Discovering Your Wholeness with Pastor Don Francis





United Women in Faith Reading Program

Do you love to read? Do you like to nourish your soul, strengthen your understanding, and better equip yourself for God's work? Then, why not join the Reading Program and commit to one of the reading plans. The basic plan involves reading one book in each of five categories and regular reading of the Response Magazine (publication of UWF).

Book Categories

- Education for Mission
- Leadership Development
- Nurturing for Community
- Social Action
- Spiritual Growth



The national UWF chooses new books each year, and books from the last five years are included in the program. **All the information is online** at uwfaith.org/read. **Or visit the church library** when the office is open (ask for the key) and look for the UWF shelf with a binder of the reading lists, some books to borrow, and issues of the Response Magazine. Many books on the list are at the public library or available through local bookstores or online.

Sign up for the program on the clipboard in the church library and use the checklist to sign books in and out. If you purchase books, consider donating them to the UWF Reading Program for others to use when you are finished. Encourage women you know to read the same book and talk about it. Ask others for recommendations.

Completion forms are available in the binder and can be turned in to the Reading Program Secretary, Mary Mueller, by August 31. She'll get them to our district person before the statewide UWF conference. If you have questions, contact Mary at migmueller.uef@gmail.com.

The February Mission of the Month is Unity in Hope School, Pakistan

The school is located in a slum designated for Christians. Pakistan is an Islamic state and 98% of its inhabitants identify as Muslim. The remaining 2% (mostly Christian) receive no education or support in any way. The school is in an area with no running water, no trash removal, no electrical grid, no schools, and very limited employment opportunities. Unity in Hope School is the only Christian school in the area of approximately 50,000 Christians.

The school's mission is to provide basic needs assistance, and education assisting students to break the cycle of poverty.

\$250 provides food, clean water, uniforms, backpacks, and tuition for one child for a year.


Mission At Home continued

The results of Mission At Home can be found around the building - from the basement to the second floor. In the Sanctuary, the baptismal font is refreshed, the chairs are repaired, the cushions in the pews are free of wax/dirt, and the stair edge scratches are gone.

Painting occurred in the basement, Narthex ramps, plus several second-floor rooms. Over 20 wall corners have protective molding (more to come) while ceiling tiles were replaced throughout. Ceiling light covers were also replaced. The catacombs in the basement were reorganized with much cut up and more thrown out (see the last picture of trash on Glen). The tables and chairs in Fellowship Hall, and elsewhere, were cleaned while the Prop room was organized. All with breakfast and lunch.




Lake Lucerne Camp | Kids Ages 7-11 | June 18-21

Appalachia Service Project | High School | July 15-23





Register now for spring North Shore School for Seniors classes!

North Shore School for Seniors (NSSS) offers 40 classes for the spring terms, including many NEW topics. Participants can stretch their muscles and minds, while meeting others AND having fun. All classes meet at United Methodist Church of Whitefish Bay.



The spring session is **Monday**, **March 6-Tuesday**, **March 28** (Term 1) and **Monday**, **April 17-Tuesday**, **May 9** (Term 2). "Motion Monday" classes are Tai Chi, Zumba Gold, Chair Yoga, and Meditation. On Tuesday, classes cover a vast range of topics. Classes meet from one to eight times, depending on the subject matter. On Monday, the school is open from 10:00 a.m.-2:00 p.m. and on Tuesdays, the school is open from 9 a.m.-3:30 p.m. Fees are \$10 per class session. For example, one-week classes are \$10 and eight-week classes are \$80.

Bringing Our Youth Home!

A marathon meeting of the City of Milwaukee's Zoning Committee on January 10th gave a 5-0 approval of a new youth correctional rehab facility to be built at 7930 W. Clinton St. (Remember the old DOT auto emissions facility?). Why am I telling you this?

Because it is one of the last steps on a long journey since fall, 2021, by our church as a member of MICAH, and the Chaney Center board to bring our children home to Milwaukee from the Lincoln Hills/Copper Falls detention center which is 4 hours away and has an abusive history.

And what is the Chaney Center you may ask? It is a successful pre-release center at 30th and Fond du Lac which enables 100 men who are within 6-18 months of their release to connect with jobs, to line up housing and to reconnect with family and community for a successful reentry reducing recidivism. The DOC, State Department of Corrections, was going to raze the Chaney Center in order to build the youth rehabilitation facility!!

MICAH and the Chaney board worked behind the scenes and publicly, with weekly informational picketing at Chaney since fall, 2021, to keep Chaney open and build a new youth facility. Just to let you know, the youth facility will house 32 youth which is recommended by research for positive outcomes. The Wisconsin DOC has committed to replacing punitive approaches with restorative justice programming including trauma-informed care, therapeutic, recreational, educational treatment programming. It is based on the Missouri model. https://www.aecf.org/resources/the-missouri-model.

You can be grateful as a resident of Wisconsin for this change in direction.

