


The Requiem by Maurice Duruflé

In Worship on November 2 (All Saints' Sunday)

Plan to worship on November 2 (All Saints' Sunday), as we will remember those who have left this temporal life and now rejoice eternally in God's presence. The Chancel Choir will sing the Requiem Mass, as set in 1947 by Maurice Duruflé, who served as organist of the Church of St. Etienne-du-Mont in Paris from 1929 to 1975, at which point injuries he sustained in an automobile accident prevented him from playing regularly. Duruflé's music here in the Requiem is based on Gregorian melodies coupled to harmonies that are infused with impressionism, mysticism, and – dare I say(!) – a bit of jazz. The result is a work that evokes tremendous spiritual comfort and hope.

The two soloists, bass-baritone Vladimir Avetisian and mezzo-soprano Zoe Brooks, are section leaders singers in the Chancel Choir. Organist Larry Allen will be with us, sharing his quite-unmatched expertise and artistry with this piece (it's possible Larry has played the monumental organ part – the composer's own transcription of the original full-orchestra version – some 25 or more times!). Larry, a long-time friend of mine, served for 30 years as the Director of Music and Organist of the Immanuel Congregational Church in Hartford, Conn. He now lives in Pittsburgh, Penna., where he is organist for the Pittsburgh Symphony.

The Opening Word

If we took a poll and asked everybody what their favorite month of the year is, I'm not sure November comes up anywhere near the top. A quick chat with Al appears to confirm that. Those we remember are not saints because of their perfection, but saints because they are beloved by God and, in some way – their own unique way – they have shown us a path forward in faith and faithfulness. In them, as in every person, there was the image of God, shining through.

All Saints' Sunday will be special this year for two reasons. For me personally, my father's name will be on that list – a man who, in his medical practice, community service, and everyday ways, showed me a life devoted to the care of others and this world. In a culture that isn't great about talking about death, where we are supposed to get over grief, bring closure, and move on with life, it is helpful to name and remember our saints.

In addition, on All Saints Sunday this year, we will mark that day with a very special music program – the Durufle Requiem. You will not want to miss this special day of worship.



At the end of the month, we will just dip our toes into Advent and the hustle and bustle of the Christmas season. But before we do, there is Thanksgiving. Yes, it is a personal favorite - a rare holiday that isn't a working holiday for clergy. But instead, it's a day for all of us to pause and to look around - to slow down for a time and take stock of our many blessings. We live such fast-forward lives, always seeking to improve and grow. But how important it is to stop for a moment and simply be grateful – to look back over a year and name the places where God has shown up. To name the people – the saints – who have been a blessing to us. To name the simple things for which we are grateful.

It may be odd, but one of the reasons I like November is that once the leaves are down, we can see into the forests and through the trees that surround us and get a better glimpse of the landscape of the world. May we all do so this month as we see through the busyness and name our many blessings, past and present.





All Souls Community Center

All Souls Community Center Update



We are pleased to announce the recent sale of our All Souls Community Center in Port Chester to the Rye YMCA.

RPC acquired the facilities at 45 and 55 Parkway Drive in March 2022 as an incredibly generous gift from the members of the All Souls Parish—The Presbyterian Church of Port Chester—upon its dissolution in December 2021. This included a sanctuary, three floors of classrooms, and a manse next door. Our goal in acquiring the property was to serve as a steward of this property so it would be used for mission and ministry within Port Chester. That summer, we renamed the property the All Souls Community Center. The facility has housed Five Steps to Five, a nonprofit educational bilingual program supporting immigrant families; the village of Port Chester summer camp; two worship groups; EarthCare; Meals on Main Street, preparing meals for the hungry; and Food to Grow On, which packages lunches for Port Chester students weekly.

The village of Port Chester has been identified as a "childcare desert," with a severe and urgent shortage of care for low and moderate income preschool children. In mid-2023, we approached the Rye Y, whose scope for early childcare has been expanded to include Port Chester. In addition to Rye, the Y runs a childcare center in Mamaroneck. The YMCA has provided considerable financial assistance to Port Chester families in need through a scholarship program to attend their program in Rye. By the end of 2023, we signed an agreement with them to create a full-time, licensed childcare center at the All Souls location to serve 103 children ages 3 months to 6 years old. When it opens, the facility will increase the number of childcare slots in Port Chester by 66% and will serve as a lifeline for families to maintain employment and break the cycle of poverty. The sale closed in late July, and the new center is projected to open in the fall of 2027. The manse was sold to Heather and John Miller in early 2025 upon his retirement as copastor at RPC.

Seventy-five percent (75%) of the sale proceeds will be invested into affordable tuition scholarships for children of Port Chester residents. Twenty-five percent (25%) will be governed by the original agreement with the Hudson River Presbytery, with 10% going to HRP and the balance, along with cash and investments, into special funds for outreach initiatives in the Port Chester community.

The Rye Y has begun a capital campaign to raise the construction funds necessary to complete the childcare center. In the meantime, since the closing, the Rye Y continues to provide space and support for the organizations serving the Port Chester community.




DISCUSSION WITH AUTHOR LISA A. PHILLIPS

About the Author: Lisa A. Phillips

Lisa A. Phillips has written about relationships, mental health, and teens for *The New York Times, The Washington Post, Longreads, Psychology Today, Cosmopolitan, Salon,* and other outlets. She teaches journalism and the popular "Love and Heartbreak" seminar at SUNY New Paltz. She's published two previous books: *Unrequited: The Thinking Woman's Guide to Romantic Obsession* and *Public Radio: Behind the Voices.* Phillips began her journalism career in public radio, working for radio stations in the Midwest and Northeast for more than a decade. A member of the Jewish Congregation of Woodstock, she lives in the Hudson Valley — where she and Cari became friends through a shared book club.

About First Love: Guiding Teens Through Relationships and Heartbreak

Today's young people are beginning their love lives in a time of rapidly changing ideas and ideals about identity, commitment, sexuality, and consent. For parents, the new realities of teenage relationships can be both mystifying and daunting.

In First Love, Lisa A. Phillips chronicles the challenges today's adolescents face as they navigate experiences of crushes, dating, and breakups—and the challenges adults face as they strive to provide guidance and support. Phillips sheds light on how the relationships teens have today are different from their parents' generation, including their reliance on technology and social media, the rise of young people identifying as LGBTQ+, high rates of depression and anxiety, and consent consciousness. She provides concrete strategies and insights from experts and teens themselves on ways parents and other adults can help young people cope with the timeless issues of love and heartbreak.


