The pandemic taught us valuable lessons of perseverance and adaptability, but behind this corporate growth lies the godly attitude and character of our staff who







Distinctives

Often when people imagine a traditional mission hospital, several stereotypes come to mind: that healthcare is free for patients and they line up for miles, that doctors rarely sleep because their work is never done, and that the short-term teams of foreign doctors keep it running. As a long-term development ministry, MMC ministry is based on a different paradigm.

Subsidized, Not Free

According to their ability our patients pay for their care, even if only a small amount. We encourage their mindset to be one of ownership and participation in their well-being. MMC is only 25% donor-dependent for operational expenses, with 65% sustained by patients and the remaining 10% by referring partners in Cambodia.

Long Term Missionaries

Language-fluent missionary doctors and nurses work alongside the Cambodian healthcare workers as trainers and disciplers. As of 2022, six Cambodian attending doctors also serve as trainers and disciplers. The cumulative investment into these young doctors and nurses is achieving far-reaching results for the Kingdom as they launch from MMC well fortified for service and ministry.


Referring Partner System

One of the most impactful distinctives of MMC is the Referring Partner System. Like-minded Cambodian churches and Christian organizations refer nearly all of MMC patients. Through this system, the number of patients treated at MMC is moderated based on our resources. Doctors treat patients at a rate which is most manageable for training staff and for providing the highest quality individualized medical care. We prioritize the health and well-being of our healthcare workers so they are able to provide care for others.

Most importantly, these Christian organizations and churches have all agreed to follow up spiritually with the patients they refer, seeking to connect them with local churches. These partnerships ensure the best possible opportunity for patients to understand who Jesus is and the new life He has to offer them. Lastly, the Spiritual Impact Team represents 10% of all staff and is dedicated to intentional focus on the spiritual well-being of our patients. Nurses

It has been said that a hospital without nurses is like a house without a foundation–it simply could not stand. Following the stress of the pandemic the global nursing shortage intensified and 2022 proved to be a challenging year as we experienced the nursing shortage in Cambodia.

The nursing staff at MMC deserves to be celebrated. Instead of giving up, the MMC Nurse Leadership Team prayerfully and diligently tackled the issue with a long-term strategic plan. Seven high school graduates have been hired and trained as nursing assistants at MMC where they have an opportunity to discover their

individual strengths and passion. After our leadership assesses if they are a good fit with the ministry, they have the option of applying for an MMC scholarship to study for their associate degree in nursing. Three nursing assistants were enrolled in 2022 and three nurses began studies for the Bachelor of Science in Nursing. Clinical Director Phearin Sorn continued with his master's degree in Nursing Administration and Education. Lastly, we made a deliberate effort to develop relationships with local nursing schools in order to recruit promising nurses.

Doctors

The World Health Organization has recognized the need for well-trained primary care doctors in the developing world, stating that 90% of medical problems can be effectively and efficiently resolved by a good family doctor who knows when to refer to specialists. Thus the name of our Family Medicine Curriculum (provided by the Christian Medical College of Vellore India) is "Refer Less–Resolve More."

In 2012, we launched the MMC Family Medicine Residency with two residents in training and a few missionary trainers. In 2022, six Cambodian doctors (graduates of our program) served alongside the missionary doctors teaching the 14 residents currently in training. These three junior and three senior attending doctors have stepped into both spiritual and medical leadership roles.

The long term vision of MMC includes launching

national medical missionaries in every province to partner with local churches in spreading the Gospel. For this reason MMC only accepts Christian Cambodian doctors to our residency program, those who want to grow in their faith as well as their medical skills.

In September 2022 we hosted three cohorts of doctors from five surrounding countries, all students in the online International Post-Graduate Diploma in Family Medicine accredited by the Christian Medical College of Vellore, the International Christian Medical and Dental Association, and Loma Linda University. Taught by Dr. Tim Benadum of MMC and Dr. Sahaya Anbarasi of CMC Vellore, five MMC staff assisted in the training, including Counseling Director Sochea Choch, Women's Health Fellow Dr. Ang Srey Nin and three MMC missionary trainers.

