Franciscan Sisters of the Sacred Heart who were her teachers in grade school. She never considered any other congregation because she knew these Sisters, and she wanted to become one of them. After joining the congregation and professing vows, Sister entered the field of education as a teacher, a teacher aide, and a tutor for more than 40 years, and she says, "I loved it!" Now at age 90, Sister is never idle. She spends time doing spiritual reading, reflecting on the scriptures, painting pictures, writing letters, and doing puzzles with the Sisters. She has gifted many with her knitting of baby sweaters and caps. Most of all, she brings the love of Jesus to everyone she meets. About finding one's purpose in life, Sister says, "Always be open to suggestions, to your wants and desires, and pray! Pray to do God's will and to accept whatever God wants you to do. This is best for humankind because we are here to help others, not ourselves, our brothers and sisters in Jesus Christ." Sister describes herself as happy, loving and curious. "I have inspired many people by my life, not on my own, but through God's grace, and I try to keep my upbeat spirit, because that's what I'm here on earth for—to help people."

Looking for a book recommendation from Sr. Marilyn? Expect the answer to be one of the 73 books of the Bible, her favorite Book! Spirituality and a life of learning have been her hallmarks. Her ministry began in education as both a teacher and principal until she was elected to our General Council. After her role as General Community Leader, she pursued Franciscan studies at

Bonaventure University, and she earned a Master's in Adult Formation to add to her Master's in Administration. She then became a Pastoral Associate during which time she began a Secular Franciscan fraternity, St. Elizabeth of Hungary, and became their Spiritual Assistant. She then received an invitation to go to Belize to establish a parish, which was going strong after four years. The Bishop then appointed a pastor, which completed Sister's work there. She returned to the motherhouse and began a weekly Scripture Reflection program and other adult formation sessions. She established two more fraternities, St. Padre Pio and St. Francis of Assisi, and is also their Spiritual Assistants. She dove more deeply into the Bible by taking a four-year program, followed by two additional classes. Asked what adjectives best describe her, Sister answered, "Dedicated, faithful and studious. That's how I've been all my life. I'm continually learning." About celebrating her Jubilee, she said, "I'm excited. I've been thinking about it, even before New Year's, because I thought on New Year's Eve, 'A minute after midnight, starts my 70th Jubilee!'"

Through both joy and sorrow, God sends people into our lives who lead us closer to God and our purpose. This certainly has been true for Sr. Josephine who is celebrating 70 years as a religious. After entering our congregation, completing her religious formation, and earning a BA degree, Sister began 24 years of teaching in various schools in Indiana, Illinois, and California. She then felt called to a new ministry and enrolled in a Pastoral Care training program after which her dream of

newness was realized. She went to St. Francis Hospital in Santa Barbara, CA, and ministered in Pastoral Care for seven-and-a-half years. Then she moved to St. Joseph Medical Center in Joliet, IL, where she has served for nearly 32 years. "I do love Pastoral Care Ministry. It opened up a whole new world to me," she said. "It's another instance where I owe great thanks to God through our community for allowing me to do this." She is also grateful for the various opportunities that helped her to gain a deeper understanding of living the Franciscan way of life. It is not surprising that Sister's favorite scripture stories are ones of healing. "Jesus had a wonderful way of treating people with respect, and he always had a loving attitude of trying to draw people to him," she said. When asked about her Jubilee, she said, "It's unbelievable. The time has gone by so fast. It's a gift from God. God has blessed me physically, spiritually, mentally, and hopefully I have returned my gratitude by service to others."

Work hard, play hard, and be open to possibilities. That's the spirit of this Jubilarian's heart, primed for joy as Sr. Mary Mark celebrates her 60th Jubilee. The possibilities were endless as to what she would be when she grew up. "When I was in grade school, I had so much fun talking with the Sisters and helping to clean their classrooms after school. The

Sisters were so joyful. Little did I know then that joy was part of a Franciscan's DNA." And that was what she wanted. After entering our congregation, she found that a big part of Franciscan joy is ministry where many possibilities were open to her. Sister has served as a teacher, principal, congregation Vicareess, Garage Sale Chair, Motherhouse Activity Director, and Health Care Liaison. She enjoyed doing all these ministries saying, "I feel I gave my all to each one. For me variety is the spice of life." About the changes in religious life, Sister said, "I believe our renewal of welcoming the laity into our homes today has brought many blessings to us, the laity, and the church." That walk with the laity has been one way Sister lives out our charism. Her favorite scriptural quote is, "To act justly, to love tenderly, and to walk humbly with your God (Micah 6:8)." For her, these words reflect the Corporal Works of Mercy. "Going over them frequently is a great examination of conscience," she said. She then goes with arms open to the possibilities each day brings, ready with a listening ear when anyone knocks at her door. Regarding Jubilee she said, "Jubilee is a time to recall memories and make new memories, a time to count my blessings."