The Zoning meeting was the last of many steps MICAH has actively involved itself which allowed for public comment. There is one more approval needed at the Milwaukee Common Council meeting on January 17th which we hope and anticipate there may be a final approval to go forward. That allows for both the Chaney Center and the youth rehab facility to exist. *The Milwaukee Common Council approved the zoning change 9 to 2 with one abstention. Now onto the state for next steps.*

Continue to support the good work MICAH is doing. These are youth who have demonstrated seriously flawed thinking and behavior patterns. But they are youth, whose brains and thought patterns are still forming. And they are our youth, for whom we are all responsible. We believe there are no throw-away youth. Every person is redeemable.

These Guidelines have been distributed to ministry leaders and are available in the church office. Members of our team will be happy to discuss the Guidelines as needed and will also assist Anne Eversfield in reviewing articles submitted for publication.

Now we are beginning a significant project to make improvements to our website, including adding a photo library of events, a more complete calendar and list of ministries and events, and a secure member directory. Those of you who lead ministries will be asked to "own" the content for your ministry area and to submit content for your webpage to Georgia Lindfors at georgiamavrinac@gmail.com, hopefully using the Communication Guidelines. Georgia and Anne Eversfield will input your content onto the website. We encourage you to peruse the website and send your questions, comments or suggestions to Georgia or Anne.

Soon we will also begin sending postcards to new residents of Whitefish Bay welcoming them to our community and inviting them to visit our church.

We have just scratched the surface. There is much more we can do and we are excited about the many opportunities to tell people about our church and its ministries!



Notes from the Board

At the January ALB meeting, we were blessed by the news that the Foundation Committee had approved \$46,000 to make much needed upgrades to the A/V and livestream systems. This will help us maintain and expand our growing online ministry and remove mounting technical challenges to providing higher quality worship and streaming.

As Pastor Don later reported to the Board, we appear to be averaging over 90 people per week worshiping with us online. In-person attendance is also rising, albeit slowly, and all four Christmas Eve services were well attended, averaging 162 people at each.

New Leadership Roles

This was Brady Henderson's first meeting serving as Chair of ALB following Kathy Schluter's 7 years of service. Lori Aeschbacher is now graciously serving as ALB Secretary and Nancy Anderson as Treasurer.

As the SPRT has been working to catch-up the work of nominations for lay leadership positions, we now have Jeff McClellan, Jenny Fisher, and Beth Groble as Lay Leaders, and Kathy Schluter, and Tony Mortellaro as lay delegates to Annual Conference.

Tom Van Cleave was approved to serve as Vice-Chair of Trustees.

Pastor's Report

In addition to rising worship attendance on Sundays, WNL is offering 3 new classes and a Lenten devotional booklet is in the works. Thanks go to Dick Steinmetz for all the work he has put in to coordinate Mission at Home on January 21. Thanks to all who will be attending the "How to Reach & Welcome New People" seminar on February 4th in Oak Creek, and Tom Van Cleave for organizing and donating our registration for this event.

Branding and Marcom Committee Update

Digital surveys are being developed and will be sent to people active on email to collect thoughts on a variety of issues relating to the church. The surveys may vary slightly in length and content based on participation, with the goal to collect as many opinions as possible.

A flyer and banners are planned for Lent and Easter to communicate what's happening around the church. Communications guidelines are being developed and will be sent to the ministry leaders. A Welcome/Invitational postcard is being developed to send to new residents in the area. Georgia Lindfors and Kathy Walker are working with the Shelby platform for website improvements and customization. A motion was approved to allow up to \$2500 to be spent for these changes.

Trustees

New signage concerning accessibility is starting to be installed. Work packages on the houses have been put together. These identify items that need attention. The team is looking into what work needs to be done at the Danbury entrance as well as putting together preliminary plans for the Narthex, which could include reworking the coffee area, signage, new flooring and lighting, and reshuffling some areas for better flow. The plan is to have a detailed Narthex design by the end of March with general Q&A sessions to be held. These sessions will include topics like what should all be included in a Capital Campaign.

Notes

Financial Update

Thanks to a strong December, the operating budget increased from -\$25,770 in November to \$60,450 in December. While nice to be positive, the surplus wasn't as large as it was this time last year. The Capital Fund is at \$56,704 and Properties Capital Funds stood at \$213,507. The Future Fund balance was unchanged at \$91,620.

A team will be formed to develop a plan for the Stewardship campaign and Consecration Sunday to be held on May 7th.

Adjustments to ALB Meetings & Structure

Several changes were approved for future ALB meetings which include, hold the closed session at 6:30 with the general meeting starting at 7 p.m., preapprove items not needing discussion (like meeting minutes), assign time periods for each agenda item and send out information pertaining to agenda topics prior to the meeting. We hope these will help meetings become shorter and more accessible to a broader set of members.

Facilities Use Policy

We have identified a need for a consistent policy and process for groups using the building. This project is in the early stages with more to follow.