Spiritual Impact Team

"I'm sorry brother, but we can not get to the village today."

"It is ok teacher! We can gather on our own and study God's word and teach one another." When MMC Spiritual Impact Team Leader, Vuth, heard this response, it was a refreshing affirmation that their day to day work was taking root in good soil.

Imagine a small fortress set down on the front lines of a spiritual battlefield, where demonic beings are summoned regularly, harassing and even indwelling the people. MMC is like the MASH unit, caring for the spiritually and physically wounded. Within its compound lies an inner room, the "war room." This is where the MMC Spiritual Impact Team prayerfully strategizes for the spiritual battle we fight daily. From this room, they launch out each day in several directions. Two to the patient welcome station, where

they encourage the weary and the sick. Three to the waiting area where they teach holistic health and share the good news of ultimate peace and eternal healing. Two venture out in the SUV to a village house church leader's home, where several have gathered to study the word and biblical leadership. Two go to the inpatient ward, coming alongside the nurses encouraging and caring for patients and families. One joins the Palliative Care Team while they comfort a terminally ill patient. And two stand guard at the war room, making follow up calls, studying the maps, and praying.

In 2022, the MMC Spiritual Impact Team grew to 12 members. They engaged over 2,500 patients in one-on-one Gospel conversations at MMC. They taught a three-part evangelism seminar to the resident doctors and two bible training seminars for 23 house church leaders. They also planted two new churches.

A Story

Vannara has been living in a foreign country, far from her adult siblings in Cambodia for many years. She has been praying for them to come to know Jesus ever since she gave her own life to Christ. So far, two of her sisters have joined her in the faith. But her oldest brother, a district-level government official, was very antagonistic towards Christianity. In 2022, Rotannak became very ill. After seeking answers at various clinics, he finally gave in to his sisters' pleas: "Go to Mercy Medical Center! The doctors there are very good."

Rotannak was admitted to the inpatient ward. Throughout his stay, his two believing sisters updated Vannara through texting and calls. Within a few days, his diagnosis was clear: stage 4 cancer. The Palliative Care Team at MMC along with the resident doctor explained his diagnosis and the fact that there was no medical intervention that could save him. They asked about his life, his family, his fears. And they shared the good news with himthat he can have a secure afterlife, full of peace and joy, regardless of anything he has done or offerings not made. They shared that his soul will not wander in torment if his family does not make enough with her brother. Reflecting on missing the offerings after his death. He told them, "I can not believe in Jesus because I work in the government. It is not acceptable." When Vannara heard this news, she was overwhelmed with grief. Rendered helpless by her physical distance, she sank to the floor of her kitchen and prayed earnestly for her dying brother.

Rotannak returned to his home, and gathered his three young adult sons to give them the news. He also invited his two believing sisters who were in Cambodia.

"What I have can not be cured. I will die. I am thinking about believing in Jesus, because at that Christian hospital they are very different. They care for each patient without taking bribe money. They are kind, and they are honest. I have never seen love like that. What do you think I should do?"

The first son exclaimed, "You need to go to a different hospital! They are wrong." The second son said, "I do not know." And the third son said, "You should believe in Jesus." Shortly after, he returned to MMC with medical complications and there in the Palliative Care room, he told his young doctor, "I have decided to believe." She knelt by his bed at his feet and prayed with him to receive Christ.

Overjoyed at this news, with the help of friends from her church, Vannara made plans to fly to Cambodia in the hope of worshiping Jesus with her brother just one time before he went to heaven. But she landed for her layover in Korea to the news that he had passed. We at MMC were blessed to be able to meet Vannara and her sisters one week later, and to witness her meet the young doctor who had prayed chance to see him she shared, "I will have eternity with him to worship our God!"




