## Today's Guest Preaching Pastor Glen L. Bloomstrom | Chaplain (Colonel) USA, (Ret)

Since 2012, Glen served as the Director, Faith Community Engagement at LivingWorks Education where he partnered with clergy, faith leaders, seminaries, denominations, faith communities, Department of Defense and veterans' groups to prevent suicide through education and intervention training. Glen has also served as an Adjunct Professor for Pastoral Counseling at Bethlehem Seminary in Minneapolis Minnesota where he specialized in pastoral counseling and marriage education. Glen retired from full-time employment with Liv-

ingWorks in December 2024. From 2008-2011, Glen culminated his 30 years of active duty with 18 months of deployment during his final 36 months as part of Joint Special Operations Task Forces in the Central Command Area of Operations supporting combat operations in Afghanistan, Iraq and other locations.

## INFORMATION ON TODAY'S SERVICES

About the music: William Whiting (1825 – 1878) was an English writer and hymnist, best known for "Eternal Father, Strong to Save." He was born in Kensington, England, and became master of the Winchester College Quiristers (Choristers). It is used by the Royal Navy for church services and was adopted by the United States Naval Academy and so is often called "The Navy Hymn." The composer of the tune (named "Melita") is John Bacchus Dykes (1823-1876). At the age of ten he became the organist of St. John's in Hull, where his grandfather was vicar. In 1849 he became the precentor and choir director at Durham Cathedral, where he introduced reforms in the choir by insisting on consistent attendance and more rehearsals.. To the chagrin of his bishop, Dykes favored the high church practices associated with the Oxford Movement (choir robes, incense, and such).

William Selby (1738–1798) was an organist, harpsichordist, choirmaster and composer who was born in England and emigrated to the United States. Selby emigrated to Boston, Massachusetts in 1773, following his brother John, also an organist, who emigrated in 1771. In 1774, Selby became the organist at Trinity Church in Newport, Rhode Island. Three years later, Selby became organist at King's Chapel in Boston.
