Those who had been baptized devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers.

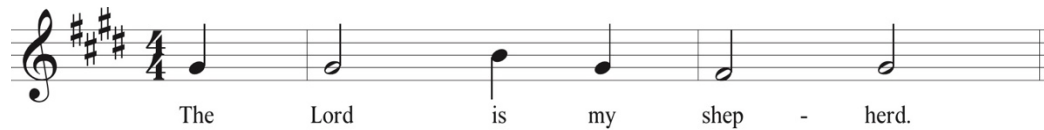

The Second Lesson | 1 Peter 2:19-25

It is a credit to you if, being aware of God, you endure pain while suffering unjustly. If you endure when you are beaten for doing wrong, what credit is that? But if you endure when you do right and suffer for it, you have God's approval. For to this you have been called, because Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example, so that you should follow in his steps.

“He committed no sin,
and no deceit was found in his mouth.”

When he was abused, he did not return abuse; when he suffered, he did not threaten; but he entrusted himself to the one who judges justly. The Gospel | John 10:1-10

Gospeler The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to John.
People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus said, "Very truly, I tell you, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold by the gate but climbs in by another way is a thief and a bandit. The one who enters by the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. They will not follow a stranger, but they will run from him because they do not know the voice of strangers." Jesus used this figure of speech with them, but they did not understand what he was saying to them.

So again Jesus said to them, "Very truly, I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep. All who came before me are thieves and bandits; but the sheep did not listen to them. I am the gate. Whoever enters by me will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture. The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly."

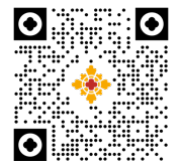

COMPOSER OF THE WEEK Rachel Laurin was a prominent Canadian composer, concert organist, and educator known for her extensive contributions to the organ repertoire. Widely regarded as one of the most significant organ composers of the early 21st century, she composed over 112 opus numbers, including works for solo instruments, orchestra, voice, and choir. She served as the titular organist at the Notre Dame Cathedral Basilica in Ottawa (2002–2006) and recorded over 30 albums. Rachel Laurin received two major commissions from the Chenault Organ Duo (Elizabeth and Raymond Chenault), which have become notable entries in the contemporary organ duet repertoire.

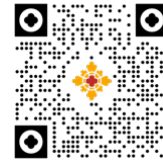
