Last year, we celebrated the completion of two major Capital Campaign projects: the new Geneva Lounge and upper hallway carpeting, both warmly received, and the resurfaced West parking lot, completed just in time for a safer winter. Thanks to your generous giving, including some accelerated contributions, we accomplished these priorities in the Campaign's first year. However, limited funding deferred the East parking lot resurfacing to a future date.

Entering Year 2 this January, we anticipated lower contributions due to last year's accelerated giving. As expected, 2O25 Campaign receipts through September totaled \$1O8,6OO—below our initial projections— and we've continued to fund the critical Maintenance and Emergency Reserves, limiting resources for larger projects. Despite this, we've made significant progress:

- New Equipment:

- Window Maintenance: Volunteers caulked, sanded, and painted the worst West wing and Chapel windows to prepare for winter.
- New Signage: Improved signage has been placed at the outside doors.
- Enhanced Accessibility: A generous West Hills family donated a new chair lift for the North entrance stairway to the Fellowship Hall.

Unfortunately, an HVAC unit heating the office area requires replacement, drawing from the Emergency Reserve.

Looking ahead to 2026, the final year of our Campaign, we're excited about what your continued support can achieve. While not all original projects will be completed, we're on track to address top priorities and fully fund the Maintenance Reserve for the next three years. We are planning for needed window replacement, Fellowship Hall upgrading, parking lot resurfacing and Sanctuary improvements. These efforts will ensure that our building remains a vibrant space to glorify God and serve all who worship and gather here. The Building and Grounds Team extends heartfelt thanks to our volunteers for their Spring and Fall clean-up efforts and on-going maintenance work. Special gratitude goes to our Custodial Team — John Good, Ricardo Lopez, and Don Good- for their tireless dedication, and to the Building and Grounds Team for their invaluable time and advice.

Above all, thank you, West Hills family, for making these improvements possible. We look forward to even more progress together!

Our West Hills Caregiving Ministry Team has a special mission. Each December, the West Hills Caregiving Ministry Team is honored to continue the "Chili and Caroling" tradition. Our ministry is dedicated to caring for our church family members who can no longer attend worship in person, have special needs, or are unable to live independently. It is our calling to encourage and uplift those who are facing challenges during this season. Through this event, we remind our homebound members that they are never forgotten—they remain a vital part of our church body. By sharing the Good News of Christmas, we are all blessed in return.

Our primary goal is to gather and sing for those who may be experiencing difficulties this season. Caregiving Caroling is much more than just singing; it is about sharing fellowship, enjoying a meal, and celebrating the birth of Jesus with our church family. After a hearty bowl of chili or chicken noodle soup and some delicious treats, participants form groups and carpool to visit and

sing with our homebound members. All organized details are taken care of, so partcipants can simply come and enjoy the experience.



This event is open to all—regardless of age, musical talent, or role in the church. Whether you are part of the worship team or unsure if you can carry a tune, your participation is welcome! We never know how God will work through our "singing testimonies" to touch someone's heart. At every stop, Jesus is present in our caroling.

Children's involvement adds immeasurable joy to the event. We invite your children and grandchildren to sing, dance, "jingle some bells", and give out stockings, cards, and hugs. Their presence blesses not just our homebound friends, but also other residents we meet at care centers. The event is designed to be child-friendly and is truly enriched by the participation



of our youngest members. As one family shared, "The kids had a blast—my kids didn't want to stop after we were done and have asked numerous times when we can go

caroling again."

Since 2007, our event has included the cherished tradition of distributing handmade stockings. Linda Springsted introduced this idea, and each year she continues to create beautiful stockings, which are decorated by

the Wednesday and Thursday morning Bible study participants. These stockings, filled with special treats, never fail to bring a smile to our homebound friends.

How can you participate? To help with planning,



Narrative Grace: When Going Leads to Growing

A Storytelling Invitation for the West Hills Family

Faith has always been a story. From the first disciples who walked dusty roads telling others what they had seen and heard, to the quiet testimonies shared among friends today, our stories remind us that God is still at work — shaping, stretching, and surprising us through grace.

