Series: Jesus Is (30)

**Title: Blind Beggars to Wide-Eyed Worshipers** 

Scripture: John 9:1-41

- 1. Jesus sees our spiritual blindness and our physical needs. (vs. 1, 35)
  - a. We are all spiritually blind and incapable of seeking Jesus, until Jesus opens our eyes.
- 2. Jesus corrects our incorrect theology. (vs. 2-8)
  - a. We think about sin and the power of sin wrongly.
  - b. We think about suffering and its purpose wrongly.
  - c. We think about God and His Sovereignty wrongly.

We think too much about our own power and not enough about the power of God.

- d. We think about life and ordinary faithfulness wrongly.
- e. We think about healing and how to heal wrongly. (It's not the "how" but the "WHO" in the healing that makes healing possible)
- 3. Jesus transforms us to love problematic people: (vs. 8-35)
  - a. People who know our past and judge us by our past.
  - b. People who do not rejoice when a miracle happens.
  - c. People who emphasize the Sabbath over the Savior.
  - d. People who are not happy for us when we come to Jesus.
  - e. People who prefer policies over people.
- 4. Jesus invites us to confess and believe that He is the Son of Man.
  - a. He reveals Himself, we see Him.
  - b. He speaks, we listen.
  - c. He invites us to come to Him, we worship.
  - d. He judges justly, we are saved when we believe and confess.
- 5. Jesus removes our guilt if we see Him. We remain in our guilt if we refuse to see Him.
