Worship note

Easter is the principal feast of the Christian year, in which we celebrate Christ's victory over death and the grave. We celebrate the Paschal Mystery every Sunday, but in this 50-day season of Eastertide, resurrection has a particular focus. You will notice bright and festive hymnody, prayers from a wonderful resource called Rites and Rituals, and the familiar Eucharistic Prayer, known as "Prayer A." This quotation seems especially poignant: "We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O God, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts" (BCP p. 363)

May this season fill you with Easter joy, which speaks life into the face of death. Alleluia! Christ is risen.



The Second Lesson | 1 John 3:16-24





Holy and gracious God: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and maker and of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.




