Today's liturgy marks the beginning of Holy Week. In this Palm Sunday service, we journey with Jesus as he is welcomed in triumph upon entering Jerusalem and then utterly rejected and crucified at Golgotha outside the gates of the city. Today's reading of Christ's passion sets forth the central act of God's love for humankind. We are not just observers but are part of the passion of Christ and through it we come to know the reality of God's saving action in our lives. Holy Week will culminate in the celebration of the Triduum—the Sacred Three Days of Jesus' suffering, death, and resurrection.

The Liturgy of the Palms

Opening Acclamation |

The people are invited to gather at the front steps to the Church for the blessing of the palms. In the event of rain, we will gather inside the Church.

The Palm Sunday Lesson | Matthew 21: 1-11

When Jesus and his disciples had come near Jerusalem and had reached Bethphage, at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two disciples, saying to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied, and a colt with her; untie them and bring them to me. If anyone says anything to you, just say this, 'The Lord needs them.' And he will send them immediately." This took place to fulfill what had been spoken through the prophet, saying, "Tell the daughter of Zion, Look, your king is coming to you, humble, and mounted on a donkey, and on a colt, the foal of a donkey." The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them; they brought the donkey and the colt, and put their cloaks on them, and he sat on them. A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. The crowds that went ahead of him and that followed were shouting, "Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest heaven! When he entered Jerusalem, the whole city was in turmoil, asking, "Who is this?" The crowds were saying, "This is the prophet Jesus from Nazareth in Galilee."


The Procession |

Raising of the Great Cross |

The Passion of Our Lord | Matthew 26:14-27:66

The customary responses before and after the Gospel reading are omitted. The people remain seated. At the verse that mentions the arrival at Golgotha, the people stand.

Narrator: The Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

Narrator: One of the Twelve, who was called Judas Iscariot, went to the chief priests, and said:

Judas: "What will you give me if I betray him to you?"

Narrator: They paid him thirty pieces of silver. And from that moment, Judas began to look for an opportunity to betray him. On the first day of Unleavened Bread the disciples came to Jesus and said, "Where do you want us to make the preparations for you to eat the Passover?"

Jesus: "Go into the city to a certain man, and say to him, 'The Teacher says, my time is near; I will keep the Passover at your house with my disciples."

Narrator: So, the disciples did as Jesus had directed them and prepared the Passover. When it was evening, he took his place with the Twelve; and while they were eating, he said,

Jesus: "Truly I tell you, one of you will betray me."

Judas: "Surely not I, Lord?"

Jesus: "The one who has dipped his hand into the bowl with me will betray me. The Son of Man goes as it is written of him, but woe to that one by whom the Son of Man is betrayed! It would have been better for that one not to have been born."

Judas: "Surely not I, Rabbi?"

Jesus: "You have said so."

Narrator: While they were eating, Jesus took bread, and after blessing it he broke it, and gave it to the disciples and said:

Jesus: "Take, eat; this is my body."

Narrator: Then he took a cup, gave thanks and giving it to them said:

Jesus: "Drink from it, all of you; for this is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins. I tell you; I will never again drink of this fruit of the vine until that day when I drink it new with you in my Father's kingdom."

Narrator: Then after singing a hymn, they went out to the Mount of Olives. Then Jesus said to them:

Jesus: "You will all become deserters because of me this night; for it is written:

'I will strike the shepherd; sheep of the flock will be scattered.'

But after I am raised up, I will go ahead of you to Galilee."

Narrator: Then Peter said to him:

Peter: "Though all become deserters because of you, I will never desert you."

Jesus: "Truly I tell you, this very night, before the cock crows, you will deny me three times."

Peter: "Even though I must die with you, I will not deny you."

Narrator: And all the disciples spoke likewise.

Narrator: Then Jesus went with them to a place called Gethsemane; and he said to his disciples:

Jesus: "Sit here while I go over there and pray."

Narrator: Jesus took with him Peter and the two sons of Zebedee, and began to be grieved and agitated:

Jesus: "I am deeply grieved, even to death; remain here, and stay awake with me."

Narrator: Jesus advanced a little, then threw himself on the ground in prayer, and said:

Jesus: "My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from me; yet not what I want but what you want."