At West Hills Church, we believe faith doesn't just grow by listening or studying — it grows when we live it out. When we "go" in love, serve others, and let God transform us through those encounters. That's the heart behind Narrative Grace: a way for our church family to share the small, honest stories of how God shows up in everyday life.

These stories don't need to be perfect or dramatic. In fact, the most meaningful moments often come in the middle of life's uncertainty — when we take a step toward reconciliation, help a neighbor, or choose patience when it would be easier not to.

Why We're Doing This

Narrative Grace grew out of our church's vision, "Growing by Going: Casting Nets of Hope to a Hurting World." We recognize that spiritual growth doesn't happen in isolation. It happens through encounters — the times we act in love and discover that God was already there, waiting to meet us.

This initiative is about more than collecting stories; it's about deepening awareness. When we pause to reflect on our experiences, we begin to see God's fingerprints on moments we once overlooked. Each story becomes a mirror, helping us notice where grace entered in — through a conversation, a challenge, a failure, or a simple act of kindness.

What Happens When We Tell Our Stories

Something sacred happens when we put our experiences into words. As we speak them aloud, we begin to see them differently. We notice meaning where we once saw only confusion, and growth where we once saw struggle.

When we tell our stories, we give God's grace a name. We begin to recognize that the same Spirit who worked through us in the past is still working in us today. Reflection turns memory into understanding — and understanding into gratitude.

Telling our stories also strengthens our community. When we listen to one another, we realize that none of us are walking alone. The threads of our individual journeys weave together into a larger tapestry of grace — a shared witness that says, "God is faithful here, too."

How It Works

We're gathering short, real-life stories from

members of our West Hills family about times when going — stepping out in love led to growing in faith, patience, humility, or compassion.

Each story begins as a 20–30-minute conversation with a trained listener who helps you reflect on what happened and what God might have been doing in your heart. There's no need to prepare or perform; just come ready to talk. We'll take care of recording and editing, and you'll always get to review and approve the final version before it's shared.

Stories can be recorded in the new church studio or over Zoom, whichever works best for you.

Once completed, they'll be shared:

- During worship, as part of our community reflection.
- In small groups, where stories invite discussion and connection.
- Online or in future newsletters, allowing others to listen, reflect, and be encouraged.

Over time, these stories will become a living archive — a portrait of who we are as a community and how God's grace continues to unfold among us.

Why It Matters

Grace rarely appears in the tidy parts of life. It lives in the trying, the listening, and the showing up again. Sharing these stories helps us see that God's work is ongoing — not just in the big, triumphant moments, but in the small, faithful ones that shape our hearts little by little.

By participating in Narrative Grace, you help build a culture of testimony and encouragement — one where we recognize that God is writing our stories through each other.

How You Can Take Part

- 1. Pray and Reflect. Think of a time when you reached out in love and noticed God working in you whether or not it went as planned.

- 3. Invite others. If someone's story has inspired you, encourage them to share it.
- 4. Review and Approve. You'll always hear your final story before it's shared.
- 5. Celebrate Together. Listen, reflect, and give thanks as we see how God is working in and through our West Hills family.

In the End

Narrative Grace is more than a project — it's a spiritual rhythm of reflection and gratitude. It invites us to pause, remember, and tell the truth

about how grace meets us in the everyday.

When we tell our stories, we remember who God has been — and we begin to see who He's still calling us to become.

Because when we go in love, we grow in grace.

Story Reflection: An Examen of Grace in Your Journey

Take a few quiet moments to rest in God's presence:

- Recall a moment when you reached out
 to help, to listen, or to reconcile.
- 2. Notice how God was present in that moment. What was stirring in your heart?
- 3. Reflect on what you discovered about God's patience, compassion, or faithfulness.
- 4. Recognize how that experience shaped or stretched your faith.
- 5. Give Thanks for the grace hidden in both the effort and the outcome.

Grace often meets us not in perfection, but in participation — in the simple willingness to go and love.

If a story comes to mind, we'd love to hear it.
