

## DEVOTIONALS: 19 - 25 MARCH 2023

Read: Jonah 3

## The Greatest Sermon Ever Preached" Jonah 3

Jonah Chapter 3 verse one: Then the Lord spoke to Jonah a second time: "Get up and go to the great city of Nineveh, and deliver the message I have given you. This time Jonah obeyed the Lord's command and went to Nineveh."

Jonah was an Old Testament prophet, God told him to go to Nineveh and tell them to repent. He didn't want to, so he got on a

ship and headed in the other direction. God sent a storm. Jonah was swallowed by a sea monster, which gave him a change of perspective. He is vomited onto the beach and that's where we find him this week. He's going to have a second chance to do what God told him to do in the first place.

Jonah repented. What does repentance look like?

To "repent" means to "turn around." It's like when you are using a GPS and take a wrong turn. Recalculating route. For a while it usually just tells you to turn around, make a U-Turn. If you don't turn around, eventually you will get so far off track that it will take a different route altogether. I think that's kind of how it is with God, too. We start following Jesus and we're like a little kid, "Where're we going? When are we going to get there? Are we there yet?"

I always told our kids the same thing when they asked that. I said, "We'll be there soon. We'll get there when we get there." Of course, that didn't help at all. They just figured out different ways to ask the same question.

We always want God to tell us exactly what the plan is but He is stubbornly vague. I think God leads us more like a GPS than a Rand McNally folded map. He only tells us the next turn and He won't even do that unless we keep moving.

So, Jonah got his solar powered Garmin Navigation hooked up to his camel and set a course for Nineveh, 500 miles in the exact direction he did not want to go. His internal monologue was probably something like, "Oh goody! Three days in the scorching sun to preach to people who do not want to hear what I have to say". "I have to stand in the public square of my enemies' capital city and tell them all about how God is going to destroy them if they don't stop being mean to everybody".

Oh, boy that sounds exciting; I'm sure it will go really well. Scripture doesn't say Jonah whined and moaned the whole way there but there's a pretty good chance he did. It still wasn't a trip Jonah wanted to take; so, Jonah wasn't in a favorable mood.

Grumpy or not, the mission hadn't changed. Jonah still didn't want to go but he was going to surrender to what God wanted. He had been shown grace, and obedience looked different now. He was a little less selfish. Going to Nineveh wasn't on Jonah's bucket list but life isn't about a bucket list and it's not about our big self-indulgent plans.

Look at it this way, before we were following Jesus, when we were dead in our sin, selfish, wandering around wherever our hunger drove us—we thought it was all about us. Our plans, our dreams, our desires, whatever we thought we wanted, whatever we thought was good for us. The things we want are seldom good for us. The irony is that being self-focused is actually self-destructive.

In the second chapter of Ephesians it says, "But because of his great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, made us alive with Christ even when we were dead in our sin—it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this is not

from yourselves, it is the gift of God— not by our works. For we are God's handiwork (His masterpiece), created in Christ to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do."

God gives us faith, God opens our eyes, opens our ears, makes us alive, and invites us to walk with God. As we go, we find there are things God has prepared for us to do. This is where we will actually find freedom. It's when we focus on God's plans, and the work God has called us to do that we will find a purpose that will resonate with us. When we repent of our selfish ambitions and embrace God's plans, God's dreams and God's desires, surrendering whatever we thought we wanted for the much more satisfying and meaningful bucket list God has in mind for us. That's where the abundant life begins.

So, after a month in the desert, Jonah pulled into town, got off his camel and gave the most effective evangelistic message the world has ever known. At the end of his sermon somewhere around 200 thousand Ninevites repented and believed. If you look at numbers alone, it was more effective than any tent revival, more than the apostles in the Book of Acts, even more than Jesus Himself preaching the Good News.

And it worked. In spite of the most "phoned in" message the world has ever known. In spite of him not wanting it to work. In the face of every possible reason why it shouldn't have worked, "The people of Nineveh believed God's message."

They didn't impale Jonah. They didn't threaten him. They just believed him. They "turned from their evil ways and stopped all their violence." They even made their animals fast from eating and drinking and put sackcloth on them. They didn't want to take any chances; they were hoping God would show them mercy if they repented. God heard them and gave them grace, just like God gave grace to Jonah.

"Arise" – "Go immediately" – God is calling us up out of our slumber into action. Our sinful nature wants us to go down to death. But we fight it with the word of God, standing on His promises. There is joy in walking in faithfulness. And whether or not we move in the direction God calls us to go depends upon whether or not we've really gotten a sight of His grace to us.

Like the Apostle Paul who was knocked off his horse by the radiant glory of Jesus on the road to Damascus, we as a church body have walked through a near-death experience. How will you respond?

Let us begin again in light of this grace God has given us!

Next week we'll find out how Jonah feels about how effective his preaching ministry had been. Spoiler alert: He is not pleased with the results.

Questions for the Week

- Can you share a time when you saw someone right a wrong or brought justice to an unjust situation?
- Read Jonah 3:1-5. How much effort does Jonah make in bringing God's Word to those in Nineveh? Considering Jonah is a prophet in the Bible, what are the things you think he's missing from his sermon?
- Read Jonah 3:6-10. Here the king gets down from his power and throne and repents. He then leads others to repent and hope for God's mercy. Describe a time when you've seen someone repent and experience God's mercy.

Holy God, we would rather proclaim death to our enemies, than see them forgiven and redeemed. Forgive our hardness of heart, O God, and our reluctance to see your divine image in those who hate and despise us. Teach us to love our enemies, that our lives may proclaim your truth—that love is stronger than hate, and mercy is greater than vengeance. We ask this in the name of the Prince of Peace. Amen.
