Legacy Gifts money, values, or something bigger by Mike Overby, Elder of Finance



This being my third year as elder of Finance I had great hopes to again share some insightful thoughts built around financial lessons learned, past and present, which might serve as something to think

about plus being entwined with foundational biblical principles. To be honest, I've struggled to assemble something worthy of submitting to the newsletter this year. I've started, stopped, tossed out, and re-thought ideas over this month more than I care to admit. Nothing clear or coherent was coming to mind. So ... I took a break to refocus my energies. Actually, I took out the book Session is reading this year, "Strengthening the Soul of Your Leadership", and re-read the Foreword section. The contributor to this section of the book cites the need for "stillness" every day. Quoting from the book that hit home for me was that "In solitude and silence, we become aware of the inner needs and desires that we bring to the day. Then we can talk to God, our good and loving Father, about what it is we actually need for the day, asking for his wisdom, his guidance, his grace to prevail." For thirty minutes, with no other distractions at hand I went into this stillness. The time spent was less about me, this article, or my needs at the moment and turned more about the gifts God provides and values. Thus, the following reflects my thoughts crafted after this encounter with God that day in late May.

My guess is that most of us are thinking of inheritance or a large donation if we hear the words "legacy gift" being referenced. After all, money can be a gift. It can change a life, transform a family and be shared with the broader community that is named as a benefactor. In Proverbs 13:22, "A good person

leaves an inheritance for their children's children ...". Most of us might agree that planning for the day that we leave this world and transferring portions of what wealth we have acquired to our families, organizations/causes we treasure, or to our church, are prudent steps in stewarding those gifts God has given to us. That said, I believe in this verse God calls for something bigger.

After further thought on the above biblical concept of inheritance, my remaining time ventured toward what I might consider as worldly things I might be able to gift to others. This incorporates those values I believe in and have tried my best to share over the course of my life. Thoughts of; plan for the future but live for today, make memories, share family traditions and stories, work hard, learn to love and be kind, help those in need, all came to mind. You also may have other truths to add to this list. Share them with family and friends before it is too late. This said, I still believe God calls for something bigger.

Legacy gifts/values/action(s) are those that have the opportunity to make an enduring impact on those that follow us. Christians believe in doing things God's way, for his needs in our world, and to bless his people. In Psalm 78:4, "We will not hide them from their children, but tell to the coming generation the glorious deeds of the LORD, and his might, and the wonders that he has done." Simply put, sharing your faith quite possibly is the greatest gift to give and to transfer this legacy to others. Then, how best to do this? Find the time to venture into the 'Stillness' and solitude with God daily, he wants to hear your prayers, thoughts and desires.

Capital Campaign Update

In April 2023, West Hills engaged Church Development of Kansas City to conduct a Feasibility Study. The feedback we receive from the study will assess the readiness of West Hills for a Capital Campaign to address our much-needed maintenance issues and building updates.

A cross-section of the congregation will be interviewed in person at the church. The rest of the congregation will provide feedback via an online or written survey. Whether a person participates in an interview, online or paper survey, the feedback counts the same and will be vitally important for understanding the voice of our congregation and the direction God is leading us.

A summary of the study will be presented to the entire congregation through a newsletter. The Session will study the results and will discern how to proceed at their July meeting.

Keep it Fresh, Shed What's Dead! Judy Nelson, Stephen Leader Deacon

"Therefore ...let us also lay aside every weight, and sin, which clings so closely, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us..." Hebrews 12:1

Recently I was given a blooming plant full of purple blossoms. The care instructions made it seem like an ideal plant—"Full sun or shade; hardiness in zones 3-8; decoration only, do not consume; keep soil moist and remove faded flowers." The last instruction somehow made me think of the caring ministry of Stephen Ministers. People can thrive in many environments, but there are times in life that may cause our joy to wilt and leave us almost in despair. My little plant does not recognize, cannot see, what blooms have withered and need to be removed. But I can remove them because I have a different perspective than the plant!

Each of us has been challenged by a crisis, relationship issues, struggles, fears, or decisions. Perhaps a trusted friend or family member helped provide a different perspective or even gave advice. There are other times, however, that we may need a Stephen Minister.

A Stephen Minister is a trained Christian lay person committed to care for individuals going through a broad spectrum of circumstances that are challenging and perhaps overwhelming. The goal is restoration and wholeness, and to know the love of Christ which increases faith.

Here are some possible scenarios for Stephen Ministers to offer care:

- *A young wife is facing infertility issues or considering adoption
- *A single parent is laid off at work and doesn't have much hope of finding a good job
- *A single person new to the community is finding the adjustment difficult
- *A serious diagnosis has left a person feeling unable to navigate the path ahead
- *A man is having a tough time grieving and adjusting to life without his wife
- *Someone (of any age) is very lonely and feels there is no one who cares
- *An adult child suddenly needs to provide or find care for a parent who is seriously ill or is unable to function independently
- *A parent is worried about changes in their teen, or their graduate's departure for college

A Stephen Minister is a **Care Giver** on the journey with the care receiver to listen attentively, ask follow-up questions, provide encouragement and emotional support as the care receiver grows in their faith in God, the **Cure Giver**. When you request to be linked with a Stephen Minister, you will have the support of one who wants to help you sort out the complex issues, so you have confidence to shed the burdens that have been so heavy to carry. You need only let Pastor Andy, Heather, Dan O. or me know that you'd like your own Stephen Minister. You can also email info@whcomaha.org.

As a runner must be able to navigate the course without carrying anything extra, so we must, with God's help, (and perhaps with the encouragement and care of a Stephen Minister), lay aside whatever holds us back, that we may "run with endurance the race that is set before us."


When: The second Wednesday and the fourth Saturday of each month

"Hooray for Grandparents: Ideas for Keeping Close, Building Traditions, Creating Lasting Memories"


This book celebrates grandparents and the role they play in the lives of their grandchildren. You will find 50 ways to build relationships between the generations.
