IDF Military Intelligence Directorate Chief Aharon Haliva believed that following the events of October 7, his tenure in office was on borrowed time. "Already that morning I understood that it was over," he told his associates: "After the war is over I will have to go." Now, all that remains for Haliva is to figure out when he intends to retire, whether it be after Israel officially announces the end of the war, or before there is any sort of permanent ceasefire and the army switches to a method of raid operations only. Either way, Haliva is already considered in the Intelligence Division as a "lame duck," and the succession battle for his position has already begun. On the night between Friday and Saturday, around 2:30 a.m., the Chief of Staff, Lt.-Gen. Herzi Halevi, held an encrypted telephone call on the IDF's "red line" with Operations Directorate head Maj.-Gen. Oded Basyuk and IDF Southern Command head Maj.-Gen. Yaron Finkelman to discuss intelligence gathered from various collection agencies in Military Intelligence and the Shin Bet (Israel Security Agency). For an unclear reason, it was decided that Haliva wouldn't participate in the discussion, which also covered his area of responsibility. Simultaneously, updates were provided on the accumulated intelligence regarding the situation along the Gaza Strip border. The chief of staff's assistant, who organized the call, briefed Halevi, and later other assistants to the generals, including Maj.-Gen. Amit Saar, head of the Research Division, who updated Haliva. According to assessments based on the intelligence gathered prior to October 7 and indications of Hamas exercises near the border, the most severe scenario likely to occur was the infiltration of Hamas operatives for a lone attack on the border – yet this was defined as having a low probability. Military Intelligence estimated that most likely these were routine exercises by the terrorist organization's military wing, similar to the months preceding the attack.





IDF investigating 'cruel' Hamas claim that Bibas children, mother killed in Gaza

The Israel Defense Forces said Wednesday it had notified the family of a mother and two young children kidnapped to Gaza that it was investigating a "cruel and inhumane" Hamas statement claiming the three had been killed. The statement by Hamas's military wing asserted Shiri Bibas, 32, and her children, four-year-old Ariel and 10-month-old Kfir, were killed in an Israeli strike during the war in the Strip. It did not say when this had allegedly occurred (a pause in fighting has been in place since November 24). Gaza terror groups have made such claims regarding hostages in the past, seen as part of a psychological warfare campaign. "The Hamas terror organization continues to act in a cruel and inhumane manner," the IDF said. The military stressed that Hamas bears responsibility for the safety of all the hostages held in the Gaza Strip, even those held by other factions. "Hamas is endangering the hostages, including nine children. Hamas is required to immediately return them to Israel," the statement read. War cabinet minister Benny Gantz, who happened to be meeting with members of the Bibas family when Hamas issued its claim, said on Wednesday night that he did not know if it was true or psychological warfare. "There is no confirmation" of the claim, he said. "We will continue to seek intelligence and other indications" in order to determine its veracity. The three family members were kidnapped from Kibbutz Nir Oz on October 7, along with Shiri's husband and the father of the two boys, Yarden Bibas, 34, as Hamas terrorists rampaged through southern Israel, killing more than 1,200 people and taking some 240 hostages. The family believes that Yarden, who was seen bleeding from the head as he was taken hostage, is being held separately from his wife and children. The family has become one of the most recognizable groups of hostages and held up by many as proof of the extent of Hamas's cruelty. A video that emerged of Shiri carrying her children as she was taken away by the terrorists quickly gained attention due to her visible distress, the children's bright red hair (which has led the kids to be popularly nicknamed "the redheads") and Kfir's young age — being the youngest Israeli abducted by Hamas. On Tuesday, IDF Arabic-language spokesman Avichai Adraee confirmed via X, formerly Twitter, that the mother and her two children were transferred by Hamas to another terror group inside the Gaza Strip and that they were believed to be held in the southern city of Khan Younis. That group has been reported to be the small Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine. "Children and babies under the age of one who have not seen the light of day for more than 50 days are being held captive by Hamas, [which] treats some of them as loot and in some cases has transferred them to other terrorist organizations in the Gaza Strip," he wrote. Since the time the young family was taken hostage, their relatives have been campaigning both in Israel and abroad to raise awareness of their plight. Following Hamas's claim regarding the death of Shiri and her two children, her cousin Jimmy Miller said the family holds Hamas responsible for their well-being, regardless of whether or not they were the ones holding them hostage. "Hamas abducted them alive. Hamas is solely responsible for their well-being. Hamas must return them to us alive," Miller told Channel 12 news. "We're not interested in whether they transferred them to somebody else or to some other group. Hamas is solely responsible for returning them to us alive, healthy and intact... Make no mistake." He also said Hamas Gaza leader Yahya Sinwar was responsible for their well-being, and said that the family "are waiting for an official announcement" from the IDF as to whether the group's claim is "true or not, or another kind of trick that Hamas is playing on us." Another terror group, Palestinian Islamic Jihad, previously announced that hostage Channa Katzir had died, only for her to be freed in the first hostage release Friday. Miller stressed that the family has seen the video of Shiri and her two sons being abducted alive from Kibbutz Nir Oz, "and we have absolutely no doubt that they reached Gaza alive. And we want to see them back here alive, the sooner the better." Miller also noted that father Yarden was abducted separately to Gaza, taken on a motorbike, and seen in video being beaten on the head with hammers en route. "We are not sure that they reached Gaza together; we think [the terrorists] separated them," he added. He said the family gets up every morning hoping they will be returned in each day's releases, and have been gravely disappointed that they have not been. In an interview with CNN on Wednesday morning, Eylon Keshet, a cousin of the family, spoke about the urgent need for their release. "We are really, really worried about him," said Keshet, holding a photo of 10-month-old Kfir. "We are not sure if he can make it. Every day that he is staying there is a real, real danger to his life."