Narrator: When he returned to his disciples, he found them asleep:

Jesus: "So, could you not stay awake with me one hour? Stay awake and pray that you may not come into the time of trial; the spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak."

Narrator: Jesus went away for the second time and prayed:

Jesus: "My Father, if this cannot pass unless I drink it, your will be done."

Narrator: Jesus then returned once more and found them sleeping, for their eyes were heavy. So, leaving them again, he went away and prayed for the third time, saying the same words:

Jesus: "Are you still sleeping and taking your rest? See, the hour is at hand, and the Son of Man is betrayed into the hands of sinners. Get up, let us be going. See, my betrayer is at hand."

Narrator: While he was still speaking, Judas, one of the Twelve, arrived, accompanied by a large crowd with swords and clubs, from the chief priests and the elders of the people. The betrayer had arranged a sign with them:

Judas: "The one I will kiss is the man; arrest him." (Judas approaches Jesus and says:) "Greetings, Rabbi!" (Judas kisses Jesus on the cheek)

Jesus: "Friend, do what you are here to do."

Narrator: Then they came and laid hands on Jesus and arrested him. Suddenly, one of those with Jesus put his hand on his sword, drew it, and struck the slave of the High Priest, cutting off his ear.

Jesus: "Put your sword back into its place; for all who take the sword will perish by the sword. Do you think that I cannot appeal to my Father, and he will at once send me more than 12 legions of angels? But how then would the scriptures be fulfilled, which say it must happen in this way? Have you come out with swords and clubs to arrest me as though I were a bandit? Day after day I sat in the temple teaching, and you did not arrest me. But all this has taken place, so that the scriptures of the prophets may be fulfilled."

Narrator: Then all the disciples deserted him and fled.

Narrator: Those who had arrested Jesus took him to Caiaphas the High Priest, in whose house the scribes and the elders had gathered. But Peter was following him at a distance, as far as the courtyard of the high priest; and going inside, he sat with the guards in order to see how this would end. Now the chief priests and the whole council were looking for false testimony against Jesus so that they might put him to death, but they found none, though many false witnesses came forward. At last, two came forward and said, "This fellow said, Tam able to destroy the temple of God and to build it in three days."

Narrator: Caiaphas, the High Priest stood up and said:

Caiaphas, the High Priest: "Have you no answer? What is it that they testify against you?"

Narrator: But Jesus was silent.

Caiaphas, the High Priest: "I put you under oath before the living God: tell us if you are the Messiah, the Son of God."

Jesus: "You have said so. But I tell you: From now on you will see the Son of Man seated at the right hand of Power and coming on the clouds of heaven."

Narrator: Then the High Priest tore his clothes and said:

Caiaphas, the High Priest: "He has blasphemed! Why do we still need witnesses? You have now heard his blasphemy. What is your verdict?"

Choir (pointing angrily): "He deserves death."

Narrator: Then they spat in his face and struck him; and some slapped him, saying:

Choir: "Prophesy to us, you Messiah! Who is it that struck you?"

Narrator: Now Peter was sitting outside in the courtyard. A young woman came to him and said:

Young Woman: "You also were with Jesus the Galilean."

Peter: "I do not know what you are talking about."

Narrator: When Peter went out to the porch, the young woman said to the bystanders:

Young Woman: "This man was with Jesus of Nazareth."

Peter: "I do not know the man."

Narrator: After a little while the bystanders came up and said to Peter, "Certainly you are also one of them, for your accent betrays you." Then Peter began to curse, and he swore an oath:

Peter: "I do not know the man!"

Narrator: At that moment, the cock crowed. Then Peter remembered what Jesus had said:

Jesus (turning to look at Peter): "Before the cock crows, you will deny me three times."

Narrator: And Peter went out and wept bitterly.

Narrator: When morning came, all the chief priests and the elders of the people conferred together against Jesus to bring about his death. They bound him, led him away, and handed him over to Pilate the governor. When Judas, his betrayer, saw that Jesus was condemned, he repented and brought back the 30 pieces of silver to the chief priests and the elders, saying:

Judas: "I have sinned by betraying innocent blood."

