# CHAPTERS 1-4: HISTORICAL CONTEXT

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- Themes of 1:18 – 3:4
- Paul's answer in 3:5 - 23
- Corinthians opinion of Paul – 4:1-5, 18-21

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- They have misunderstood the basic nature of the gospel.
- They have a wrong view of Paul.

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- 3:5 – 9

- Paul and Apollos are not lords, but rather they are merely servants for the same cause.

# CHAPTERS 1-4: LITERARY CONTEXT

- 3:10 – 15

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- This cannot be about an individual Christian as the whole church is in view. The church must be built with the wisdom of God and anchored on the cross, otherwise it is worthless.

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- 3:16 – 17

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- The Corinthian church was to be God's temple among all of the pagan temples in Corinth. An immaculate, eternal image created by God through servants' hands.

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- The parts make perfect sense within the whole.
