For Lent this year, Rivermont will use resources from A Sanctified Art, entitled "Tell Me Something Good." The package includes beautifully written words for worship, an illustrated devotional booklet, daily devotional cards, children's bulletins, poetry, and gorgeous art.

The creators of this package write, "Lent was originally a season for new converts to learn and prepare for their baptism on Easter. During that time, they would study what was central to Christianity. As we crafted this series, we asked: what are the core, foundational concepts of Jesus' life and ministry? What makes each of these

'good news'? Can we trust that the good news is truly good, even when it challenges us?

"If we're being honest, we can easily distort or sanitize Jesus' teachings. Following Jesus leads to a richer, more expansive life, but it's not necessarily comfortable. We often describe Jesus' ministry as "radical" which comes from the Latin word "radicalis," meaning "root" or "ground."¹ Therefore, the good news should bring us back to our roots, back to what grounds us: loving our neighbor, caring for the vulnerable, pursuing justice and mercy, and resting in God's unending grace.

"The good news is extravagant, untamed, illogical, and persistent. It is joyful—like fine wine saved for celebration. It grows like a mustard seed that flourishes rapidly into a tree to shelter the birds. It smells like expensive perfume poured from an alabaster jar and like crumbling bread passed endlessly through a hungry crowd. It sounds like children laughing and like stones dropped to the ground instead of violently thrown. It feels like feet washed with tender care. The good news is alive in the world.

"We hope this series will provide fertile ground for conversation and worship, rooting our hearts and lives in the expansive goodness of God. This Lent, may the teachings of Jesus lead us forward. Let the good news ground us. And let that good news inspire us to take action in a world desperate to hear, see, and taste what is good." May our worship during the 2026 season of Lent be inspired by these resources.




Table to Table

In recent action, your Session

- Completed the sale of the Blue House and vacant lot on Black Oak Circle.
- Approved the contract hiring of Dr. Paul Rader to moderate session meetings through our transition period and oversee the Mission Study Team as they write the report for presbytery review.
- Approved the contract hiring of Rev Bill Bond to preach as our regular pulpit supply through our transition period, and requesting presbytery to authorize him to serve communion as designated by the session.
- Approved communion in 2026 to be offered on the first Sunday of each month and on Maundy Thursday.
- Heard report from Buildings & Grounds that atrium roof is fixed and new skylights have been installed.
- Established an ad-hoc committee to pursue loan options from presbytery to assist with HVAC repair/replacement costs.

Kristin Kobes Du Mez - Keynote Speaker

Author of the New York Times bestseller *Jesus and John Wayne*, Kristin Du Mez is a writer, speaker, and scholar who explores the intersection of religion, gender, and politics.

Her writing is described as "urgent and sharp-elbowed," and Du Mez does not refrain from presenting the hard truths that history has to offer Americans—and especially American Christians. Her unflinching examination of the American church, however, is ultimately a call to confession, a call to lament, and a call to greater faithfulness.

An academic by training, Du Mez holds a Ph.D. in U.S. history from the University of Notre Dame, but she writes and speaks for popular audiences in an entertaining style that is equal parts winsome and hard-hitting.

Her bylines include The New York Times, the Washington Post, Daily Beast, Religion & Politics, Religion News Service, NBC News.com, and Christianity Today. Her work has also garnered extensive national and international attention, as a feature on NPR's Morning Edition, PBS's Amanpour & Co, the BBC, and in national outlets in China, Japan, Canada, Australia, Spain, Brazil, Germany, and the Netherlands. She is a frequent commenter on religion and politics in the national media at outlets such as the Washington Post, Religion News Service, NPR, CBS, Newsweek, CNN, and the BBC.

As a speaker, she has appeared at colleges and universities across the country, including the University of Notre Dame, Harvard University, Columbia University, UVA Law School, Baylor University, Pepperdine University, and the University of Oklahoma. Her public speaking has also included the Brookings Institution, Faith Angle Forum, Atlanta's TheoEd, Seattle's Crosscut Festival, the University of Chicago's Martin Marty Center, Johns Hopkins' Stavros Niarchos Foundation Angora Institute, and the Center for Pastor Theologians, and she has appeared at churches and faith groups across the religious spectrum.

Du Mez teaches at Calvin University and lives in Grand Rapids, Michigan, with her husband, three kids, and a dog named Paco.
