At the same time, I want to hear where things feel tender. What's been difficult in recent seasons? Where do we feel stretched, or unsure, or weary? What frustrations and challenges you are facing. These are not signs of weakness, they are invitations to be real with one another, and to trust that God meets us most powerfully in places of honesty.

We are in a transition period and transitions are accompanied by change. They are ripe with possibility and peril. Congregations experience hope in tension with grief. Passions may run high. Anxieties may surface. Some people may seem very excited, some may greet the transition, they find themselves curious, excited, and hopeful about the future. And some may be sad their beloved pastors left. Some will remain neutral. People react in different ways, which is part of the process of change in communities. The truth is, in a church system, everyone is affected one way or another.

What this change will look like for us remains to be seen. ("Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old. I am about to do a things or Now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?" Isaiah 43:18-19a.) So, during this transition period, which coincides with summertime when things slow down a little bit, I invite

you to open your hearts and open your take time out to pray for our church, to refresh our vision/mission for the next chapter of our congregational life, to clarify congregational identity and expectations. This transition could be a period of productive activity, exploration, testing, and preparation. It invites innovation, discovery, and learning. It is a great opportunity to take stock of ourselves and our calling; time to stop avoiding being honest with ourselves; time to stop resisting the nagging of the Spirit in our lives; time to walk ahead with an audacious faith in the future. ("Whatever I have, wherever I am, I can make it through anything in the One who makes me who I am." Ephesians 4:13)

So, I will be listening with open ears and a prayerful heart. I'll be learning about your visioning process, how it is setting direction for the life of BUMC, how you imagine your preferred future living out your core values and seeking to realize your aspirational ones. I believe God is always doing a new thing, and the best visions are born when we "pay attention" together. I want to help in shaping this new vision into reality. (I will be your salesman of the vision.)

I want to witness firsthand the beauty of what you've built together, whether it's worship, mission, education, music, youth, outreach, or hospitality. So, you'll find me sitting in on ministry meetings, joining

So, I don't take lightly the privilege of being your pastor. I promise to walk gently, speak truthfully, listen deeply, and pray constantly. I see this season not as a time to rush into change, but as a sacred opportunity to root deeply in relationship.

Thank you in advance for your stories, your time, your wisdom, and your welcome. Thank you for the trust you extend in welcoming me and my family into your lives and your life together. I'm honored to walk this journey with you.

In the May June Banner article 'Camino Pueblo de Dios,' it was mentioned that our current church was our fourth church home. That is not correct; this is, in fact, our fifth church building.

The church was founded in 1840 and, by 1853, had built a church at the corner of Sutton and Dundee. This, our first church building, adjacent to the Barrington Center Cemetery, is still in use for worship. When the railroad arrived, we built more centrally at the corner of Ela and Franklin Streets, a building that was sold and became the

first St. Anne church. The proceeds from that sale purchased a lot at 312 South Cook Street, where we built a new building that is now the Masonic Temple. During the Great Depression, our Hough Street church was purchased and remodeled several times to accommodate the growing congregation. On October 28, 1998, that beloved building was lost to fire, and after four years of worshipping in school gymnasiums and meeting in homes, our current church opened in March 2003.







One of his contributions was to encourage us to use the "Meal Train" computer App to improve our process of providing occasional meals to those going through difficult times. If someone is in a difficult situation due to illness or injuries and needs meals for a while, they can contact the church office or the Care Ministries Team. We will follow up with them to discuss their food preferences, dietary restrictions, or food allergies, as well as the number of days per week they need a meal. The Meal Train app handles all the details, like scheduling, reminders, and updates. We always need volunteers who are willing to provide the meals. It can be a homemade meal, a meal ordered from a restaurant using a delivery service, or even one purchased from a grocery store using Instacart or a similar program. Please get in touch with the church office or Elaine Anderson at RNeaa@comcast. net if you would like to participate in this program by providing meals.

Pastor Mathew was also instrumental in helping us develop our Care Connect Program, which enables congregants to inform the Care Ministries Team if they need any of our services or how they can assist our congregants who require help in various ways.








We are thankful to report that May was a strong month with receipts exceeding expenses by \$20,982. Year-to-Date, we have a deficit (expenses exceeding receipts) in the amount of -\$45,672. The average YTD deficit in May over the past five years is -\$65,000. Summertime brings vacations and many activities. Consequently, we see giving decrease during these months. We humbly ask that you continue to support BUMC throughout the year with your pledges and gifts, as important ministries are taking place, the buildings need to be cared for and planning is underway for the fall.

Why is "Salaries & Benefits" such a large number? Staff compensation is usually the largest investment in a church. For a mid-size church, this would be 40 – 60 % of the total budget. The church staff are the hands and feet of Barrington UMC ministries and their compensation reflects the church's commitment to supporting those who serve. A glimpse of how BUMC staff impact how we live out our mission that we exist to experience and share God's love:

• teach the youngest of God's children about His love

- Salaries & Benefits | clergy salaries and benefits
- **Apportionment** | paid to the UMC Northern Illinois Conference to support local churches, conference services, conference missions, clergy leadership

- coordinate the efforts of missions that impact those in need both near and far (from our local community meal to Growing Hope Globally)
- many are involved in various ways to make worship a meaningful and engaging experience
- support for the welcome team, caring ministries, fellowship, building our relationship with God and sharing His love with others
- coordinate mission trips that not only serve those in need, but impacts spiritual growth of those who participate

Exciting times are ahead as we welcome Pastor David and begin a new season of experiencing and sharing God's love. By giving our time, talents and treasures, we seek to create God's Kingdom here on earth.