Caiaphas: "What is that to us? See to it yourself."

Narrator: Throwing down the pieces of silver in the temple, Judas departed; and he went and hanged himself. But the chief priests, taking the pieces of silver, said:

Caiaphas: "It is not lawful to put them into the treasury, since they are blood money."

Narrator: After conferring together, they used them to buy the potter's field as a place to bury foreigners. For this reason, that field has been called the Field of Blood to this day. Then was fulfilled what had been spoken through the prophet Jeremiah: "And they took the 30 pieces of silver, the price of the one on whom a price had been set, on whom some of the people of Israel had set a price, and they gave them for the potter's field, as the Lord commanded me."

Narrator: Now Jesus stood before the governor; and the governor asked him:

Pilate: "Are you the King of the Jews?"

Jesus: "You say so."

Narrator: But when Jesus was accused by the chief priests and elders, he did not answer.

Pilate: "Do you not hear how many accusations they make against you?"

Narrator: But Jesus gave him no answer, not even to a single charge, so that the governor was greatly amazed. Now at the festival the governor was accustomed to releasing a prisoner for the crowd, anyone whom they wanted. At that time, they had a notorious prisoner, called Jesus Barabbas. So, after they had gathered, Pilate said to them:

Pilate: "Whom do you want me to release for you, Jesus Barabbas or Jesus who is called the Messiah?"

Narrator: For Pilate realized that it was out of jealousy that they had handed him over. While Pilate was sitting on the judgment seat, his wife sent word to him:

Pilate's Wife: "Have nothing to do with that innocent man, for today I have suffered a great deal because of a dream about him."

Narrator: Now the chief priests and the elders persuaded the crowds to ask for Barabbas and to have Jesus killed. The governor again said to them:

Pilate: "Which of the two do you want me to release for you?"

Choir: "Barabbas."

Pilate: "Then what should I do with Jesus who is called the Messiah?"

Choir: "Let him be crucified!"

Pilate: "Why, what evil has he done?"

Choir: (the choir repeats the following 3 times, louder each time): "Crucify him, Crucify him, Crucify him!"

Narrator: So, when Pilate saw that he could do nothing, but that a riot was beginning, he took some water and washed his hands before the crowd, saying:

Pilate: "I am innocent of this man's blood; see to it yourselves."

Narrator: Then the people as a whole answered: "We and our own families will take the blame for his death!" So, he released Barabbas for them; and after flogging Jesus, he handed him over to be crucified.

Narrator: Then the soldiers of the governor took Jesus into the governor's headquarters, and they gathered the whole cohort around him. They stripped him and put a scarlet robe on him, and after twisting some thorns into a crown, they put it on his head. They put a reed in his right hand and knelt before him and mocked him, saying, "Hail, King of the Jews!" They spat on him, took the reed and struck him on the head. After mocking him, they stripped him of the robe and put his own clothes on him. Then they led him away to crucify him.

Narrator: As they went out, they came upon a man from Cyrene named Simon; they compelled this man to carry his cross. And they came to a place called Golgotha (which means Place of a Skull).

The congregation stands.

They offered him wine to drink, mixed with gall; but when he tasted it, he would not drink it. And when they had crucified him, they divided his clothes among themselves by casting lots; then they sat down there and kept watch over him. Over his head they put the charge against him, which read, "This is Jesus, the King of the Jews." Then two bandits were crucified with him, one on his right and one on his left. Those who passed by derided him, shaking their heads and saying, "You who would destroy the temple and build it in three days, save yourself! If you are the Son of God, come down from the cross." In the same way the chief priests also, along with the scribes and elders,

were mocking him, saying, "He saved others; he cannot save himself. He is the King of Israel; let him come down from the cross now, and we will believe in him. He trusts in God; let God deliver him now, if he wants to; for he said, 'I am God's Son." The bandits who were crucified with him also taunted him in the same way. From noon on, darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon. And about three o'clock Jesus cried with a loud voice:

Jesus: "Eli, Eli, lema sabachthani?"

