

# The Opening Word

Franciscan Priest Richard Rohr traces the trajectory of the Christian movement from its earliest days until now:

In 1st century Israel-Palestine, Jesus and the early church offered people an intimate experience of community, service, worship, and prayer. Followers of the Way, as the new Christians were called, gathered in homes by groups known as *ekklesias*—which became house churches for those learning to practice the faith.

From there, the movement moved to Greece, where it became a **philosophy**, taking the place of other ancient systems of thought. Once it moved to Rome and Constantinople, it became organized **religion**—endorsed by the official government regime. Next it spread throughout Europe, where it became the **culture**. And finally, it moved to North America, where it became – wait for it – a **business**.

Is this oversimplification? Overly cynical or pessimistic? Perhaps.

But Rohr makes the case that the original desire or need for a Jesus-experience was all but lost along the way. Experience, philosophy, organized religion, culture, and business—in each of those permutations and iterations, Christianity was seen as being above criticism. It was simply the religion, the philosophy, the culture. We gave our authority, says Rohr, to emperors and kings and presidents instead of the Gospel, pretending Jesus was Lord, but not really meaning it.

However—and here is the grace of God: even inside of each of those iterations, misguided as they often were—and still are—there were humble, loving people who emerged in every one of those eras. There were monks, nuns, mystics, writers, artists, activists, teachers, preachers,

peasants, and nobles, whose lives witnessed to the true spirit of Christ. They pointed to the "upside down kingdom" of God that shines for the poor, the lost, and the least in society. A candle that burns bright for a fairer world and a more expansive table of love.

What does this have to do with December?

Toward the end of November, our Christian calendar marked "Christ the King Sunday," where we looked at how Jesus' reign differs from our earthly concepts of power and domination. On that last Sunday of the liturgical year, before the new year of Advent, our scriptures call attention to Christ on the cross and his message of humility, forgiveness, and second chances, his co-suffering with us in everything that brings us to our knees for help.

As we enter the Advent season—historically a time of penitence and self-examination, of almsgiving to the poor and quiet reflection, we prepare our hearts to receive the coming Christ child.

Advent—literally *arrival*—is so much more than shopping and decorating for Christmas. And so much less than the dozens of tasks we stack it with.

May we take a moment to reflect on the 2,000-year trajectory of the movement that bears Christ's name. May we pause to consider how we might return to the roots of shared meals, collective prayer, care for the poor in spirit and body, and the gifts of scripture and worship. May we listen to God's leading and open ourselves to a true Jesus experience.

Are you ready?

Thanks in part to support from this Offering, church workers can receive critical financial assistance to support them through life's challenging circumstances. These generous actions bear witness to our faithful response to God's charge to love one another as Christ commanded.

- \$1.1 million of gifts from the 2024 Offering are being used to provide critical financial support and grants for current and retired Presbyterian church workers in their times of need.
- Income supplements from the BOP helped nearly 261 individual recipients, assisting retired church workers and surviving spouses with the means to provide for themselves.

- Housing supplements from the BOP helped more than 1,366 individual recipients remain in their homes, afford assisted living, or long-term care.

### **Cantata Sunday**

December 14, 2025, at 10:00 a.m.

Plan to be in worship on Sunday, December 14, as the custom of "Cantata Sunday" continues! The Chancel Choir, with soloists from its ranks, and orchestra will offer the exuberant *Gloria* by Antonio Vivaldi. Running about 25 minutes, it is a setting of one of the liturgical canticles, the *Gloria* in excelsis. Its opening lines come from Luke 2:14: the angel's announcement to the shepherds.

Thirteen dedicated and compassionate members of our congregation have just completed the Caring Connections Training, equipping them to become Stephen Ministers and Friendly Visitors in our faith community. They can provide distinctively Christian one-to-one caring to those experiencing all kinds of life challenges.

In addition, the orchestra will offer the first movement of the *Oboe Concerto in D Minor* (op. 9, no. 2), by Tomaso Albinoni (a contemporary of Vivaldi, also living in Venice), and the "Rondeau" by Henry Purcell, made famous as the opening music in *The Young Person's Guide to the Orchestra*, by Benjamin Britten.

The holiday season can be a stressful time, especially for those experiencing recent losses, significant life changes, or feelings of loneliness and isolation. Stephen Ministers are available as a wonderful resource to provide compassionate, confidential, and nonjudgmental support—offering care, understanding, and the reassurance that no one has to face their struggles alone.






