uring the summer in junior high school – when it was too hot to breathe, let alone play in the yard – I was one of those kids who struggled to keep themselves entertained. I could only play Monopoly with my brothers for so long. So, I would wander upstairs to complain to my mother about there being nothing to do. I'd ask for a go-kart like my neighbor had, or a Nintendo, or a ride to get ice cream at Dairy Ripple. But every time I did that, she would give me the hush treatment. Dramatically. It was as if the valve on the end of a gas station air hose broke.

"Shhhhhhhhhh!" she'd say as her arms flailed around like Dr. Octopus in a battle with Spiderman. I remember this happening anytime you interrupted her when she was watching her favorite soap operas on CBS. There was no breaking through her wall of television attentiveness.

One day, admitting defeat, I threw myself down on the couch next to her. "What was so great about these soap operas," I thought. Well, I got hooked on them, too. Even after the summer ended, I continued to watch. I watched many of them well into college.

One of my favorite parts of those serial dramas was how they were one of the only places where you'd see another actor jump into a role on a temporary or recurring basis. "Today, the role of Brandon Spaulding will be played by ..." the announcer would say as some stranger walked onto the scene. I always found it to be a cool thing, because it was one of those rare spaces where the person playing the part wasn't nearly as important as the part they played. In some places, the people telling stories aren't nearly as important as the story of faith,

arrington UMC is in a time of transition. In fact, we are managing many transitions all at once. Our Christian Community worship service has welcomed retired elder Mario Mayer to offer preaching and teaching, while Luis Vega continues in his role as pastor and chaplain to BUMC and to the Carpentersville/Elgin/Barrington/Cary communities. This transition has brought new energy to the worshipping community and additional opportunities for small group study and prayer.

On May 3, BUMC will say its final goodbye to Pastor Chris and on July 6 we will worship for the first time with our new appointed pastor, Reverend David Lagos-Fonseca. Our new pastor will bring his own energy to our community. He will want to get to know all of us and begin to understand what makes this a special church – a process which will take some time. We look forward to welcoming him with grace, peace, and joy.

And, it is with sadness that we will say goodbye to Pastor Matthew who has steadied the ship through many storms. He led our transition to online worship. He has shepherded our care ministry and welcome teams. He stepped up to lead worship and staff during each of Pastor Chris' leaves and, since February, has helped us move forward through both our leadership transition and a difficult budgeting process. In order to maintain the viability of our church, Pastor Matthew and church leadership requested that the cabinet eliminate the position of Associate Pastor.

Now, the ball is in our court. With less staffing and new leadership, we all have to recognize that additional volunteers will be needed to take on key roles which may have migrated to staff. This is an opportunity to participate in important ways and build camaraderie. Please take thoughtful time to consider your own gifts, talents, and availability. Be ready when someone suggests something is needed to be the one to step up or step aside as necessary to help.

This is not the first time our congregation has transitioned – this is our fourth building and Pastor David will be our 64th pastor (including associates) since 1844. On October 28, 1998, the church on Hough Street burned to the ground. Members gathered across the street, watching in shock. Together they sang hymn #558: "The church is not a building, the church is not a steeple ... I am the church! You are the church! We are the church together!" And together they journeyed for over four years as they built a new building and created a new reality for God's people at 98 Algonquin Road. There are few transitions as dramatic as what this church already accomplished.



In keeping with the climate justice campaign of United Women in Faith, we pass along a few tips from United Methodist Creation Justice.

The topic this month: Our #1 job

The Bible reminds us, "God saw everything God had made and indeed, it was very good" (Genesis 1:31), and humanity's number one job was to tend and care for the garden God gave us (Genesis 2:15). The same is true today. Find your "garden" to care for Earth.

Plant plants that naturally grow in your area. Native plants require less water than lawns or annuals, help prevent erosion, and do not need fertilizers. They

reduce air pollution and increase shelter and food for pollinators and birds. For suggestions, visit: https://citizensforconservation.org/native-plants/

Engage children in nature activities. Grow something together, like a flower, tomato plant, cucumber, or pumpkin vine. Plant seeds outdoors or indoors, using cups or pots. Talk about the delight in God's creation you feel. As you work together, you'll foster a new generation that loves and cares for nature.

