## **Titus 1:6**

NASB/ESV - having children who **believe**, not accused of dissipation or rebellion.

LSB – having **faithful** children, who are not accused of dissipation, or rebellious.

#### **Titus 1:6**

The Greek term is *pistos* – can have a <u>passive</u> or <u>active</u> sense.

passive = 'faithful' -2 Tim 2:2 - faithful men active = 'believing' -1 Tim 6:2 - believers

#### Facts to consider:

- *pistos* is translated in the <u>passive</u> sense in MOST passages in the New Testament and rendered as 'faithful'
- whenever this term *pistos* is used to directly modify a <u>noun</u> in the NT, it is consistently translated *faithful* or *trustworthy*
- when the term is speaking of someone under authority...it is ALWAYS translated 'faithful'

- the qualifiers *dissipation and rebellion*...or *debauchery or insubordination*...don't fit someone who is a believer
- dissipation and rebellion seem to apply to OLDER children...even though in both 1 Tim 3 and Titus the same Greek term teknon is used to describe children. So no definite distinction is made by Paul in the two passages. However, the verb 'having' in both passages implies that these children are still 'possessed' by the father I.e... are IN HIS HOME.
- The requirement that the children be *saved* introduces a huge element of subjectivity. Saving faith can often be very difficult to discern and determine in children.

- If this includes adult children out of the home, how do we verify their salvation?
- Interpreting this as referring to 'saved' children breaks the <u>present tense</u> pattern of these qualifications.
- Why would Paul leave this very high standard out of the qualifications for elders in the church at Ephesus when writing to Timothy?
- Theologically, salvation is a supernatural act of God. The fact is even the <u>best</u> Christian father cannot <u>guarantee</u> that his children will be born again.

The weight is on the side of translating this as *faithful* children.

**Prov 16:18** – Pride goes before destruction, and a haughty spirit before stumbling
