4. Read Luke 6:32-34. Jesus seems to make the same point 3 times in a row. What might this tell us about the standard to which He is calling His followers? What would you say is the secret to achieving such a high standard of loving our enemies? (See Colossians 1:29)

5. Read Luke 6:35-36. When it comes to "being kind to the ungrateful and the wicked," which would you say is the most difficult for you: Loving them, doing good to them, blessing them, or praying for them? Are any of these easier to do?

6. According to verse 35, what are some of the outcomes of living according to God's Kingdom values and priorities? (See also 1 Peter 3:9 and Ephesians 5:1-2)

7. How do you think loving our enemies relates to Romans 5:10 and Colossians 1:21-22?
