunteers for clients who bring their children. The children will visit with Santa's helpers, hear the Christmas story, and enjoy crafts and games. Volunteers then assist clients in locating the toys for the particular age group and gender of each registered child. Clients have the opportunity to select three gifts for each child registered. When clients have finished shopping, volunteers wrap the toys. Once wrapping is completed, volunteers assist the clients in getting the gifts to their car, and picking up their children from care.

The book of Ruth tells an unforgettable tale of purity, faithfulness, innocence, loyalty, duty, and love. Yet it is set in dark times - during the period of the judges - which is best described as an era of political and religious decentralization, frequent warfare, moral decline, lawlessness, and spiritual apostasy. This is foreshadowed in the final verse of the book of Judges, which precedes Ruth, and tells us that "in those days there was no king in Israel. Everyone did what was right in his own eyes" (Judges 21:25).

Against this backdrop of strife and chaos, Ruth is a story of ordinary people making the most of their bad situation and finding God in the midst of it. The book of Ruth corrects the belief that our lives must be extraordinary to be useful. Whether our circumstances are difficult, seemingly mundane, or somewhere in between, God is always working His purposes out. Throughout this study, we will learn to be still and explore how God's loving hand is working in our lives - even in the midst of life's humdrum, routine events.

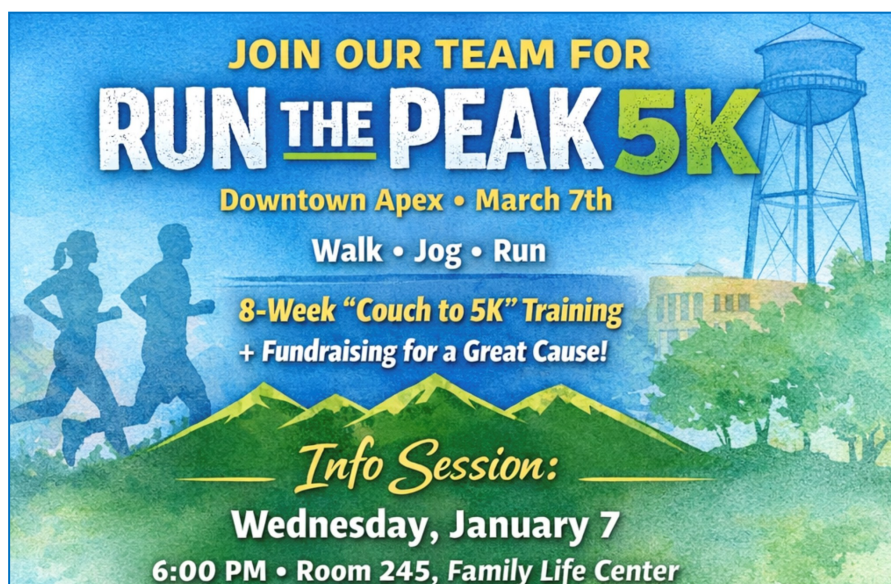
Stewardship of Life & Health

Remembering Hope: Supporting Families Facing Dementia

Dementia is a journey marked by uncertainty, loss, and profound change — not only for those diagnosed, but also for their families and caregivers. As memory fades and daily life becomes more challenging, the emotional and spiritual toll can be overwhelming. Yet, in the midst of this struggle, there is hope and help. Drawing from Dr. Benjamin Mast's book, *Second Forgetting*, and the compassionate work of Stephen Ministers, we find practical ways to support families walking through dementia.