Plant a pizza garden Plant, tend, and harvest tomatoes, peppers, onions, and herbs. When ready, hold a homemade pizza party and offer a blessing to connect

the experience with God, the source of all growth. Feel the joy of growing and sharing fresh produce.

The more you choose native plants and other perennials, the less you will need to buy in the future. John Wesley encouraged us, "save all you can" to "give all you can." He'd be pleased; and butterflies, bees, birds and your budget will be happy.

Plant for pollinators—plant for our future. Butterflies, bees, and birds are essential for the growth of food for humans, but pollinators face extinction due to habitat destruction and pesticide use. Planting even a small patch can support their survival.

Food waste—both corporate and personal—is the #3 cause of greenhouse gas. Composting food scraps allows you to fill the land with nutrients and avoid the landfill. Explore your options for composting: industrial composting services, backyard bins, and networks of friends contributing to a common composter.

Shop locally at a farmers market or community garden and reduce the carbon emissions that come from shipping food long distances. Eat sustainably with more fruits and veggies and reduce the cost to your body. Fresh veggies and fruits stay fresh longer than store-bought, too. Give thanks for those whose work feeds you and others.

On Sunday, March 9th, Pastor Matthew posed the question: "What if Jesus came to Your Neighborhood?" I don't know the answer to his question, but I have a very good idea about what would happen if he came to Trinity Center on the third Saturday of the month.

Jesus would partake of the community meal. He, like the others who came, would welcome being provided with their daily bread. (Many of us pray: "Give us this day our daily bread," even though it's the last thing we need to worry about.) Before he took his meal, he would approach the volunteers, thank them for their service, and offer to help in any way he could. Only then would he take his meal and sit with the people – being a companion to the lonely, a cheerleader for the discouraged, sympathetic to those in mourning.

In time, the volunteers would serve themselves and join the company. Perhaps they would sit with Jesus and inquire about his life - how hard it was for him to make a living, how unfairly the people were treated by those in positions of authority, and how he hoped for a better world based on everyone "loving their neighbors."

I'm pretty sure Jesus can always be found in Carpentersville.


Thanks to the generosity of those who attended, the event raised an additional \$1,400 for the FISH Food Pantry — a vital organization that helps provide food and support to local families in need.

Spring is coming! We are making plans! In order for the church garden to continue to supply fresh vegetables to families who are in need we want you to be a member of the team. Your help is essential for success.

In the last 10 years the garden has provided 230,000 pounds of fresh vegetables. Last year we supported 9 area food pantries as well as our own Community Meal. We hope to provide more than last year's total of 9,000 pounds. Last year was difficult with an overabundance of weeds impacting the crops.

This year we are planning to grow several varieties of zucchini, broccoli tomatoes, sweet and hot peppers and pumpkins. We also will grow winter squash and cucumbers.

The main tasks are:


- deploy the irrigation system May
- transplant young plants into the garden and place tomato cages late May, early June
- weed, weed on and ever going June thru September. The more effective our weeding program the more harvest to share
- rototilling June thru September to control weeds
- harvesting late July through September

All tasks are "weather permitting"

Humboldt Park UMC se está reubicando

uestra iglesia ha tenido una larga asociación con la Iglesia Metodista Unida de Humboldt Park (HPUMC). El 6 de abril asistimos a un culto especial de celebración y puesta en servicio mientras HPUMC cierra sus puertas en su ubicación actual. El servicio bilingüe celebró la asombrosa historia y el impacto de la congregación HPUMC durante más de 100 años. La pastora Paula Cripps-Vallejo recordó a todos los presentes que "tenemos la suerte de ser una bendición" y "nuestras acciones tienen que reflejar nuestras oraciones".

