Harvesting Joy & Faithfulness

As autumn arrives at Fifth Avenue UMC, we will see the beautiful harvest all around us. I desire to see also a bountiful spiritual harvest in the spirits of our church family too. This season let us be reminded of the fruits of the Holy Spirit. Galatians 5:22-23 states; "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. The law is not against such things." The Greek language of fruit expresses it as one fruit, but as we read, it represents a cluster of multiple qualities or characteristics as written above. Let's think together on two qualities of the fruit, which will encourage us on our journey.

First, Joy! What a precious fruit of the Spirit! Unlike happiness, which depends on circumstances, spiritual joy is like a river that runs deeper. It's a settled assurance that God is in control, a confidence that ultimately

everything will work together for good (Romans 8:28). So, joy doesn't deny life's difficulties but transcends them. Think of Paul and Silas singing hymns in prison (Acts 16:25). This joy isn't about plastering on a smile when we're hurting, but about finding delight in God's presence even in challenging seasons. Methodist founder, John Wesley, experienced this transformative joy at Aldersgate when his heart was "strangely warmed." That joy became the energy of his ministry, sustaining him through persecution, rejection, and exhaustion.

Alongside joy, the Spirit cultivates faithfulness in us. Which is steadfast quality of remaining true to our commitments and convictions. Faithfulness means showing up day after day, whether in sunshine or storm. The Bible celebrates faithful people: Ruth refusing to abandon Naomi, Daniel continuing to pray despite the lions' den. Faithfulness isn't about perfection but more about persistence. It's about getting up when we fall, returning when we stray, and continuing to trust God's promises when evidence seems scarce.

How do we cultivate these fruits in our lives? Unlike the natural autumn harvest, spiritual fruits grow continually as we remain connected to the vine (John 15:5). To nurture joy, fill your heart with gratitude by seeing the situation and yourself through the eyes of God. Meditate on God's promises. There is no suffering without promise. I want to add one thing more. Open your eyes to the beauty of the season in a more contemplative way. Your soul will be nourished by the beauty, and you will be filled with the presence that fills our hearts with divine nourishment!

To develop faithfulness, I encourage you to think about one person who can be a friend of faith, and to be accountable to each other. You can share life regularly for prayer, love, and care for each other.



The Shoe Container is outside by the North Entrance.







In the August Newsletter, Coming Soon to a Pew, Fellowship Hall, or Feeding Site Near You!, recycling was addressed. Recycling is an important component in maintaining the beauty of this Earth.

Following that introduction, here are some guidelines about recycling which were provided by Green For Life, the waste/recycling contractor for West Bend.

Around the church building you find receptacles identified as recyclables. Remember:

- Glass: bottles and jars only (clear or colored)
- Aluminum: cans only
- Tin and steel: food cans only
- Plastics: milk, soda, juice, water bottles
- Paper and cardboard
- All items should be clean and dry.
- Used paper cups, or plates with food residue are NOT recyclable.

Detailed descriptions of these categories will follow in coming months.

- F: **Flood Damage:** The south entrance down stairs was flooded. Water also went into some Sunday School rooms and the Sunday School office. There was also a leak in the roof were it was recently patched.
- G: New Sweeps: will be installed on some doors. Brett will do this.

Technology Team: No report at this time (Reported by Kaonou).

Memorials & Missions: Thomas Thomas

There hasn't been a meeting since the August ALB gathering. Request for blankets for the homeless was approved up to \$2,000. It was noted that requests have to be made before items for a project are purchased. Thomas will meet with Tom Bast to make the yearly monetary distributions and to set the 2026 budget.

Christian Education: Kathy Schneider

- A. Fall Sunday School curriculum has been ordered.
- B. The 1st Sunday of each month will be a "Family Service" kids will stay in church.
- C. Teachers and curriculum are in place.
- D. Youth Fellowship will be the 2nd Sunday of each month, starting in October.
- E. Sunday School will start September 14th.
- F. Soles for Souls will be held September 1st—October 31st. Shoes will be shipped to those in need.
- G. There will be two families in Confirmation Class.

Staff/Parish Relations Committee (SPRC): Kaonou Latham

- A. Background checks continue to be done.
- B. Discussion of salary for staff was discussed for 2026. Discussion of Pastor's Salary was discussed after Pastor Hae-Jeong left the meeting which is the normal protocol. An increase was approved for the staff.