Narrator: That is, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" When some of the bystanders heard it, they said, "This man is calling for Elijah." At once one of them ran and got a sponge, filled it with sour wine, put it on a stick, and gave it to him to drink. But the others said, "Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come to save him." Then Jesus cried again with a loud voice and breathed his last. At that moment, the temple's curtain was torn in two, from top to bottom. The earth shook, and the rocks were split. The tombs also were opened, and many bodies of the saints who had fallen asleep were raised. After his resurrection, they left the tombs, entered the holy city, and appeared to many. Now when the centurion and those with him, who were keeping watch over Jesus, saw the earthquake and what took place, they were terrified and said:

Centurion: "Truly this man was the Son of God!"

Narrator: Many women were also there, looking on from a distance; they had followed Jesus from Galilee and had provided for him. Among them were Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James and Joseph, and the mother of the sons of Zebedee. When it was evening, there came a rich man from Arimathea, named Joseph, who was also a disciple of Jesus. He went to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus; then Pilate ordered it to be given to him. So, Joseph took the body and wrapped it in a clean linen cloth and laid it in his own new tomb, which he had hewn in the rock. He then rolled a great stone to the door of the tomb and went away. Mary Magdalene and the other Mary were there, sitting opposite the tomb. The next day, that is, after the day of Preparation, the chief priests and the Pharisees gathered before Pilate and said Sir, we remember what that impostor said while he was still alive: 'After three days I will rise again.' Therefore, command the tomb to be made secure until the third day; otherwise, his disciples may go and steal him away, and tell the people, 'He has been raised from the dead,' and the last deception would be worse than the first."

Pilate: "You have a guard of soldiers; go, make it as secure as you can."

Narrator: So, they went with the guard and made the tomb secure by sealing the stone.







After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Now, we celebrate this memorial of our redemption. Recalling Christ's death and his descent among the dead, proclaiming his resurrection and ascension to your right hand, awaiting his coming in glory; and offering to you, from the gifts you have given us, this bread and this cup, we praise you and we bless you.






Communion Motet | "O Saviour of the world"





Worship Note

During the season of Lent, we take an opportunity to slow down. We incorporate sung prayer throughout the service, seeking to contemplate the beauty of holiness together. You will notice musical settings of the prayers of the people, the Lord's prayer, the great Amen at the end of the Eucharist, and the creed (at 11:15). We also highlight the confession and forgiveness of sins, as repentance is a theological theme of the season. Lent might be considered a journey, modeled on Jesus' 40 days in the wilderness, Moses and Israel's 40-year sojourn toward promised land, and indeed on the journey of our own lives. We are each invited into a 40-day discipline that cultivates a posture of worship and adoration. How might God be inviting you, therefore, into the observance of a holy Lent?

A Lenten Musical Note

Early Christians observed "a season of penitence and fasting" in preparation for the Paschal feast, or Easter (The Book of Common Prayer, pp. 264-265). We are invited "to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word" (BCP p. 265). We also experience a sort of liturgical fasting, relinquishing some of the more joyous acclamations such as the singing of "Alleluia" and the *Gloria in excelsis*. Additionally, refrain from our celebratory organ postludes.

Throughout this holy season, we will experience some new musical elements in our services. At both the 9 and 11:15 services we will sing the Lord's Prayer to a simple monotone, allowing the organ and choir to support the congregation through a beautiful harmonization by Owen Burdick, former Director of Music at Trinity Church, Wall Street. Our congregational service music (Kyrie, Sanctus, Agnus Dei) will feature the *New Plainsong* setting by African American composer David Hurd, Director of Music at St. Mary the Virgin, Times Square. We will also sing McNeil Robinson's Great Amen at the conclusion of the Eucharistic Prayer. At our 11:15 service, the Schola will offer movements from William Byrd's *Mass for Four Voices*, one of the most important works of the English Renaissance. Our plainsong psalm settings will be printed in the bulletin for all to sing. And finally, we are invited to join together in Calvin Hampton's gorgeous setting of the Nicene Creed. Director of Music at Calvary Church, Manhattan, Hampton produced a large amount of music specifically for the Episcopal Church's Hymnal 1982 before his tragic death of AIDS in 1984.

So while the focus of Lent is often on self-denial, we hope you will appreciate these musical additions, a celebration of our Anglican musical heritage from the Renaissance to the present day.