La congregación en Humboldt Park comenzó en 1901 como una reunión de escuela dominical para inmigrantes alemanes recién llegados. La congregación siguió creciendo y en 1928 se construyó una iglesia con apartamentos. La propiedad fue diseñada para ayudar a quienes necesitan viviendas asequibles y de calidad. A medida que las sociedades cambiaron, el servicio pasó al inglés. ¡En 1947 la congregación había pagado el edificio!

Durante los años siguientes, la iglesia creció y con el tiempo la demografía del vecindario cambió de una comunidad predominantemente blanca a una creciente población hispana. HPUMC sirvió a ambas comunidades con un pastor que hablaba inglés y español. En la década de 1980, la iglesia lanzó los Servicios Sociales de Humboldt Park (HPSS) para abordar la falta de vivienda y el hambre en el vecindario. Durante las siguientes dos décadas, el ministerio alimentó, alojó y brindó apoyo integral a miles de personas. Se sirvieron más de 1,3 millones de comidas, las despensas de alimentos apoyaron a más de

Se sirvieron más de 1,3 millones de comidas, las despensas de alimentos apoyaron a más de 2.000 familias, se proporcionó alojamiento a más de 6.000 hombres y se ofreció alojamiento de transición a 1.500 mujeres y niños.

2.000 familias, se proporcionó alojamiento a más de 6.000 hombres y se ofreció alojamiento de transición a 1.500 mujeres y niños. BUMC estuvo asociado con HPUMC durante este tiempo brindando cenas dominicales y asistencia financiera. HPSS añadió énfasis a la seguridad financiera y de ingresos como medio para lograr la estabilidad de la vivienda. HPSS es ahora el Centro para Cambiar

Vidas (CCL). BUMC continúa apoyando a CCL hasta el día de hoy.

En 2020, HPUMC votó a favor de vender su edificio histórico a LUCHA (lucha.org), asegurando el legado de la iglesia de viviendas asequibles en un vecindario que se gentrifica rápidamente.

En 2022, HPUMC amplió su ministerio para atender a los migrantes recién llegados, principalmente de Venezuela. Nuevamente, BUMC ayudó con la entrega de alimentos y apoyo financiero.

En enero de 2025 se concretó la venta del inmueble. LUCHA está renovando los 12 apartamentos existentes y agregando 10 unidades más sin desplazar a los residentes actuales.

La congregación busca mudarse a un vecindario donde puedan continuar acercándose a la comunidad hispana/latina y brindar un espacio inclusivo para el crecimiento espiritual. BUMC continuará caminando junto a esta congregación en el próximo capítulo de lo que Dios tiene reservado para esta comunidad de fe.



Humboldt Park UMC is relocating

ur church has had a long partnership with the Humboldt Park United Methodist Church (HPUMC). On April 6, we attended a special worship of Celebration and Recommissioning as HPUMC is closing its door in its current location. The bilingual service celebrated the amazing history and impact of the HPUMC congregation over 100 years. Pastor Paula Cripps-Vallejo reminded all present that "we're blessed to be a blessing" and "our actions have to reflect our prayers".

The congregation in Humboldt Park began in 1901 as a Sunday School gathering for newly arrived German immigrants. The congregation continued to grow and in 1928 it built a church with apartments. The property was designed to support those in need of affordable and quality housing. As societies shifted the service transitioned to English. In 1947 the congregation had paid off the building!

During the following years, the church grew and over time the neighborhood demographics changed from a predominantly white community to a growing Hispanic population. HPUMC

served both communities with an English and a Spanish speaking pastor. In the 1980s the church launched the Humboldt Park Social Services (HPSS) to address homelessness and hunger in the neighborhood. Over the next 2 decades the ministry fed, housed and provided holistic support to thousands. More than 1.3 million meals were served, food pantries supported over 2,000 families, shelter was provided to over 6,000 men and transitional housing

was offered to 1,500 women and children. BUMC was in partnership with HPUMC during this time providing Sunday evening meals and financial assistance. HPSS added focus to financial and income security as a means to achieve housing stability. HPSS is now the Center for Changing Lives (CCL). BUMC continues to support CCL to this day.