Women held hostage by Hamas in Gaza kept in cages - report

Women who were abducted from Israeli territory and held hostage by Hamas in Gaza were kept in cages, according to a report by Israeli media, citing a statement from a member of the Hostages and Missing Families Forum. This claim is not the first of its kind: In the days immediately following the October 7 attacks, videos from Hamas's Telegram channel showed child hostages being kept in cages for the majority of their time in captivity. Hamas distributed a letter on Monday allegedly written by Danielle Aloni, who was kidnapped alongside her 5year-old daughter Emilia and held in captivity. In the letter, written in Hebrew and translated into Arabic, she reportedly thanked Hamas for the "extraordinary humanity" provided to her daughter, who "felt like a queen." The letter also read, "I will forever be a prisoner of love because [Emilia] did not leave here with psychological trauma forever." The Aloni family has not confirmed this letter nor the statements made in it, though it has been widely distributed on social media by the Hamas terror organization. This letter is one of many that hostages were forced to write, according to Israeli media reports.

Neglect at the hands of the Red Cross

After Elma Avraham, 84, was returned to Israeli custody, she was immediately airlifted for emergency medical care. Her family claimed that she was "medically neglected" by international medical organizations that failed to provide her with the immediate medical treatment she required at the time. "My mother did not deserve to be treated like this" stated Elma's daughter, Tal Amano. According to Amano, her mother was the victim of a "double betrayal that began on October 7 when she was kidnapped by Hamas, [that] continued with the failure of international organizations that were supposed to help her in the condition that she was in at the time of her release." Prior to her kidnapping on October 7, Elma was in relatively good health. However, she did have some underlying health issues that required medication. "No one from the international organizations bothered to create a list with the medications she required," her daughter continued. "Clalit [an Israeli medical health fund] was the one who fought for us. It delivered the medication that Elma required to my brother in person. Yet, when my brother attempted to pass on the medication to a Red Cross representative at a meeting they held together, he was told no, they cannot do that." Elma's family returned to the Red Cross building a few days later and were once again rejected. "My mother should not have come back like this. What is the Red Cross there for? What is the UN Women organization for?" Tal demanded to know. Dr. Nadav Davidovitch, who is currently treating Elma, said "We were in meetings with the Red Cross and asked them to make every effort to bring the medications to her, because some hostages are just dying. From a medical and nursing standpoint, what we witnessed is unlawful neglect."



