The Liturgy of the Word

Welcome to Holy Apostles! This bulletin is your guide to worship and it has all that you need. Our worship is taken from the Book of Common Prayer. If you have any questions during the Liturgy, don't hesitate to ask an usher or a neighbor.

Preparing for Liturgical Changes in Lent Next Week

During Lent, a penitential season where we are asked to consider our sins and turn our hearts back to God, we make changes to the liturgy and the space. The altar becomes more bare, the crosses are shrouded and the liturgical color changes from green to purple. In our liturgy, we sing a Kyrie instead of a Gloria, asking for God's mercy; Lent 1 we begin the service with the Great Litany and the Sundays after with the Penitential Order; we include the Prayer of Humble Access before receiving communion; we say, not sing the Lord's Prayer – we do not declare Alleluia. These changes help us to recognize the ways in which we need God's help in turning our hearts back to God, to make us thankful on Easter for the sacrifice of Jesus and his resurrection – his victory over death and the forgiveness of our sins.

2 Peter 1:16-21

We did not follow cleverly devised myths when we made known to you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we had been eyewitnesses of his majesty. For he received honor and glory from God the Father when that voice was conveyed to him by the Majestic Glory, saying, "This is my Son, my Beloved, with whom I am well pleased." We ourselves heard this voice come from heaven, while we were with him on the holy mountain. So we have the prophetic message more fully confirmed. You will do well to be attentive to this as to a lamp shining in a dark place, until the day dawns and the morning star rises in your hearts. First of all you must understand this, that no prophecy of scripture is a matter of one's own interpretation, because no prophecy ever came by human will, but men and women moved by the Holy Spirit spoke from God.
