Exopus 17:1-7

From the wilderness of Sin the whole congregation of the Israelites journeyed by stages, as the Lord commanded. They camped at Rephidim, but there was no water for the people to drink. The people quarreled with Moses, and said, "Give us water to drink." Moses said to them, "Why do you quarrel with me? Why do you test the Lord?" But the people thirsted there for water; and the people complained against Moses and said, "Why did you bring us out of Egypt, to kill us and our children and livestock with thirst?" So Moses cried out to the Lord, "What shall I do with this people? They are almost ready to stone me." The Lord said to Moses, "Go on ahead of the people, and take some of the elders of Israel with you; take in your hand the staff with which you struck the Nile, and go. I will be standing there in front of you on the rock at Horeb. Strike the rock, and water will come out of it, so that the people may drink." Moses did so, in the sight of the elders of Israel. JOHN 9:1-41 All turn and face the Gospeler.

Gospeler The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John. *People* Glory to you, Lord Christ.

as Jesus walked along, he saw a man blind from birth. His disciples asked him, "Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?" Jesus answered, "Neither this man nor his parents sinned; he was born blind so that God's works might be revealed in him. We must work the works of him who sent me while it is day; night

is coming when no one can work. As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world." When he had said this, he spat on the ground and made mud with the saliva and spread the mud on the man's eyes, saying to him, "Go, wash in the pool of Siloam" (which means Sent). Then he went and washed and came back able to see. The neighbors and those who had seen him before as a beggar began to ask, "Is this not the man who used to sit and beg?" Some were saying, "It is he." Others were saying, "No, but it is someone like him." He kept saying, "I am the man." But they kept asking him, "Then how were your eyes opened?" He answered, "The man called Jesus made mud, spread it on my eyes, and said to me, 'Go to Siloam and wash.' Then I went and washed and received my sight." They said to him, "Where is he?" He said, "I do not know."

They brought to the Pharisees the man who had formerly been blind. Now it was a sabbath day when Jesus made the mud and opened his eyes. Then the Pharisees also began to ask him how he had received his sight. He said to them, "He put mud on my eyes. Then I washed, and now I see." Some of the Pharisees said, "This man is not from God, for he does not observe the sabbath." But others said, "How can a man who is a sinner perform such signs?" And they were divided. So they said again to the blind man, "What do you say about him? It was your eyes he opened." He said, "He is a prophet."

The Jews did not believe that he had been blind and had received his sight until they called the parents of the man who had received his sight and asked them, "Is this your son, who you say was born blind? How then does he now see?" His parents answered, "We know that this is our son, and that he was born blind; but we do not know how it is that now he sees, nor do we know who opened his eyes. Ask him; he is of age. He will speak for himself." His parents said this because they were afraid of the Jews; for the Jews had already agreed that anyone who confessed Jesus to be the Messiah would be put out of the synagogue. Therefore his parents said, "He is of age; ask him."

So for the second time they called the man who had been blind, and they said to him, "Give glory to God! We know that this man is a sinner." He answered, "I do not know whether he is a sinner. One thing I do know, that though I was blind, now I see." They said to him, "What did he do to you? How did he open your eyes?" He answered them, "I have told you already, and you would not listen. Why do you want to hear it again? Do you also want to become his disciples?" Then they reviled him, saying, "You are his disciple, but we are disciples of Moses. We know that God has spoken to Moses, but as for this man, we do not know where he comes from." The man answered, "Here is an astonishing thing! You do not know where he comes from, and yet he opened my eyes. We know that God does not listen to sinners, but he does listen to one who worships him and obeys his will. Never since the world began has it been heard that anyone opened the eyes of a person born blind. If this man were not from God, he could do nothing." They answered him, "You were born entirely in sins, and are you trying to teach us?" And they drove him out.

Jesus heard that they had driven him out, and when he found him, he said, "Do you believe in the Son of Man?" He answered, "And who is he, sir? Tell me, so that I may believe in him." Jesus said to him, "You have seen him, and the one speaking with you is he." He said, "Lord, I believe." And he worshiped him. Jesus said, "I came into this world for judgment so that those who do not see may see, and those who do see may become blind." Some of the Pharisees near him heard this and said to him, "Surely we are not blind, are we?" Jesus said to them, "If you were blind, you would not have sin. But now that you say, 'We see,' your sin remains."



Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. 

Making a Palm Cross (April 2) - After each Palm Sunday service, all ages are welcome to learn how to turn their palm into a cross. After the 8:00am and 10:30am services, gather in the school courtyard off of Bishop Polk Hall (weather permitting), or after the 6:00pm service, gather in the Moore Library.

Holy Week at Trinity Church

Maundy Thursday at Christ Church Cathedral (April 6) - This service is scheduled from 6:00pm - 7:00pm and includes choral offerings from the combined choirs of Trinity Church and the cathedral and sermon by rector The Rev. Andrew R. Thayer. A day to remember Jesus' command to love one another, embodied in the washing of one another's feet at the Last Supper. The service concludes with the stripping of the altar and participants leave in silence.

Overnight Vigil in Our Garden of Gethsemane (April 6 - April 7) - "He came to the disciples and found them sleeping; and he said to Peter, "So, could you not stay awake with me one hour? - Matt 26:40.

As a new offering this Lent, Trinity will host an overnight prayer vigil in our Chapel, decorated as representative of the "Garden of Gethsemane" with plants and candles. Please sign up for one or many 1 hour shifts to keep watch and pray through the night, inviting a friend or two to join you. The chapel will contain an Altar of Repose, and all are invited to pray "keeping watch and awake with Christ's Body & Blood." The garden vigil will begin at 8:00pm on Maundy Thursday, April 6 and end at 12:00pm on Good Friday, April 7, at the beginning of the Good Friday service in the chapel. Security will be present. Please use the Coliseum Street entrance to the Chapel only. Sign up at bit.ly/GardenVigil.

Good Friday Service in Trinity's Chapel (April 7) - At completion of the overnight vigil in our "Garden of Gethsemane" this Good Friday service begins at 12:00pm in the chapel, and will be spoken only (no music). Communion is NOT offered. Good Friday is the day to remember Jesus' trial, death and great sacrifice known as the passion narrative. Participants hear of Jesus' humiliation and crucifixion, and look upon the cross with no other distractions. The pace of this service is somber and slow.

Good Friday Service at Christ Church Cathedral (April 7) - The traditional Good Friday service will take place at Christ Church Cathedral from 12:00pm to 3:00pm (worshippers may come and go as they feel moved). The service will be sung by the combined musicians of Trinity Church and the Cathedral, featuring the Passion Gospel, procession of the Cross, and Communion from the reserved sacrament, as well as preaching by our Dean.

Easter Vigil Bonfire (April 8) - Gather around the new fire, the symbol of creation, and listen to God's story. The Paschal candle is lit from this fire, to light the path that leads to Easter morning. This is a casual, family friendly event. Join us for an intergenerational sunset Easter bonfire outside nearest Trinity School's gymnasium / turf field. We will light the fire at sunset (7:23pm), tell Easter stories, sing songs, eat s'mores and celebrate the beginning of the Easter season. Bring blankets or chairs and join us for an hour of sunset celebration.

Easter Sunday (April 9) - Alleluia, Christ has risen! "Let the whole world see and know that things which were cast down are being raised up, and things which had grown old are being made new, and that all things are being brought to their perfection by . . . your Son Jesus Christ our Lord."
