"Christmas Is Not Your Birthday!"

Hi Friends!

I am filled with gratitude for the blessings in my life from Fifth Avenue United Methodist Church. This season, I have an idea that I would like to share with you - an opportunity to spread that spirit of giving even more.

"Christmas Is Not Your Birthday!" is a title of a book that I remembered for our church. After joining our church, I learned that we were supporting an Indian orphanage connected to the brother of our former pastor, Sam Royappa. I believe this ministry project is very special to our church because we are the only church connected to the orphanage. I can quote many scriptures to speak about the heart of God for the under-privileged, marginalized, and with those who have no voice at all even in their dire situation of need. I want to offer one example from the New Testament; James 1:27, "Religion that God our Father accepts as pure and faultless is this: to look after orphans and widows in their distress."

Above all else, I want to share the calling of God toward this ministry. God gave me a vision of an Indian Orphanage as I wrote in the October Newsletter. God showed me an Indian Orphan boy with beautiful eyes and a skinny small body backgrounded with the orphanage and many children. There was no word attached to this vision. But it was obvious that God wants us to support the orphanage with compassion and passion. I was sure that God wants us to be his heart, his resource, his hands and his feet.

According to Linda Smeaton's report, there is a small number of orphanage college students who also need tuition for college. The tuition is really a small amount of money such as a couple of hundred dollars for one year when it is exchanged into US currency. Just imagine the impact we can make in the lives of young children and orphanage students who are waiting for hope, love, support, and a sense of belonging.

This Christmas, let us embrace the true meaning of the season that Jesus became the love of God to save us. It is an incredible sacrifice of God. Instead of focusing solely on material gifts for family, we can direct our abundance toward making a difference in real people's lives in India. If you are living in the US, wherever your social location is, you belong to the wealthiest 1% people in the world.

I encourage you to consider donating 50% of your Christmas gift budget for orphans in India. We can also follow the example set in 2 Cor 9:7, which encourages us to give what we have decided in our heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion. If you wish to join me in this endeavor, please consider setting aside a certain percentage of your Christmas gift budget to support the orphans. No contribution is too small; together, we can bring hope, joy, and love to children who need it most.

Thank you for considering this heartfelt call to action. May this special season be filled with humility, gratitude, and compassion for the orphans who do not have mothers and fathers.







Care for Clergy in Cross-Racial and Cross-Cultural Appointments

If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it. Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. (I Cor. 12:26-27)

Dear members of the body of Christ,

Grace to you and peace in the power and love we know as Christ. I write in deep appreciation of our life together in covenant community, and to ask for your help.

As our news media and social media outlets report an increase of white Christian nationalist rhetoric and some call for mass deportations, we are seeing that inhospitality toward people who were not born in the U.S. and clergy serving in cross-racial appointments is increasing.

I write to make clear that racism is incompatible with Christian teaching. While immigration reform is an important policy conversation, we proclaim that love of God is lived as love of neighbor. The increase in race-based taunting at schools, some people telling our clergy who are here lawfully to go home, harm done to parsonage property, and the backdrop of racist rhetoric impacts all of us, particularly persons of color and especially children. Many of our cross-racially and cross-culturally appointed clergy and parsonage families are experiencing this as trauma and some are reliving previous traumatic experiences in their current context.

I write to seek the help of Staff-Parish Relations Committees and lay leadership more broadly to develop a plan for how we might support and protect our clergy and clergy families as this rhetoric increases anxiety. If mass deportation rhetoric becomes vigilante action, what plans might be in place for safety and security? Many of our clergy have experienced this trauma from previous cross-racial appointments and the current reality is bringing those experiences to the surface.

What can you do?

- Be in prayer for healing solutions to systemic societal issues.
- Have a conversation with the cross-racially appointed clergy at the Staff-Parish Relations Committee level. Bring in the administrative council chair and/or trustees chair to hear about this reality.
- Plan for how to shelter your clergy family if the need would arise.
- Ask for help from a district superintendent, elder, deacon, or local pastor to accompany a conversation or plan of action.
- Pray for a spirit of hospitality in your context through your congregational prayers.
- Show appreciation for your clergy person and clergy families of color.
- Decide not to be a silent bystander in the face of bullying.
- Be an ally for the stranger in your communities by means of your mission and ministry.
- Study the larger systemic and structural elements that maintain racism.
- Reach out and support each other.
- Are there vulnerable laity in your context who also need support?
- Clergy: create a support plan for you and your loved ones.

I believe the body of Christ is the hope of the world. With multiracial leadership, The United Methodist Church is particularly ready to lead evangelically for our time. We are blessed to be in mission with Christ for the transformation of the world in these days.

We are living in a culture where busyness is regarded as a sign of success. Being busy is seen as a status symbol in work-oriented countries like the United States. Busy people are perceived as competent, ambitious, and in high demand. For Christians, having margin for rest and removing hurry aligns with the Christian idea of love. Hurry and love cannot coexist. Rest is a powerful aspect of the Christian life. It enables us to reflect, renew in God, and gain perspective. Resting in the Lord leads to wisdom and creativity. It can make us more kind, playful, empathetic, and compassionate. Consider the following points and reset your life by eliminating hurry as much as possible. I highly recommend this book for your spiritual life.

- Hurry is a major enemy of the spiritual life of Christians today.
- In our world today, at the root of so many symptoms of toxicity are the problem of hurry.




