# We're not Lacking if We Have the Same Mind


**DEVOTIONALS: 22 - 28 JANUARY 2023** 

Read: 1 Corinthians 1:1-18

In Paul's letter to the Corinthians, he declares that the church has everything it needs to be the church. That's an amazing and powerful statement of faith. Too often, we spend time wishing – wishing we had more people or more resources or more volunteers or more ministries/activity. But what if, instead, we were simply thankful? Thankful for the gifts we have, for the people we have, for how they give of themselves and their resources and give thanks for the mission and witness that we are able to do week by week.

Of course, we want to encourage more. But not because we are lacking. No, we encourage more because we don't want anyone to miss out on the joy of being the body of Christ, the joy of serving, the joy of worship. Let us come from an attitude of abundance and not

scarcity.



"Have the Same Mind?" - this is a hard one, don't you think? In our increasingly antagonistic society and world, to consider the community as having the same mind as a sign of the kin-dom, might be a bit of an overreach. Yet this is the call from Paul's first letter to the Corinthians. In fact, this is the first call the Apostle Paul gives us in this letter, so he at least thinks it is important.

Yes, just reading verse 10 will tell us how seriously Paul takes it as he makes his approach to all that is going on in the church at Corinth.

"Now I appeal to you, brothers and sisters, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all of you be in agreement and that there be no divisions among you, but that you be united in the same mind and the same purpose" (I Corinthians 1:10).

How many times does he say the same thing in that single verse? "Be in agreement" and "no divisions among you" and "be united in the same mind" and "the same purpose." All repetitions or at best nuances of the same idea. For Paul, what is tearing the church apart is the fact that they don't agree. Unfortunately, Paul doesn't tell us exactly what it means to be of the same mind. Does it mean that we have to agree on every single point of doctrine and ethics? Does it mean that we have to read the scriptures in exactly the same way every time? Does it mean that there is absolutely no room for differences or nuance? That you have to apply the word to your life in exactly the same way that I apply the word in mine?

What if we back up a moment and examine what Paul might have had in mind when he told the church in Corinth to be of the same mind? The first thing to note is that he addresses them as "brothers and sisters." He uses a familial reference, even when trying to correct their behavior or at least their thinking about their behavior. "Brothers and sisters," he says, we are connected, we are united, we are the family that was created not by blood, but by the life and witness and death and resurrection of Jesus the Christ. Even in a conflicted situation, there needs to be a sense of connection, a belief in community. So, might we say that being of the same mind is that we all agree that our primary effort is in building up the body – "the needs of the many, outweigh the needs of the few, or the one."

So, let's not mute this high calling "to be in agreement" by saying it is something less than what it is. This isn't a live and let live approach, or an indication that nothing really matters as long as we're nice to each other. There is more here. More gospel, more truth, more invitation than we might realize. But there is also a clear prioritizing of approach and understanding. What Paul argues is that the community needs to take a higher place than we might think. In the USA, we sometimes overvalue the individual, and some branches of the Christian faith say that it is all about me and Jesus.

Paul argues for something else. Yes, of course, the individual is important, but so is the *church*, so is the *community of faith*. We are in this together. Again and again, the gospel indicates that we are not in this alone, that we are made to work this out together; we are meant to be reconciled(reunited); we are meant to be in relationship with God and with neighbor. If one of our prime values is the building up of the body, then we approach differences and disagreements with a clear goal toward reconciliation. We want to preserve the community and not simply be right. This influences how we argue, or how we resolve differences or variations of interpretations of scripture or applications of the gospel in our lives.

And maybe he is asking us to consider how our internal squabbles look to the wider world. They don't get wrapped up in the detail of the theology behind the debate, rather they only see how we (the church) treat one another when we disagree, and that reflects badly on the larger Church. So, Paul reminds us the crux of our proclamation looks very different from the outside.

That might be a leap, I admit. But the call to watch how we live out our faith is clear. Even when we disagree, even when we have differences of interpretation, can we be on the same mind that Christ is the way of hope and of salvation? Can we come back to the principal and find common ground even as we continue to move in different directions? Can we live in grace always?

In verses 1-9; we celebrate our abundance, in the next 9 verses, we give thanks for our relationships. We can celebrate the life of the community, in fellowship, in learning together and serving together. We rejoice in our reach, which is always greater together than separately. There is an African proverb that says: *if you want to go fast go alone; but if you want to go fast, then go together.* Friends, I hope and pray that we are in this relationship for the long haul, all the way to the kin-dom of God. And along the journey, we will live by kin-dom rules, we show kin-dom values, we rejoice in kin-dom priorities, which sometimes means - *I set aside my personal preferences for the good of the whole.* And we realize more often than not, that personal (self) good is fulfilled by the good of the whole community.


So, let us sing of the church and the joy that we have in communion and fellowship. We pray for the healing of broken relationships and misunderstandings so that our witness can be stronger. We give thanks for our leaders and teachers and pillars who have sacrificed much to help us be the church we are. And we continually look out for ways to be open to invite and include those who are not yet a part of the fellowship of the church. We live hand in hand inside but with an intentional and committed outward focus and hope. We are making disciples of Jesus Christ, and there is always, always room for more.

God of unity, we come before you dismayed at our own divisions. We have struggled as your church to live in unity; but we are divided – along the fault lines of our societies. The ruptures in our families, among friends, among denominations, among nations are wide and deep. When we attempt to get on the same page, we build taller walls and dig deeper trenches. God, help us! We know that Christ is not divided. We know that it is your baptism to which we have been called. It is your service to which we are compelled. You have called us to proclaim the gospel, but we even fight about what that is. Help us, God! Help us give up our power and our privileges. Help us to yield for the sake and cause of the cross of Jesus.

Help us to want the unity you share, for you are one; in you, there is no division. Help us to embrace and to live a life emptied of power and given to service, in the likeness of our Savior, Jesus Christ. Help us to walk in salvation – in the name of the servant Christ, amen. # **Stewardship for the Whole Congregation**

People find themselves in different places financially. We have folks who are stressed out, struggling to meet their monthly bills, and wondering how they're going to get through the month. We also have others who are making it from month to month but are in unrealized danger because they're not being intentional enough with their money. And we have those who are blessed with relatively abundant resources but aren't maximizing the impact of their situation for making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world...

God calls all of us to Biblical standards of stewardship. But exactly what that looks like differs in different circumstances. Jesus told the rich young man to sell everything and give to the poor, then come and follow him; but he made no such request of Zacchaeus, who nonetheless demonstrated Biblical stewardship in his own way (compare Matthew 19:16-22 with Luke 19:1-9).

Stewardship means being faithful with God's resources in whatever situation we're in. We can be faithful stewards (or not) in the midst of debt. We can be faithful stewards (or not) in the midst of plenty. Faithfulness in stewardship is not so much about where we are financially, but more about being obedient with God's resources in that situation.