IDF is following Hamas leaders around the world, spokesperson warns

years. Where before operations involved long-term planning and infiltration in a variety of foreign countries, now they simply required locating the target in the West Bank or Gaza and sending Shin Bet (Israel Security Agency) agents or IDF troops to carry out the killing. This era changed a little after the withdrawal from Gaza, with more killings occurring there after the withdrawal due to the increased presence of Hamas and increased Hamas operations from the Gaza Strip. Following the withdrawal and subsequent wars with Gaza, it remained the primary location of targeted killings but alleged Israeli eliminations of Iranian nuclear physicists increased, signaling a return of Mossad operations to the international arena. The first alleged targeted killing of a Hamas official outside of Gaza and the West Bank since the Oslo Accords, occurred in 2010, when Mossad was accused of killing Mahmoud al-Mabhouh in Dubai. Al-Mabhouh's killing sparked controversy as Mossad was accused of using Irish passports to carry out the killing. For the next 6 years, no killings were carried out, except in the Palestinian Territories and Iran. Mossad was accused of killing Hamas engineers in Tunisia and Malaysia, but this change was minor and no killings have been carried out outside of the Palestinian Territories, Iran, and Syria since then. If Hagari's announcement signals a new era in targeted killings abroad, this could mean that the senior Hamas members holed up in Qatar suddenly find that they are unable to go about their daily lives without looking over their shoulders.

IDF spokesman R-Adm. Daniel Hagari on Friday night referred to senior Hamas

officials, saying that "they are being followed around in Gaza and around the world." Hagari's warning signals to the Hamas leadership in Qatar and around the world that the IDF will pursue them wherever they are. This calls back to several famous Israeli

operations to eliminate the masterminds of terror attacks against Israelis, such as those operations that took place in the wake of the Munich Massacre. During this

era, Mossad would target Palestinians involved in planning attacks on Israelis, with most of them being in foreign countries. This type of operation, involving Mossad

agents, slowly disappeared after the Oslo Accords, with most targeted killings

First wave out of 7,000 foreign doctors wanting to help amid war have come to Israel

With many Israeli physicians called to military duty, organizations in Israel and abroad work with the government to identify the professionals needed most by hospitals and clinics











Twelve thousand doctors, nurses and paramedics from around the world have informed the Health Ministry that they are ready to hop on a plane to Israel and volunteer their services during the ongoing war with the Hamas terror group. Of the 12,000, some 7,000 are doctors of all specialties. Half are from the United States, and others are from other countries including Sweden, Canada, Belgium, Brazil, Switzerland and New Zealand. So far, more than 150 of them have come to help out. "I truly believe that we're living through one of the inflection points in Jewish history... and we're going to look back on this time and ask ourselves whether we did everything we could to help in this critical moment," said Dr. Avi Schlager, a pediatric surgeon from Florida volunteering at Schneider Children's Medical Center in Petah Tikva. "I am grateful I can contribute [to Israel] in the way that I'm most comfortable and that I feel I can be most helpful," he said. The readiness of these physicians — most Jewish, but not all — to leave their busy practices abroad has been heartwarming for Israel's medical community as it deals with the aftermath of the devastating October 7 onslaught on Israel by Hamas terrorists from Gaza, and the ensuing war aimed at vanquishing the terror group. The Health Ministry is working strategically to strengthen the hospitals in the north and south of the country — closest to the front lines. At the same time, it is preparing medical centers in the center of Israel to absorb patients that can be moved from frontline hospitals, or war casualties that require more advanced trauma care. Adam Cutler, who is overseeing the processing of the volunteers' registrations at the Health Ministry, said this effort to create a "strategic depth of manpower" applies also to the health maintenance organizations (HMOs) and community clinics, which may need volunteers to fill in staffing gaps, especially in treating the estimated 200,000 Israelis displaced from their homes in the north and south. "We are making clear that we are not recruiting volunteer doctors from abroad to serve with the IDF or on the frontlines. We need them on the home front, filling in for Israeli doctors who have been called up for military service," said Dr. Asher Salmon, head of the Health Ministry's international relations division. According to Salmon, volunteer physicians who specialize in trauma and related fields are most needed at this stage. These include emergency medicine doctors, trauma surgeons, anesthesiologists, vascular surgeons, thoracic surgeons, intensive care specialists, burns specialists, plastic surgeons and rehabilitation specialists. Forensic medicine experts from outside Israel also arrived very soon after October 7 to help with the ongoing, laborious and painful work of identifying the victims of the Hamas massacres and the war.