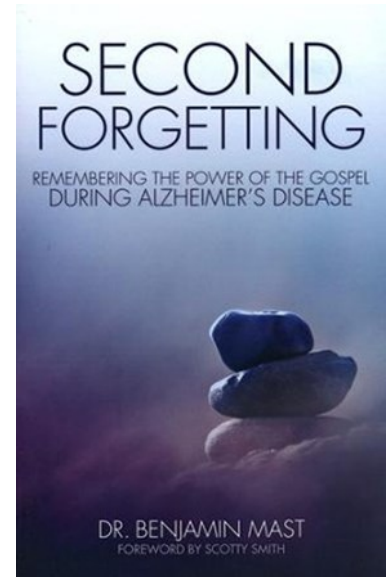
Dementia, including Alzheimer's disease, gradually erodes memory, identity, and independence. Dr. Mast describes the "first forgetting" as the cognitive decline experienced by the person with dementia. The "second forgetting," however, is a spiritual and emotional phenomenon in which family, friends, and even the church may "forget that God is present and lovingly caring for us, even when we are in the midst of great suffering."

This insight is crucial for caregivers and loved ones. The loss of identity and the fear of being forgotten can be as painful as the disease itself. Mast encourages families to remember that, even when memory fails, God does not forget His children. The gospel offers assurance, comfort, and hope — reminding us that our worth is not defined by our abilities, but by God's love.

Stephen Ministers can play an important role during these times as well. They are trained lay caregivers who provide confidential, Christ-centered support to people facing life's difficulties, including dementia. Their ministry is one of presence: listening, caring, encouraging, and praying with those who are hurting. For families dealing with dementia, Stephen Ministers can be a lifeline — offering emotional and spiritual support when it's needed most.

Dementia is a difficult journey, but families do not have to walk it alone. By remembering God's promises and offering compassionate, practical support, Stephen Ministers and churches can make a profound difference. As Dr. Mast reminds us, "We may forget, but God always remembers." In every moment — no matter how small — there is hope, dignity, and love.

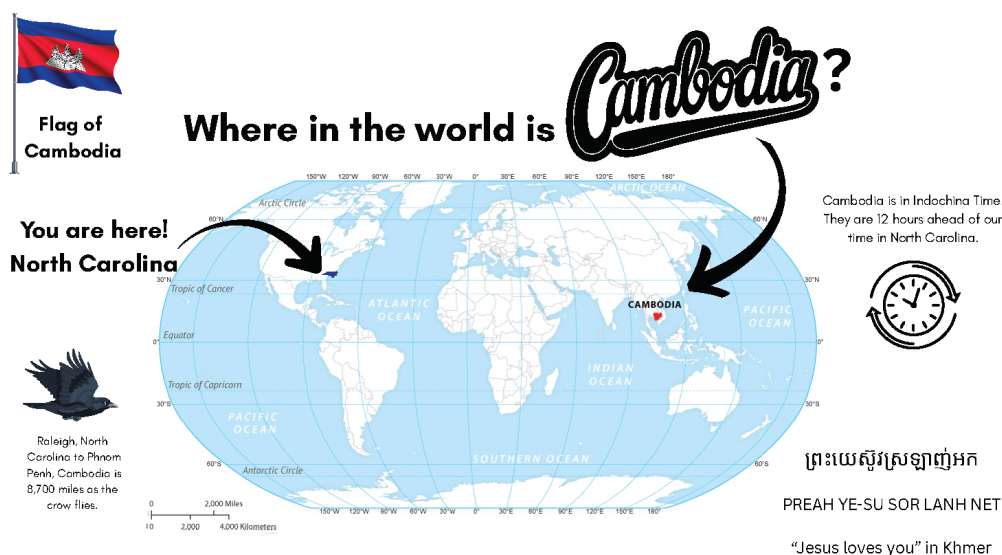

Elephants used to help build temples. Long ago, elephants were used to carry heavy stones and logs for big projects like Angkor Wat.



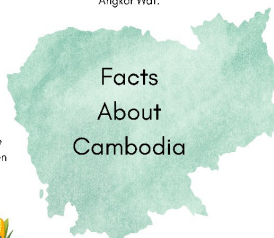
Bananas in Cambodia are tiny and sweet. They are shorter than the ones most kids in America see — and they're super tasty!

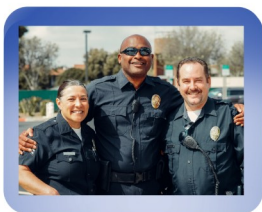
