
- P Being admonished to receive the sacrament in a worthy manner, prepare your hearts for reception of this sacrament by giving answer to the questions I will now ask you:
 - Do you believe that you are a sinful person without hope of eternal life except for God's mercy?
- Yes, I know and believe that I am a sinner and that God has mercy on sinners for Christ's sake.
- **P** Who is Christ and what has He done for you that you trust in Him?
- Christ is the only begotten Son of God, who came down from heaven, was born of the Virgin Mary, and is my Savior and the Savior of the entire world. He died on the cross and shed His blood for me, and for all, for the forgiveness of sins.
- **P** Do you believe that the true body and blood of Jesus are in, with and under the bread and wine of the sacrament and that He is present there to bless and forgive you?
- Yes. I believe what Jesus said: "Take, eat, this is my body which is given for you." And "Drink of it, all of you, this cup is the new testament in my blood which is shed for you for the forgiveness of sins."
- **P** Why do you wish to receive the sacrament?
- First, because Christ urges me to come, saying, "Do this in remembrance of me." Second, so that I may learn to believe that Christ, out of great love, died for my sin. And finally, that I may also learn from Him to love God and my neighbor.
- **P** Do you repent of all sin and desire with the help and aid of the Holy Spirit, to lead a godly life?
- Yes, I desire to be rid of my sin and want to do better. I pray for God to renew me, and help me to live a life worthy of the calling I have received.
- May the Almighty and merciful God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, by His Holy Spirit accomplish this in you.

 Our Lord Jesus has given this sacrament to His Church, to bless all who in faith look to Him for forgiveness and salvation. Come now and receive the Lord's gifts offered to you in this holy sacrament for the forgiveness of your sins and the strengthening of your faith.




Proper Preface







Christ Jesus has already become that redemption (1 Corinthians 1:30), and such compassion to the neighbor lifts us up to stand alongside God Himself (Micah 6:8).

FRANZ AUGUST OTTO PIEPER

Teacher and Leader in the Church

BORN: JUNE 27, 1852 Karwitz, Pomerania, Germany

DIED: JUNE 3, 1931 Saint Louis, Missouri

RANZ PIEPER WAS ONE OF THE MOST SIGNIFICANT LEADERS IN THE HISTORY OF THE LCMS during its first century, serving both as president of Concordia Seminary, St. Louis (1887–1931), and Synod president (1899–1911). Born in northern Germany, Pieper emigrated to the U.S. in 1870 with his widowed mother and several brothers. The family settled in Watertown, Wis., where Franz attended a Wisconsin Synod college for men preparing for the pastoral ministry. Since the Wisconsin Synod did not have its own seminary at the time, Pieper was trained at Concordia Seminary in St. Louis (CSL), after which he served as pastor of Wisconsin Synod congregations in Centerville and Manitowoc, Wis.

1878 was a turning point in Pieper's life, when he was called as professor of theology at CSL. There he taught and worked under Seminary President C.F.W. Walther. Eventually, Pieper would succeed Walther as president of the school.

Pieper committed himself to theological education. One of his students recalled that in the classroom, he was "a great teacher, a sound theologian, a true Lutheran, a sincere Christian" (Theodore Graebner, *Dr. Francis Pieper: A Biographical Sketch*, 58).

In addition to teaching seminary students biblical and doctrinal theology, Pieper quickly began to work as a writer and essayist. He wrote numerous articles for seminary and Synod publications. He was a regular presenter of essays at theological conferences and at district and national conventions. He was a key defender of the Synod's doctrinal position in the controversy over predestination and election in American Lutheranism starting in the 1880s.

Pieper was a strong supporter of home and foreign mission work, serving on boards and committees to promote the work of bringing the Gospel to the world. His work in doctrinal theology made Pieper a leading voice in the LCMS and he was elected Synod president in 1899, a position he held for 11 years even while he served as professor and president at Concordia Seminary.

The culmination of his work as a theologian was the publication of his three-volume *Christliche Dogmatik* (1917–1924), later translated into English as *Christian Dogmatics*. He began the work as he was convalescing after serious illness; he started by writing on the doctrine of Christ.

Pieper's *Dogmatics* became the standard theological textbook for the Synod's seminaries even into the present time and has helped to maintain a strong Lutheran confessional basis in the Synod for over a century.

Pieper's legacy as a teacher, theologian and seminary and church administrator will not be soon forgotten in the Synod to which he dedicated himself in service.