In a classic case of passive aggression, several Jewish lawyers have filed to trademark the genocidal Jew-hatred phrase "From the river to the sea, Palestine will be free". Yirmi Knight, Esq., a US-based lawyer, filed an official request to trademark the phrase, "From the river to the sea, Palestine will be free." Knight told Israel365 News that his application is still pending and may take a year to process. "Our goal is to enforce our rights and prevent those individuals, companies, and organizations, including venues that allow its use, from benefitting or using our phrase of 'From The River To The Sea Palestine Will Be Free' for their profit, benefit, or otherwise," Knight said. "This is especially important to me given that the use of that phrase is an attempt to utilize it as a call-to-action slogan to kill Jews. I will do everything in my legal capacity to prevent that. Am Yisroel Chai (the nation of Israel will live)." Knight has set up a GoFundMe crowd-sourcing page to help his effort. "We are looking to raise funds for staffing and litigation costs to enforce our trademark rights and prevent any and all Sellers or Seller Venues that use our phrase 'From The River To The Sea Palestine Will Be Free.' Please join our cause "Others have also adopted the tactic. Oron Rosenkrantz appears to have a prior claim with his application being filed on November 8. Rosenkrantz's filing looked to trademark "From the river to the sea" for T-shirts. As the trademarks are being filed in the US, they will not be applicable to the use of the phrase outside of the US. Trademarks initially provide 10 years of protection during which no other entity could use the slogan on specific or related goods. Then, the trademark owner can renew its validity for another 10 years of protection. Eventually, the mark can be protected and last a lifetime. The phrase is controversial, and Berlin announced that it is forbidden and the use of it will make one liable for prosecution. Austria announced that the phrase would be considered a murder threat and prosecuted as a criminal offense. Other cities and countries have considered also banning the slogan. Twitter banned the phrase, saying that it implies genocide and that such alleged "calls for extreme violence are against our terms of service and will result in suspension."



Shortly after Oct. 7, an independent organization of international human rights experts and women's rights groups in Israel formed the Civil Commission on Oct. 7 Crimes by Hamas against Women and Children. Concerned that no Israeli or international organization was documenting Hamas' sexual violence, it set about collecting evidence of Hamas' gender-based assaults and encouraging government bodies to further investigate these atrocities as war crimes and crimes against humanity. Even as the first women and children hostages are being released and Israel's Health Ministry has instructed the hospitals treating them to have women doctors and nurses on hand to conduct all physical exams, how to check for and document signs of rape and torture, and how to interview without retraumatizing them, the UN has shown little sign of caring whether Israeli women suffer violence, and hasn't rallied for Red Cross access to those still held captive by Hamas. UN Women executive director and under-Secretary General Sima Balhous, waited until Nov. 22 to first mention that she was "greatly alarmed by reports of sexual and gender-based violence," but failed to mention the culprit was Hamas and the victims Israeli and foreign nationals. Earlier this month, the hashtag #MeTooUnlessURAJew spread widely on social media as grassroots women's groups in Israel and abroad launched campaigns to express outrage at the silence of the international community regarding the growing evidence that Hamas engaged in systematic rape on Oct. 7.

Intermarry with us; give your daughters to us and take our daughters for yourselves. Thus you shall live with us, and the land shall be open before you; live and trade in it and acquire property in it." Shechem also said to her father and to her brothers, "If I find favor in your sight, then I will give whatever you say to me. Ask me ever so much bridal payment and gift, and I will give according as you say to me; but give me the girl in marriage." Genesis 34:8-12





But Jacob's sons answered Shechem and his father Hamor with deceit, because he had defiled Dinah their sister. They said to them, "We cannot do this thing, to give our sister to one who is uncircumcised, for that would be a disgrace to us. Only on this condition will we consent to you: if you will become like us, in that every male of you be circumcised, then we will give our daughters to you, and we will take your daughters for ourselves, and we will live with you and become one people. But if you will not listen to us to be circumcised, then we will take our daughter and go." Genesis 34:13-17