In 2020, HPUMC voted to sell its historic building to LUCHA (lucha.org), ensuring the church's legacy of affordable housing in a rapidly gentrifying neighborhood.

In 2022, HPUMC expanded its ministry to serve newly arrived migrants, primarily from Venezuela. Again, BUMC helped with food deliveries and financial support.

In January, 2025 the sale of the property was finalized. LUCHA is renovating the 12 existing apartments and adding 10 more units without displacing current residents.

The congregation is looking to relocate to a neighborhood where they can continue outreach to the Hispanic/Latino community and provide inclusive space for spiritual growth. BUMC will continue to walk alongside this congregation on the next chapter of what God has in store for this faith community.





Our BUMC Parsonage Gets a Fresh Start

As we prepare to welcome Pastor David and his wife, Pastor Shirley, members of our Board of Trustees are hard at work sprucing up the church parsonage. Nestled in a warm and welcoming Barrington subdivision, the home has faithfully served

our congregation's pastors since the 1990s and is now receiving some much-needed updates.

A microburst in 2024 left its mark, taking down a large tree in the front yard and cracking the front stoop. Plans are underway to level and retile the stoop, restoring safety and visual appeal.

The home's three sliding glass doors, located along the back of the first floor, are also being upgraded. Two have already been replaced, and the final door is scheduled for installation soon. Several aging windows that have begun

to fail will also be replaced to ensure the home remains comfortable and energy efficient.

Inside, the parsonage is coming to life with fresh paint and flooring. Thanks to the generous help of some of our congregation members, the living and dining rooms are being repainted. At the same time, Pastor David and his family have graciously offered to paint the bedrooms themselves. Overdue for replacement, the second-floor carpeting is being swapped out for durable solid surface flooring.

Outdoors, the parsonage boasts a wonderful patio and grill area perfect for summer gatherings. With a bit of spring cleaning, it will soon be ready for use again. Our Trustees also hope to refresh the home's exterior by painting the shutters and brick, enhancing the property's curb appeal.

With everyone pitching in, the house will be a warm and welcoming home for Pastor David, Pastor Shirley, and their family.





I hope you will take the time to read through the following update, which is intended to educate, inform and answer questions about how we are doing and how our finances impact our future work together.


2025 FIRST QUARTER FINANCIAL UPDATE

How is the BUMC budget developed?

We begin by determining the needs of our work groups and operations to live into the visions and values of Barrington UMC. Our work groups are Children & Family, Youth, Adult, Care, and Welcoming Ministries, as well as Fellowship, Missions, Music and Worship & Arts. Operations includes Office, Finance, Communications, Trustees and Staff. The Director of Finance meets individually with the Chair or person responsible for each of these areas to determine the budget for that group. The next step is to forecast what receipts will be for the year. Receipts include pledges, unpledged giving, plate offerings, building usage, NACA donation, interest, and offsets from other funds. If we are underfunded for the year, this amount is our "gap".

The budget is then taken to the Finance Committee for review, revisions and approval. The final step is to take a motion to the Church Leadership Council for approval.

The chart below shows a comparison of the total annual budget, approved apportionment amount and the gap for the past five years. The 2025 budget



(\$1,083,263) is the lowest it has been in five years, the apportionment amount (\$83,898) is almost double of the 2024 approved amount, and the gap (the amount we are underfunded) is \$36,500 less than 2024. For the past five years, we have allocated \$50,000 of reserve funds to reduce the gap.

How are we doing at the end of the first quarter?

Historically we have received around 24% of the annual budgeted giving amount by the end of March. We always have a cumulative underfunding throughout most of the year (primarily due to the gap) and have a substantial increase at the end of the year. Last year we were gifted 20% of the annual contributions in December and 32% of the annual contributions were received in November and December. We are not unique in that giving decreases during the summer months. While we most certainly are grateful for all gifts, no matter when they are received, we would joyfully welcome some of the year-end gifts earlier in the year.
