God's Love Remains Our Heritage by Lisa Backer, Elder for Nominating



Tom and I were driving home from Colorado this past week, listening to a broadcast on legacy. Perhaps the chore of updating our wills or the recent milestones in our family's lives (30 years of

marriage and Michael's engagement to Lauren) have prompted us to be more attentive to this theme. We reflected on the legacies that our parents had left behind ... godliness, faithfulness, resilience, and generosity ... and gave thought as to what legacies we each might seek to leave in return.

The Scriptures refer to the word "heritage". A heritage is something that is possessed by one person and passed on to someone else who follows after. It represents those things that are worthy of preservation. While to the secular individual the word heritage may simply denote earthly or material possessions passed on through wills, trusts, and gifts, it has quite a different meaning to us as believers.

In the Bible you will find many verses that speak to the concept of heritage, such as Psalm 127:3 "Children are a heritage of the Lord" or Proverbs 13:22 "A good man leaves an inheritance to his children's children". For us in the family of God, it is the spiritual heritage that ultimately matters. It is the passing on of the heritage of the gospel, the teaching of God's Word and the upholding of the truths and principles reflected in the Scriptures in our everyday lives - both individually and as a body of believers - that constitute a true spiritual legacy.

Heritage helps us examine our history and traditions and enables us to weave that into an understanding and awareness of ourselves as we look into the future. In Psalm 16:6 the Psalmist declares that he has a delightful inheritance, that his boundary lines have fallen in pleasant places. As I reflect on the legacy of West Hills Church, I am reminded of this. Going back many decades, we have been blessed by a deep heritage of faith, marked by the bold preaching of the gospel, the faithful studying of God's Word and the purposeful living out of God's mission in the world. Woven into our fabric is a strong spiritual heritage of connectedness, of vision, and of determination to keep these goals as a legacy front and center in our choices.

As our Nominating Committee enters a new season of discernment this fall, we want to invite you to become a part of West Hills' legacy, to prayerfully explore how you may be called to join in leadership with us as we strive to live out our calling as faithful witnesses to God's love and redemptive grace. Ephesians 2:10 says, "For we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do". What might He have prepared for you to do this coming season? May you sense Him calling you into a deeper experience of the glorious inheritance that awaits those who fear and serve the Lord!


Psalm 51:10 - Create in me a pure heart, O God...

Capital Campaign is now in feasiblity study stage! **"Thank you!!"** to all who have participated in the survey process! The information provided is being assessed, and will be presented to Session at their July 18th meeting to move us forward to our next steps.

During June a 10-ton HVAC unit quit working. Bids were obtained, and Session approved the \$32,000 funding at a special meeting. The work to replace the unit is planned for July.

The last work to complete our new roof is planned for July. This will include submitting the final insurance documents for the remaining proceeds to cover the entire \$610,000 project.