Now their words seemed reasonable to Hamor and Shechem, Hamor's son. The young [Shechem] man did not delay to do the thing, because he was delighted with Jacob's daughter. Now he was more respected than all the household of his father. So Hamor and his son Shechem came to the gate of their city and spoke to the men of their city, saying, "These men are friendly with us; therefore let them live in the land and trade in it, for behold, the land is large enough for them. Let us take their daughters in marriage, and give our daughters to them. Only on this condition will the men consent to us to live with us, to become one people: that every male among us be circumcised as they are circumcised. Will not their livestock and their property and all their animals be ours? Only let us consent to them, and they will live with us." Genesis 34:18-23

^{*} This was not only a brutal, deceptive act, but it also disgraced God's covenant of circumcision. Surely, with this clever act of violent deception, Simeon and Levi showed themselves to be the children of Jacob from a bitter, competitive home environment. - David Guzik

All who went out of the gate of his city listened to Hamor [the father] and to his son Shechem, and every male was circumcised, all who went out of the gate of his city. Now it came about on the third day, when they were in pain, that two of Jacob's sons, Simeon and Levi, Dinah's brothers, each took his sword and came upon the city unawares, and killed every male. They killed Hamor and his son Shechem with the edge of the sword, and took Dinah from Shechem's house, and went forth. Genesis 34:24-26

^{*}Simeon and Levi, Jacob's sons, wanted to avenge the rape of their sister by killing the attacker, his father, and all other men of the city.

Jacob's sons came upon the slain and looted the city, because they had defiled their sister. They took their flocks and their herds and their donkeys, and that which was in the city and that which was in the field; and they captured and looted all their wealth and all their little ones and their wives, even all that was in the houses. Genesis 34:27-29

Then Jacob said to Simeon and Levi, "You have brought trouble on me by making me odious among the inhabitants of the land, among the Canaanites and the Perizzites; and my men being few in number, they will gather together against me and attack me and I will be destroyed, I and my household." But they said, "Should he treat our sister as a harlot?" Genesis 34:30-31

^{*} Jacob, the man known as Israel, worried about what other nations would think of the Jews because they exacted such overwhelming and violent revenge.

Then God said to Jacob, "Arise, go up to Bethel and live there, and make an altar there to God, who appeared to you when you fled from your brother Esau." So Jacob said to his household and to all who were with him, "Put away the foreign gods which are among you, and purify yourselves and change your garments; and let us arise and go up to Bethel, and I will make an altar there to God, who answered me in the day of my distress and has been with me wherever I have gone." So they gave to Jacob all the foreign gods which they had and the rings which were in their ears, and Jacob hid them under the oak which was near Shechem. Genesis 35:1-4

Israel's Ground War Against Hamas: What to Know

A major ground campaign in the Gaza Strip will display Israel's overwhelming military force, but the country faces a steep challenge in its goal of eradicating Hamas, as well as in finding a workable post-combat plan for the territory.

What does Israel intend to achieve with a ground war in the Gaza Strip?

Israeli officials have repeatedly said their goal is to eliminate Hamas. By crushing the terrorist organization, Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu hopes to reassert Israeli deterrence and show Israel's enemies the high costs of attacking it. Israel has already launched a massive bombing campaign of the Gaza Strip and, more recently, raids on the ground, while signaling that it will soon launch a major ground offensive.



'Humiliated and defeated': Fear, shock grip Israel after Hamas assault

Around dawn Saturday morning (October 7), as most of the country slept, thousands of rockets rained down on Israel, as far north as Tel Aviv and as far east as Jerusalem. Then came the infiltrators, who stormed unsuspecting towns in the south, killing civilians and taking hostages. The combined land, sea and air attack was spearheaded by Hamas, the Islamist militant group that rules the Gaza Strip, and supported by Palestinian Islamic Jihad, a smaller Gaza-based group that has fought with Israel in the past. Israelis are accustomed to conflict, but they had never experienced a day like this. Two hundred fifty are dead and more than 1,000 are wounded, the country's emergency services said. The attack caught Israel's vaunted military and intelligence services off guard, and sparked bitter recriminations after months of warnings from security officials about the country's deteriorating capacity for deterrence.
