

Religion was at the heart of my family life. I grew up in Winston-Salem, N.C. with my mother, who was a Baptist, and my father, who was an Episcopalian.

My parents had four boys and they required two things of us on Saturday mornings: that we polish our shoes and read a Bible verse—some preparation for Sunday!

For years we attended St. Stephen's Episcopal Church, the oldest African-American church in Winston-Salem and the church where our current Presiding Bishop, Michael Curry, was ordained.

I moved to Atlanta as a young adult and attended several churches in the city. The other churches never felt like home. Generally, they lacked the spark and the energy I felt when I walked into All Saints'. Moreover, All Saints' had more people of color.

Parishioners made sure that I met people, which started <u>connections built to last</u>. I love the community here, which is diverse economically and also involved with the Atlanta arts community. At All Saints', I found my place among people dedicated to making the city better.

Through my work on the vestry and my own financial contributions, I help ensure that our church continues to thrive and that our service ministries are financially stable for years to come. These commitments give me a sense of purpose and meaning, so I am glad to give back.

Recently, I felt the calling to serve on The Bereavement Callers team. This is a group of parishioners trained to host conversations with others also grieving the loss of a loved one. I found I am good at ministering in



this way. I feel a deep connection to those who may need to share their grief. The Bereavement Callers ministry is one of many that enable All Saints' to walk through life stages with parishioners in need of support.

I am fed by the Episcopal liturgy. I know these prayers by heart and cherish saying them each Sunday. These prayers are the foundation of our church community. We own our history, our joy and our friendships while moving toward the future.
