Generosity in Action By Chris Neil; Elder of Stewardship

As I approach the last few months of serving as Stewardship Elder, I am filled with a profound sense of gratitude for the experience. It has been a privilege to serve alongside and learn from other elders and church staff, all of whom are such faithful servants.

It has been an incredible journey and so encouraging to reflect on God's faithfulness and your generosity as you steward the gifts God has given you by faithfully funding the ongoing operations of the church while also contributing to the capital campaign that started in 2O24. \$530,000 or 60% of capital campaign pledges have been received to date as we pass the halfway point of the three-year campaign.

How exciting it has been to see our facility and grounds refurbished and upgraded! Capital campaign funds have been used for new carpet in the Geneva Lounge, a resurfaced west parking lot, a new stove and freezer for the kitchen, new windows, and maintenance and emergency reserve accounts have been bolstered.

As contributions continue to flow in, projects on deck include replacing more windows on the west side of the building (Fall 25), east parking lot repairs (Fall 25), and upgrades to ceiling tiles and lighting in the Fellowship Hall (25/26). The projects that have been completed and the ones on deck are consistent with the priorities the

congregation set forth during the capital campaign planning process. We will proceed with the next projects as funds are available.

I encourage you to review your pledge commitment and consider making additional contributions as the year comes to a close. Like those who invested in the facility before

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us, how exciting it is to see our facility improved and enhanced for successive generations. Thank you for your continued generosity and support of West Hills Church.

One of my favorite verses about giving is 2 Corinthians 9:7 which says, "Each of you should give what you have decided in your heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. And God is able to bless you abundantly, so that in all things and at all times, having all that you need, you will abound in every good work."

The first part of the verse emphasizes personal intention. Paul signals that giving should be carefully and prayerfully considered; it should be based on an internal decision-making process. Paul's words also remind us that it goes beyond the act of giving; it speaks to our attitude and motivation behind our actions. Generous giving can transform us when it comes from a place of joy and a happy heart. Not only does our generosity help others in need, but it uplifts us.

I am grateful to be part of a congregation who recognizes stewardship is not solely about financial giving. Stewardship is more about the posture of your heart and spiritual growth than money. West Hills has always believed that when we focus on God and follow Him, we experience His love which leads us to show generosity and be joyful givers.

As we approach Stewardship Sunday on November 9th, I encourage you to reflect on the resources and abundance God has given you and prayerfully consider how you might best use your time, talents and treasures in God's service.

Deep Dive into Generations By Les Peterson; Congregational Care

West Hills Church is all about bringing different generations together. We want to bridge the gaps between age groups by encouraging understanding and respectful conversations. This article talks about the unique traits and religious views of seven different generations, offering tips on how to create unity and effective communication within the church community.

- Intergenerational vibe: West Hills is big on including all ages in worship and activities, showing their commitment to growing together as a diverse community.
- Generation gap: This term became popular in the 6Os and 7Os, highlighting the differences in beliefs and experiences between age groups. I want to share a personal story about family tension over cultural symbols. I was ten years old when my brother came home from college for the first time with a bumper sticker popular at the time. It was a peace sign. It was 1967, during the height of Vietnam war and campus unrest. I experienced firsthand the generation gap; my father was not happy with bumper stickers. Our Dad told my brother to remove it before he even said Hi son, glad you are home. What I did not realize is that this encounter changed their relationship for a very long time.
- Seven generations: Each generation is shaped by historical and cultural events, giving them distinct worldviews and influences on faith and society.
- Greatest Generation (1901–1927): These folks are known for their perseverance through tough times like the Great Depression and WWII, with a strong emphasis on formal religious practices.
- Silent Generation (1928–1945): Raised during global conflicts, they contributed to civil rights and cultural advancements, characterized by resilience and modesty.
- Baby Boomers (1946-1964): Marked by social change and optimism, boomers value in-person fellowship and see the church as a place for worship and community relationships.
- Younger generations: Millennials and Gen
 Z engage with religion through digital tech
 and social justice, often viewing the church
 as a movement rather than a building, with
 new forms of worship like online services.
- Cross-generational dialogue: This article emphasizes active listening, empathy, inclusive language, patience, and focus

on shared values to foster respectful conversations and strengthen relationships within the church.

Here are some practical tips for having effective cross-generational conversations:

- Practice Active Listening: Give the other person your full attention, avoid interruption, and try to understand their point of view before responding. Ask open-ended questions to encourage sharing and clarify any misunderstandings. This approach shows respect for their beliefs and fosters a supportive environment.
- 2. Show Empathy and Respect: Acknowledge the emotional significance that faith may hold for your conversation partner. Even if you disagree, respect their beliefs and experiences. Avoid dismissive language or making assumptions about their values.
- Use Inclusive Language: Words matter. Use language that is inclusive and avoids jargon or terminology that may not be familiar or comfortable. Explain your view clearly and be open to learning new perspectives or terms.
- 4. Focus on Shared Values: Emphasize the common values you share with the other person. This can help build a stronger connection and understanding.
- Be Patient and Open-Minded: Allow time for reflection and avoid pressuring anyone to accept your viewpoint. The goal is dialogue, not debate.
- Maintain Relationships: Ensure that your conversations do not negatively impact your relationship. Avoid interactions that could cause long-term tension or conflict.
- 7. Express Gratitude: Let the other person know that you appreciate their presence and are interested in building a stronger relationship with them.
- 8. Recognize Individuality: Remember that everyone is unique, even within generational groups. Our shared faith tells us that we are all children of God, saints, and sinners.

By following these tips, you can foster respectful and meaningful conversations across generations within your church community.



Book Suggestions By Debbie Chadwick

The book "Compassion: A Reflection on the Christian Life" was initially published in 1982, by three Catholic priests.

They began the book while meeting in a Greek restaurant in Washington D.C. That was the first of nine meetings where "Compassion" was looked at in regard to



today's society. Occasionally they invited others; priests, sociologists, state senators, and religious sisters to provide their input.

According to doubleday.com, the authors looked at the following three questions.

- 1. Where do we place compassion in our lives?
- 2. Is it enough to live a life where we hurt one another as little as possible?
- 3. Is our guiding ideal a life of maximum pleasure and minimum pain? Compassion says "no."

The authors believe that, "Compassion is no longer merely an eraser of human mistakes, but is a form of prayer and action — the expressions of God's love for us and our love for God and one another."

In the conclusion of the book the authors site Revelation 21:1-4. They believe these verses guide us. "This vision makes us share one another's burdens, carry our crosses together, and unite for a better world."


September 2025 Session Notes
