FROM THE EDITOR'S DESK . . .



(Acts 19:4-5)

Greetings Mount Pleasant Family,

If you have seen the movie the "Matrix", you are familiar with the image above. In the movie, the matrix is a computer-generated dream world designed to keep humans under control. A central character in the movie is a computer programmer by day (Thomas A. Anderson) and a computer hacker by night (Neo) who has always questioned reality and discovers that the reality he perceives is actually the matrix. Neo meets Morpheus (another central character also a computer hacker) who reveals to him that he believes he is 'The One' – the person who has been prophesied to save mankind, bring peace and end the war between humans and machines.

In the theme scriptures recorded by Luke, Paul talked about 'the one' who would come after John the Baptist who they needed to believe in, Jesus. Paul had returned to Ephesus on his third missionary journey, which is the location and backdrop to the conversation he had with some disciples. In verse 2, he asked them had they received the Holy Spirit when they believed to which they replied they had not heard of the Holy Spirit. Paul continues the conversation in verses 3-4 to let them know that John the Baptist's baptism was of repentance but 'the one' who comes after him would baptize those who believe in Jesus with the Holy Spirit. After hearing what Paul said, they were baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus (verse 5) and received the Holy Spirit (verse 6). Repentance and belief in Jesus are the essentials to salvation. Unlike the fictional 'The One' in the Matrix, Jesus is truly 'The One' and only Savior.





YOUR 2025 FINANCIAL PLANNING

The new year is a blank slate--an opportunity to set intentions and take control of your financial future. Start the year strong with these 5 tips to get started:

- 1. **Reflect on Last Year's Finances -** Review your spending, savings, and investment habits from the past year. Identify what worked well and areas for improvement.
- 2. **Create a Budget** Develop a realistic budget that aligns with your goals. Factor in your income, expenses, and savings targets to stay on track.
- 3. **Build an Emergency Fund** Prioritize saving at least 3-6 months' worth of expenses for unexpected events.
- 4. **Reduce and Manage Debt** Focus on paying down high-interest debt first, and avoid taking on unnecessary new debt. This frees up more money for your goals.
- 5. **Track Progress Regularly** Check in on your goals often. Adjust your plan as needed to stay aligned with changes in your life or priorities.



"Look At Jesus"

⁴ Paul said, "John indeed baptized with the baptism of repentance, saying to the people that they should believe in the one who would come after him, that is, in Jesus." ⁵ When they heard this, they were baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus.—Acts 19:4-5 (WEB)

The act of being baptized by John was a public declaration of one's desire to change and lead a life in accordance with God's will. The baptism of repentance holds a deeper spiritual meaning, signifying a turning away from sin to living a righteous life. This is a commitment that can only be achieved when we accept and acknowledge the working of the Holy Spirit in our lives. Understanding and acknowledging the power of the Holy Spirit is essential in our growth of becoming disciples of Christ to prepare for the coming of the Messiah.

I propose that we begin this journey by looking at Jesus. A simple act of changing your focal point by turning the head. When you "look at Jesus" and receive Him into your heart, it begins the Promise. Forgiveness replaces judgement. We are all sinners, and we must acknowledge and confess our sins and ask Jesus for forgiveness. (Romans 6:23). Light replaces darkness and you can see your way. The path of your future leads to the cross.


A thief on his way to eternal damnation, had his destination changed when he defended Jesus during his dying moments on the cross. His simple request of asking Jesus to remember him when he came into his Kingdom, instantly received God's gift of salvation. (Luke 23:39-41). It all began with a look at the Savior and with a repentant heart of faith. He received God's grace and mercy. And that's all he needed. The experience of the repentant thief is a perfect illustration of the biblical truth that salvation is a gift of God's grace that we receive through faith and not by works (Ephesians 2:8–9; Titus 3:5). Just one look at Jesus was the beginning of a glorious truth for the thief and reminds us of the hope for each of us yet today.

The Roberta Martin Singers recorded a song entitled "Only A Look." The song declared that Jesus would defend you and share your burdens. Jesus is merciful and true and will safely bring you through your dark storms.

There is a biblical account of a man named Zacchaeus, who needed and desired a change. He was a tax collector and was despised by the people and labeled a sinner. He was short in stature and was not considered a friend, but a traitor. To compensate for his pain and suffering, he became corrupt and dishonest. But he desired a change and heard about a man that could possibly make a difference in his life. Short in stature and unable to see Jesus through the crowd (Luke 19:3), he ran ahead and climbed a sycamore tree along Jesus's path. When Jesus reached the spot, he looked up at the sycamore tree, called Zacchaeus by name, and told him to come down, for he intended to visit his house. The crowd was shocked that Jesus would want to be the guest of a sinner. Because of a look and spending time with Jesus, Zacchaeus was transformed and pledged to give half of his possessions to the poor and vowed to pay back four times the amount to those he cheated. Here is a concrete example of a man who was changed with just a look from Jesus.

As followers of Christ, let us make a commitment to live a life dedicated to God and to uphold moral and ethical values that will bring us closer to one another as we draw closer to God. Let's realign our lives as a community of believers as we "Look At Jesus."


