The journey to Heaven is one of care and divine escort. Luke 16:22 tells us that angels carried Lazarus to Abraham's side. Angels are God's messengers and protectors, and they play a crucial role in our transition from this life to the next. Billy Graham once said, "Death for the Christian cuts the cord that holds us captive in this present evil world so that angels may transport believers to their heavenly inheritance."

Imagine the thief on the cross, who was promised by Jesus that he would be in Paradise that very day (Luke 23:43). It's comforting to think that Jesus Himself might have escorted him into God's presence. Angels are amazing creatures, and while they should not be worshipped, they should be respected as extensions of God's presence and work.

What Will Life Be Like When We Get There?

In Heaven, we will have recognizable physical bodies. Luke 16:23-24 describes the rich man in Hades seeing Abraham and Lazarus, indicating that we will retain our identities and be recognizable. We will also retain and grow in our knowledge. Luke 16:25, 27-28 shows that the rich man remembered his life on earth and his family, indicating that our memories and knowledge will continue to grow.

When we see God face to face, we will finally begin to understand how much He really loves us (1 Corinthians 13:8-13). We will retain our love for family and friends, and there is biblical evidence that they are in the presence of God praying for us (Romans 8:34, Revelation 6:9-10).

We will also retain our emotions and feelings. While there will be joy in Heaven, there will also be moments of grief until God wipes every tear from our eyes (Revelation 21:4). So, what does this mean for you? It means that you can have the assurance of Heaven by placing your faith in Jesus Christ. It means living a life that reflects that faith, loving God and loving others.
