As I sit down to write this article, some of the ladies in the church are decorating the church with American flags with Independence Day just over a week away. As Christians, we often find ourselves navigating the tension between our love for God and our love for country. Is it right to be patriotic? Can we honor our homeland without compromising our faith? The short answer is yes—but with careful wisdom and biblical boundaries.

The Bible encourages a healthy sense of gratitude and loyalty toward the place where God has placed us. In Acts 17:26, Paul says that God "determined allotted periods and the boundaries of their dwelling place." Our nationality, language, and homeland are not accidents. They are part of God's providential plan. This means it is good and right to thank God for the blessings we enjoy in our country—freedom, peace, opportunity, and heritage. The Old Testament even shows examples of this: Daniel, though exiled in Babylon, continued to pray toward Jerusalem (Daniel 6:10). Nehemiah wept over the broken state of his homeland and worked to rebuild it (Nehemiah 1–2). Love for one's country is a natural and biblical response to the gift of place.

Patriotism becomes a problem, however, when it turns into idolatry. This happens when national identity becomes more important than our identity in Christ. It happens when we trust in the strength of our nation more than the sovereignty of God. Scripture is clear: "Blessed is the nation whose God is the LORD" (Psalm 33:12), not the nation that simply has the strongest economy or military. Jesus also made a powerful distinction in John 18:36: "My kingdom is not of this world." His followers are citizens of a higher kingdom (Philippians 3:20), and our ultimate allegiance is to Him.

So how do we live this out practically? First, we can thank God for our country while praying for its leaders and citizens. Paul urges us in 1 Timothy 2:1-2 to pray "for kings and all who are in high positions, that we may lead a peaceful and quiet life." Second, we can participate in civic life—voting, serving, and seeking the common good—to seek to influence society in the most honorable and truth-centered and God-honoring way. Third, we can humbly celebrate our nation's strengths and acknowledge her faults. True love does not deny failure but seeks what is just, righteous, and good.

Finally, we must keep our worship centered on Christ alone. Symbols like the flag can be meaningful, but they must never replace the cross. National holidays like Independence Day can stir pride, but they must never outshine our holy days—especially the Lord's Day. A Christ-centered patriotism does not demand we abandon our country, but it insists we view it through the lens of the Gospel.

In short, Christians can be patriotic—loving the nation where God has placed them—without making an idol of it. Our ultimate hope is not in a flag, a party, or a president, but in the risen King who reigns forever. Let us be faithful citizens of our earthly nation while living as ambassadors of Christ's eternal kingdom.


POOLS FOR SCHOOLS: We will be collecting items for North Elementary and Alton High School from July 27 through August 10. More information is coming soon!
