1. Read Isaiah 63:7. Personalize and paraphrase it by recounting what the Lord has done for you?
2. What does Isaiah 63:9 say about God's attitude as He disciplines His people?
3. From 63:15 through 64:12, we read Isaiah lamenting and interceding. He's asking questions of God, voicing His sorrows, and even complaining, while maintaining a posture of trust in the Lord. Have there been times of lament in your life? How has the Lord grown you in those seasons?
4. Read Philippians 2:12-13. How is our growth in Christ – our sanctification – a cooperative process between us and God?
5. How does God's description of eternity in Isaiah 65:17-25 impact our living today? What weight does it add to the prior warnings and appeals?
6. Read Isaiah 66:2b. Does this describe you? Why or why not?

They are backed up by His promise that this world will come to an end and He will create new heavens and a new.
