

From the Pastors

I've spent the last year or so writing out and devotionally exploring tensions in Christian life. Faithful discipleship is full of them! Law vs. Gospel, Reason vs. Emotion, Faith vs. Works... Like the deity and humanity of Jesus, these are not simple either-or's so much as they are complex both-and's. Faith saves, not works, but faith leads us to work. We are a Gospel people, and we do not submit to the law, but as Paul says, we are "under the law of Christ." Reason and emotion can both steer you astray, but we are to worship the Lord with our whole person, reason and emotion included. This newsletter will be an introduction to one more of those tensions—the most recent one I'ved added to this list. I'm calling this one "Vocation vs. Service."

One of Martin Luther's great emphases was that the Christian need not become a monk or nun to live a life which is pleasing to God. Many in his day believed that monks and nuns lived the most pious possible life, but Luther and a number of his contemporaries said, "No!" A Christian shoemaker could be very pious simply by making good shoes. That shoemaker was fulfilling their vocation—the calling God had for them. If they made shoes for humans to the best of their ability, as if they were making those same shoes for the Lord, they were being very pious! If you knew their heart, you would see that they were fulfilling their vocation. They were doing everything they did to the glory of God. This great rediscovery transformed medieval Europe. Monks and nuns left the cloister, became married, had kids, and lived faithful lives in a myriad number of different occupations and roles. "Normal people" lived lives of renewed urgency and meaning; they had vocations.

But this doesn't explain how this might be a tension. The tension comes in the fact that it's possible to take this too far. Imagine if a Christian went all-in on their vocations: they were the best father, best husband, best employee, best neighbor, best friend they could possibly be. Would they have much time for anything else? I'd bet they wouldn't!

Honestly, to be the best at any one of these things, they will likely be short-changing all the others. The man who wants to be the head-coach of his son's football team can do so to the detriment of his work and even his relationship to that son. The woman who starts a side hustle as a hobby for a little extra income can become consumed by it, to the detriment of her many other opportunities. Especially because we call them vocations, it can be easy to take it too far, and only realize it when we're in too deep. "I'm serving the Lord! It's only natural that I pour my heart and soul into ______." And what about our obligations to the church? I fear that many in our culture today struggle with this tension more than they like to admit. They've gone all-in on a handful of their vocations, leaving no room for their other vocations or their service to the church. Or they've gone all-in on their service to the church, leaving no room for their many other vocations! Doing everything to the glory of God means not slacking in any one thing. We may want to go all-in on just one or two vocations, but God gives us responsibilities in each of our vocations.

Therein lies the tension. Each vocation and role of service has its own pull, its own weight, its own obligation. How do we navigate these well? No one can answer that for you; your vocations are your own. But we have one thing in common. We do it all under the grace of God. When we mess up—and we will—we return to the cross for the forgiveness he alone can offer!

Upcoming Lighting Project in the Sanctuary

Executive Director

From Your Executive Director

May is an exciting time in our community. Graduations from schools, Mother's Day, a little race called the Indy 500, and most exciting of all, May 7^{th} , when we in the LC-MS commemorate C.F.W. Walther. I don't want to denigrate two other commemorations immediately before him in May: on the 4^{th} for Friedrich Wyneken, who was instrumental in the growth of the Lutheran faith in Indiana or on the 5^{th} for Frederick the Wise, who was Luther's protector in 1521 and 1522. But without Walther, there likely would not be a Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod.

Walther was one of several faithful Lutherans who left Saxony Germany in 1838, led by Martin Stephan. They were opposed to the Prussian Union and wanted to remain adherent to Luther's preaching. Three ships sailed from Germany. Two ships arrived in New Orleans, with the other lost at sea. The Germans traveled up the Mississippi to Perry County, Missouri, and formed a settlement near St. Louis. Stephan, as leader, was named bishop of the settlement – but soon afterwards was removed from that position after being accused of both sexual misconduct and embezzlement. He was excommunicated and banished from the settlement. (For all the lurid details, read "Zion on the Mississippi" by Walter Forester)

A leader stepped forth from the void created by Stephan's banishment: Walther. Under his direction, the settlement stabilized, and beginning in 1844 discussion was held with these immigrants and two other groups, led by pastors Wilhelm Löhe and Wyneken, about a new confessional Lutheran church body. In 1847 these discussions came to fruition with 14 congregations forming what was known as the German Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Missouri, Ohio and Other States, and Walther was elected the inaugural president of this new church body. Under his leadership, the synod grew. And not only was he president of the synod, but he also assisted in founding a college that eventually became Concordia Seminary, serving as it's first president until his death. One of his more important contributions was the transcription of series of lectures he gave in at the seminary, "The Proper Distinction Between Law and Gospel," which our pastors still use today.

Consider for a moment the background of our church body: the early affairs of the Synod and the church services were conducted in German, and it wasn't until World War One that English became the language of the synod – almost 70 years after its founding.

Yes, our church body was founded by immigrants. Now, look around our community. We have the largest concentration of Burmese immigrants in the United States. We have a large Hispanic community. We have a growing number of immigrants from various African countries. We have our Tamil community. All who, just like our ancestors, are strangers in a strange land. How are we helping them assimilate? How are we taking the good news of Christ to them? Are we inviting them to worship with us? Or are we casting them sideward glances, commenting on their struggles with English, and tossing them aside because many don't look the same as us? If so, certainly contrary to our Christian beliefs and possibly a sign that we have forgotten our ancestors had these very same struggles.

Let's remember Walther and those early immigrant Lutherans, looking for ways to welcome our immigrant community to Calvary – and live up to our words that we Engage People In Christ, just as we preach Christ Crucified.

IREAD 3 Testing Results

We commend our students and teachers for an 83% pass rate on our recent IREAD 3 testing. The IREAD 3 test is given to third grade students that did not reach the pass cut line as a second grader. Only 7 students in our 3rd grade were required to take the test. This is indeed a team effort consisting of students, parents, and teachers. The instruction begins in our preschool sessions. We thank God for a student body eager to learn, parents supporting and partnering with the church and school, and teachers giving excellence each day. Second graders were given the option to take the IREAD 3 test during the 2023 spring testing window again. 65% of these students passed the IREAD 3 test. Job Well Done!!

National Day of Prayer – Thursday, May 4

Extravagant Sharing Changes

For many years Calvary has helped meet the needs of many families through the The Sharing Place of Lutheran Child and Family Services in Lawrence Township. Calvary's generous donations were always appreciated and provided support for needy families in that area of Indianapolis.

Beginning this month, our Extravagant Sharing donations will be taken to the Emmaus Lutheran Food Pantry at 1209 Linden Street.
