When I began my ministry in Susanville, CA, there was a man among the church members who resided in a nursing home two hours away. One day, I decided to visit him. As I drove through the woods and mountains, I arrived at the nursing home. When he met me, he requested that I would sing songs because he had heard that my voice was beautiful. I was delighted to accept his invitation!

The nursing home had a large, open space that resembled a concert hall. There was a grand piano on a raised stage, and from the round balcony on the second floor, people in wheelchairs could sit and watch the performance.

I walked to the grand piano, opened the lid, and began to sing for him. As I sang, people who were coming and going stopped and listened attentively. From the upper floor, people emerged from their rooms and looked down at the piano and me, captivated by the music. Soon, the entire space was filled with people in wheel-chairs.

After singing several songs, I talked to them, "Hello everyone, it's wonderful to meet you. Now, I'll receive song requests. If you'd like to sing with me, please let me know your favorite song." People began to engage with me and the music, and it quickly became an instant concert collaboration with the nursing home residents. Some of them responded to the refrains of the songs, and we sang together, especially the refrain parts. It seemed that their minds were awakened, and something profound was happening. It was truly a beautiful moment.

At the end of my performance, I briefly spoke about the continuous journey of life. For those who love God, there is no death; it's merely a gateway to the incredible life God has prepared for us. As I left the nursing home, I reflected on the events that had transpired. I felt the laughter of God in my heart, and I was filled with gratitude for the unexpected gift that had come my way. It was clear that this experience was a call to ministry at the nursing home.

I feel God is guiding me towards the nursing home ministry in West Bend, too. So, I reached out to Sarah, the Activity Manager at the Samaritan Health Center Nursing Home. Our meeting was incredibly encouraging and positive. I'll begin the ministry at the end of July and Sarah kindly provided me with the best time slot, every last Monday at 10:30 am. I'm now on the lookout for three more nursing homes to visit monthly.

One thing I got to know was that many residents do not have family members or regular visitors. If you're passionate about holding the hands of the lonely, offering prayers, and becoming their friends, please let me know. My heart goes out to the residents there who need our support, listening ears, and loving presence. Would you be willing to join me on this journey?



Christian Education: Kathy Schneider

- a) Fall Sunday School curriculum has been ordered.

- c) Three (3) adults have been asked to teach one (1) Sunday a month. Kathy is waiting for responses from them. After she gets their responses, three (3) assistants will be asked. Sunday School will be upstairs in Youth Room.

HIGHLIGHTS OF ACCOUNTABLE LEADERSHIP BOARD MEETING July 8, 2025

Finance Report: Doug Fitzgerald

Doug Fitzgerald made a motion to transfer the remaining amount of \$60,423.79 of the Elaine Gust Fund from the Foundation for upcoming improvements. Seconded by Thomas Thomas.

Treasurer's Report: Eric Peters

Income: The YTD (2025) total income gain is \$110,438 with a budgeted amount for the entire year of \$395,825. This is 27.9% of the budgeted amount for the current year. June 2025 pledged/unpledged amounts are down \$1,214 compared to May 2025.

Expenses. Total YTD (2025) expenses are \$196,591 with a budgeted amount for the year of \$395,825. This is 49.67% of the budgeted amount for the current year.

Booked Income: The booked income YTD (2025) loss is -\$86,154.

Investment Income: YTD foundation withdrawal is \$150,000. YTD foundation Deposits are \$0. Current checking has \$47,315 balance as of June 30, 2025.

Parsonage Fund: YTD Parsonage withdrawal is \$3,000. YTD parsonage total deposits \$0.00. We are using money to pay utilities & maintenance with this fund. Current balance in 40213 is \$559.00. June 2025 Utilities/Maintenance amount for parsonage was \$1818.00.

Notes from Eric:

- *Stock Market was up for June 2025
- *Unpledged/Pledged amounts are up compared to May 2025
- *Expenses are up for June, mostly in Payroll and Maintenance.
- *Focus on more income & continue to use cautionary measures for our expenses

Motion was made by Brett Barnett, seconded by Doug Fitzgerald, to approve the report. Motion Carried.

Trustees: Brett Barnett

- a) Sanctuary Air Conditioning: Albiero was called for a service call but were unable to repair the A/C. It was suggested by them to replace the unit. Brett called Mid-City Plumbing and they were able to repair it with a new digital thermostat and repair to compressor. It may last the rest of the season but will need replacing soon. Quotes will be coming from both companies.
- **b)** *Roof:* Brett found info from the roof replacement from 2006. A loan was taken out for the roof in the amount of \$60,000 and repaid in 2 years. No decision made yet about replacement.
- c) *Parsonage Garage door:* The door came down on Pastor Hae-Jeong's car while backing out. Brett called for repairs. Cost was \$1100.00. No damage done to her car.
- **d)** *Parsonage Lawn Care:* An electric lawn mower was purchased and Michael Lewis, custodian, has been cutting the grass.

Life Together

by Dietrich Bonhoeffer

Dietrich Bonhoeffer, one of the most influential Christian martyrs in history, bequeathed to humanity a legacy of theological creativity and spirituality that continues to intrigue people from a variety of backgrounds. **Life Together** gathers Bonhoeffer's 1938 reflections on the character of Christian community, based on the common life that he and his seminarians experienced at the Finkenwalde Seminary and in the Brothers House there. The stimulus for the writing of **Life Together** was the closing of the preacher's seminary at Finkenwalde by the Nazis.

While Bonhoeffer wrote with his own seminary community in mind, he intended **Life Together** to have a more universal impact and spoke of a mission and responsibility of the church as a whole.

- 2. **Log in** with your User ID and password that you set up with Thrivent OR if this is your first time logging on as a user, set up your user name and password (You need your Thrivent ID for the set up process).
- 3. Click on "Membership Overview".
- 4. Go to the Action team area of the page and click on "Learn More and Apply Now".

BISHOP DAN SCHWERIN State of the Church Address



"The UMC is a sanctuary church—affirming the sacred worth of all. Our resistance is nonviolent love. We will not be neutral about loving our neighbor.

The U.S. Constitution applies to all people in the U.S.—not just citizens.

Diversity, equity, and inclusion are essential to the Body of Christ."

In his State of the Church Address, Bishop Schwerin reflected on the feeling of rootlessness many experience today, contrasting it with the rootedness the Church once represented. Drawing on the story from Acts 27, where Paul and the centurion Julius faced a storm at sea, he asked, "What good is Eucharist in a storm?" and reminded us: we are the body of Christ *in* the storm. Leaders are called to name the moment we're in, listen for the Spirit, and point toward the shore ahead. He emphasized the importance of a renewed focus on ¶601—the annual conference's mission to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world—through efforts like leadership cohorts, MCCI, ICD, Fresh Expressions, and partnerships with Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary. He encouraged experimentation, innovation, and reading *How to Lead When You Don't Know Where You're Going* by Susan Beaumont.
