- Icebreaker -

You've heard the statement, "They couldn't pay me enough to do that job."

What job would that be for you?

- 1. Read John 13:34; 15:12, 17; 1 John 3:11. God's command in these passages is, "love one another." But Pastor Tom makes it clear that "God doesn't command our feelings." So, how do you "love one another" even if you don't have feelings of warmth or affection for someone?
- 2. Pastor Tom said that "Loving one another is not mushy sentimentalism...tolerance of evil or taking the path of least resistance." Have you ever been tempted to "love" in these ways to avoid conflict or risk deeper conversation? If so, how did that work out for you and the person you were "loving"?
- 3. Pastor Tom pointed out that it's not up to us to generate this love. Note 1 John 4:7a, 19 where we read that this love comes from God. Tell of a time when you sensed the love of God flowing through you, even when your emotions weren't feeling it. What was your part in becoming a conduit of His love?
- **4.** Read **1John 4:20**. How do you respond to this jarring statement?
- "Loving one another with God's love is the normative evidence of being a Jesus follower" (John 13:35; 1 John 4:20-21). If you were the COD (Christian of the Day) for everyone to see, would a non-believer have enough evidence of God's love to recognize you as a follower of Jesus? If not, what needs to change?


