ICE BREAKER: Have you ever made a promise that has never been broken?

BACKGROUND

God called Abram at the age of 75 to leave Haran to go to the country that the Lord would show him, promising to make of him a great nation. Though God had promised Abram the land of the Canaanites, there was a great famine forcing his family into Egypt. Sometime later Pharaoh sent Abram and his family out of Egypt along with many possessions that they had gained while in the land. After surviving the famine, Abram and his nephew Lot separated because their herds were too large. Lot took what he saw was the better land while Abram took the other land. While Lot was tending his herds, he was kidnapped by the kings of the neighboring nations along with all his possessions. After hearing from one of Lot's servants who escaped, Abram went out and fought the kings to get his nephew back. After the battle, Melchizedek, Priest of the Most High God, blessed Abram with bread and wine and Abram gave him one tenth of everything he had.

After these things, God came to Abram in a dream and told him that he would be blessed with a great many children, as numerous as the stars, and made a covenant with him. Abram believed God and it was counted to him as righteousness. Sometime later after Sarai had been unable to bear children, she convinced him to take her servant Hagar as a wife, and she bore him a child. God made his covenant with Abram who he called Abraham because he would be father of many. As a sign, Abraham's descendants would be circumcised. The Lord kept His promise even in Abram and Sarai's old age by blessing her with their child and changing her name to Sarah. Their son Isaac would carry the covenant of the Lord to the next generations.

- 1. How do we take our knowledge of God's covenant with Abraham and apply it to how we live under the new covenant today?
- 2. How are we called to walk out life with those we know that are most effected by the current state of Israel?
