A Note about the Music Offered in Worship Today

The Requiem Mass developed over a span of many centuries into its present liturgical form, stemming from pre-Christian-era Jewish prayers that the souls of the just might have eternal rest. Its function is to be offered in memory of all the faithful departed, particularly on All Souls' Day (November 2), but also on the anniversary of one's death (this is within Roman Catholic custom). It differs from the Burial Mass in that Communion is not a part of it (however, for our purposes and customs here, we celebrate the Eucharist as symbolic of all – living on earth or in heaven – partaking in the feast Christ prepared and hosts).

The texts that comprise the Requiem Mass mostly are petitions for the souls of the departed and for us living to receive mercy, redemption, and eternal life in heaven. In Duruflé's setting, the words of fear about eternal life in hell, though remarkable in image, are minimal. In fact, unlike Mozart and Verdi, Duruflé does not set the vast majority of the "Sequence," choosing only its last plea, the heart-rending "Pie Jesu." I have provided specific text-source references where possible, utilizing the work of Ron Jeffers in his *Translations and Annotations of Sacred Choral Music, Volume 1: Sacred Latin Texts.* The other texts were developed as antiphons or responses, though the "In paradisum" comes from the Roman Catholic Burial Rite (it is important to note that the reference to Lazarus in this text is to the poor Lazarus in the parable told by Jesus in Luke 16:19-31, not the Lazarus whom Jesus raised from the dead [as conveyed in John 11]).

Musically, we begin this morning with a piece Duruflé likely would have known well: the "Cantabile" by César Franck, written for the opening of the organ installed in a hall at the Trocadéro in Paris (the plaza across the Seine from the Eiffel Tower). In Franck's music, one finds form and melody to be paramount, highlighted by the use of canon and a propensity for the third iteration of an idea to be the impetus to lead to something new.

At the age of 17, Duruflé, a native of Rouen, moved to Paris to begin studies with and assist Charles Tournemire, who was Franck's successor at Ste. Clothilde (a neo-Gothic minor basilica near the current Rodin Museum and the Orsay). In 1920, Duruflé began studies at the Paris Conservatory, and, in 1927, Louis Vierne nominated him to become his assistant at Notre-Dame. Duruflé was named organist of St. Etienne-du-Mont (just behind the northeast corner of the Pantheon) in 1929, remaining there until mid-1975, when the injuries he sustained in an automobile accident limited his ability to perform.

Duruflé's music, with its use of Gregorian chant (you will hear quite a bit of it in the Requiem, and then again in the organ postlude – based upon the Pentecost chant, *Veni Creator Spiritus*) and Impressionist and late-Romantic inspired harmonies, along with emphasis on form, canon, and melody (akin to Franck), provided him a north star by which to navigate the tremendous changes – musical, liturgical, political, and societal – that came to define the twentieth century.

In putting pen to paper and having his works published, Duruflé shared his life's map – his journey – with us. As we remember the faithful departed this day, we recall their journeys and give thanks for what they imparted to us. We mourn their absence from our lives, yet look forward, in Christian hope, to our reunion with them in the life to come.

Guest Organist

Larry Allen is Director of Music and Organist Emeritus of Mt. Lebanon Lutheran Church in Pittsburgh, Penna. He received his Bachelor of Music degree from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro and his Master's degree in Sacred Music at Union Theological Seminary in New York City, where he was a student of Alec Wyton. He did further study in Paris with Marie-Claire Alain, receiving the *Premier Prix* in organ performance from the Conservatoire de Rueil-Malmasion.

Prior to his move to Pittsburgh, Larry served the Immanuel Congregational Church in Hartford, Conn., as its Director of Music and Organist from 1974 to 2004. He also was head of the organ department at the Hartt School of Music of the University of Hartford from 1992-2004.

In Pittsburgh, Larry has been Dean of the local chapter of the American Guild of Organists (AGO) and was the Chairperson of the AGO's 2015 Mid-Atlantic Regional Convention. He is the organist for the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra, with whom he has performed the Saint-Saens "Organ Symphony" and has recorded the Strauss "Alpine Symphony" and the Mozart *Requiem*.