Pastoral Report:

- A. Carol Flanders passed away. Funeral service still pending.
- B. Nursing Home ministry continues: The Waterford on 1st Monday, Ivy Manor on 3rd Monday and the Samaritan Health Center on 4th Monday.
- C. Homeless Winter preparation in partnership with Casa Guadalupe. Our church will prepare blankets.
- D. Fifth Avenue Neighborhood Table will be held on 1st & 3rd Wednesdays. Food Served: 5:00-5:30 p.m., Evening Ends: 6:30 p.m.
- E. Fall Bible Study will start Monday, September 22nd and Wednesday, September 24th for six weeks.
- F. Audio Devotions started for 40 days about God's love.
- G. A Leadership Conference will be held in Kansas City, October 1-3. Rev. Michael Morning will preach on World Communion Sunday, October 5th.
- H. A Healing Service will be held on Thursdays, September 25th and October 23rd at 6:30 p.m.
- I. A meeting with the conference team REVIVE will be held on Tuesday, September 23rd. We will exam whether we want to work with REVIVE. Doug, Brett, Dean, Ellen and Pastor will meet. A discussion will be held regarding building usage, ministries, stewardship practices, finance, and the congregation.
- J. The Rally Day Picnic was a success. At a staff meeting, it was decided that we should have a Potluck every quarter. The next one will be December 14th.



HIGHLIGHTS OF ACCOUNTABLE LEADERSHIP BOARD MEETING September 9, 2025

Opening Prayer and Devotion: Pastor Hae-Jeong discussed Chapter 1 in the study book "Holy Currencies, 6 Blessings for Sustainable Missional Ministries" by Eric H.F. Law. She talked about how the cycle of nature and humans relate to each other. Members of ALB will take a chapter each month: Chapter 2: Brett Barnett, Chapter 3: Ellen Johnson, Chapter 4: Alana Dalton, Chapter 5: Eric Peters, Chapter 6: Doug Fitzgerald, Chapter 7: Kathy Schneider, Chapter 8: Kaonou Latham, Chapter 9: Thomas Thomas, Chapter 10: Ellen Johnson, Chapter 11: Pastor Hae-Jeong, Chapter 12: Doug Fitzgerald, Chapter 13: Eric Peters, and Chapter 14: Betty Clement. This book study will conclude in October 2026.

Finance Report: Doug Fitzgerald

Doug Fitzgerald reminded chairpersons that Budget Requests need to be turned in by October 3rd. Extra forms are available. There is a conversation between the WI Foundation and Finance Committee regarding the Betty Nelson Memorial Fund. The discussion is how to invest these funds. **Motion carried.**

Treasurer's Report: Eric Peters

Eric Peters provided financial summaries for August 2025, as well as financial statements (all on file).

Income: The YTD (2025) total income gain is \$140,747 with a budgeted amount for the entire year of \$395,825. This is 35.56% of the budgeted amount for the current year. Note: the YTD percentage will likely not reach 100% since we budget for future expenses and not income.

Expenses. Total YTD (2025) expenses are \$262,832 with a budgeted amount for the year of \$395,825. This is 66.4% of the budgeted amount for the current year.

Booked Income: The booked income YTD (2025) loss is -\$122,085.

Investment Income: YTD foundation withdrawal is \$210,424. YTD Foundation Deposits are \$0. Current checking has a balance of \$18,897 as of August 31, 2025.

Parsonage Fund: YTD Parsonage withdrawal is \$6,000. YTD parsonage total deposits \$0. We are using money to pay utilities and maintenance with this fund. Current balance in 40213 is \$3,383. August 2025 Utilities/Maintenance amount for Parsonage was \$156.

Notes from Eric:

- *Stock Market was up for August 2025.
- *Expenses were better in August 3rd out of 8 months.

Motion was made by Brett Barnett, seconded by Doug Fitzgerald, to approve the report. Motion Carried.

Trustees: Brett Barnett

- A. **Blinds and Light Fixtures:** Both are needed in the youth room upstairs off the balcony. Cost will be approximately \$800. Doug Fitzgerald and Eric Peters made a motion to take these expenses from Maintenance/Repairs (Acct #60S26). **All in favor agreed.**
- B. **Printer/Copier:** was installed in the church office today, September 9th. There will be a great savings. This company deals with non-profit organizations.
- C. **Senior Dining Rent:** Their monthly rental has increased from \$100 per month to \$500 per month. The biggest reason is because of extra trash pick-up needed each month.
- D. **Trash Removal:** Brett stated that the church will be going to Waste Management. They are currently using GFL which costs \$650/month.
- E. **Carpeting in Lounge and Sanctuary:** Still on hold. Ellen Johnson will talk to Polly Bertelsen and Sandy Blumenberg to check on status.



In this critical moment, we call on all United Methodists to join our efforts in advocating for peace. May God guide us toward a hopeful future, where nations and peoples can live in harmony and mutual respect. Together, let's join in this prayer:

God of justice and compassion, we lift our voices in prayer for peace in the Middle East, that all hearts may turn from violence to understanding and from fear to hope. Guide your leaders with wisdom and courage to pursue the path of peace, rooted in the dignity and sacred worth of every person. May our prayers rise as a witness to your hope and healing for all nations.