The freedom to dream—and the freedom to pursue those dreams—are precious gifts. Sr. Joanne is especially thankful for these gifts as she celebrates her 60th Jubilee. Who could imagine all that her life would become when she was born. "I started to think about life, and I sort of felt the Lord tugging at my heart," she said. "So, starting in sixth grade, I was really thinking about being a sister. At age 14, she witnessed a Perpetual Vow ceremony of one of our Sisters, and she said to herself, "Now I know this is for me." Because of resistance from her parents, she

didn't have the freedom to enter our congregation until age 18. She said she never considered another congregation. "Our Sisters were friendly. They were simple—which I recognized later as the Franciscan way—and I just accepted them, just like they accepted me." Although not part of her dream, Sister taught for 19 years in grade schools in Indiana and Illinois. Yet in her heart was another dream, being a hospital Pastoral Care minister. In time, this dream was realized, and she worked four-and-a-half years in the chaplaincy at Saint Joseph Medical Center, Joliet, IL, and 22 years at what was then Presence United Samaritan Medical Center, Danville, IL. Now in retirement, Sister writes to three prisoners and companions two women. She draws inspiration from a poem, "The Dash"—the years between birth and death. "It's at that dash time that we have to do good," she said. Regarding Jubilee Sister said, "I'm very grateful that God put up with me for 60 years!"

Human connection is a lifeline, whether that connection is in-person or on-line. As Sr. Sandra celebrates her 60th Jubilee, she knows gratitude for both. After her novitiate formation, Sister spent 15 years as a teacher, mostly of junior high science, after which students would come back to tell her how she inspired them to go into various medical professions. She certainly passed on her love of learning and science, as well as the peaceful way of a Franciscan. Following that, her skills

were needed as Secretary General for the congregation and then in Santa Barbara, CA, where she was secretary to the Medical Staff and later their Parish Nursing Program. "Some of my happiest memories are being missioned to California and experiencing all that California has to offer," she said. Sister then needed to return to the Motherhouse because of the beginning of ME/CFS. This articulate, bright scientific mind found herself pulled into a new, uncharted, and unofficial ministry of care and advocacy for the sick as her own illness progressed. She began to rely more and more on the internet as her way of interacting with others. "In my limited capacity due to a disabling illness," she said, "it serves as a lifeline, keeping me connected to the greater world. I would otherwise be very isolated." She believes that redemptive suffering is the only thing that gives suffering value and makes it tolerable. Reflecting on her Jubilee, she added, "I am grateful for the peace and joy that come from seeking God's will and putting myself into God's loving care."

In Memoriam

Sister Patricia Dailey, 1945-2022



Sr. Patricia Dailey entered the congregation in 1963 and professed Perpetual Vows in 1971. Prior to entering, Sister attended a two-week "Come and See" experience. She would often smile saying, "I came, I saw, I stayed," and that she did for almost 60 years. She entered the L.P.N. Nursing Program at St. Mary Hospital in LaSalle, IL, and earned an L.P.N. Certificate, fulfilling a lifelong dream. She went on to minister in several of our institutions and extended compassionate care to many who were sick. On her 40th Jubilee, Sister Patricia expressed gratitude for her vocation which enabled her to grow in prayer because of the wonderful example of so many of our Sisters. She appreciated her various ministries where she had been blessed to work with really great people who had a true concern for the people they served in healthcare. She was also grateful to the congregation for allowing her to visit the homeland of her ancestors in Ireland and to walk in their footprints. When celebrating her 50th Jubilee in 2013, she said that the advice she would give to others is, "Always keep your eyes on Jesus and never give up." Sister Patricia also knew in her heart that God was taking care of her.

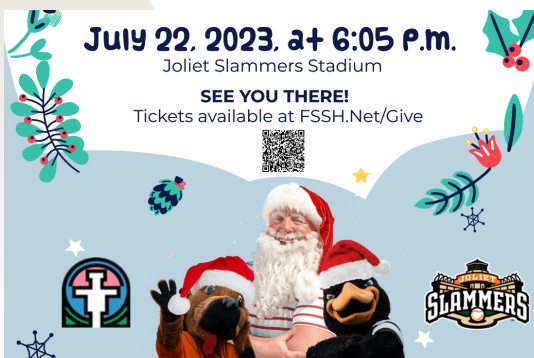

California Associates Help with Charity and Advocacy on Skid Row



Our California Associates are helping our unhoused brothers and sisters through clothing and food distribution. Each month, we provide Skid Row with water, chips, and much more. In addition, I also advocate for people to receive more access to care in behavioral health and drug addiction, especially in the areas of prevention and intervention. I am volunteering to help make sure the MHSA (Mental Health Services Act) is followed as required by law. It is known as the “millionaire tax” and is currently being used to fund a court system instead of providing services and programs for people with mental health conditions (which is what the money was meant for). Many on Skid Row have said that

they feel stigmatized and face many barriers when trying to access services. As St. Francis did, we do our best to do works of neighborly love and look out for each other because we are all in this together.

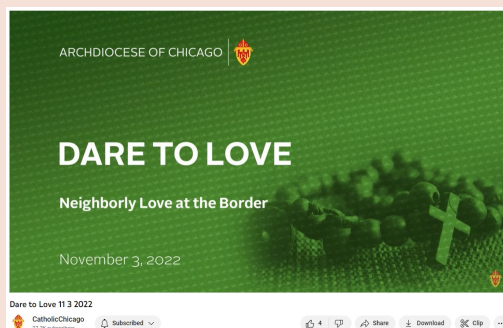
NRVC Convocation Offers Hope for the Future of Religious Life

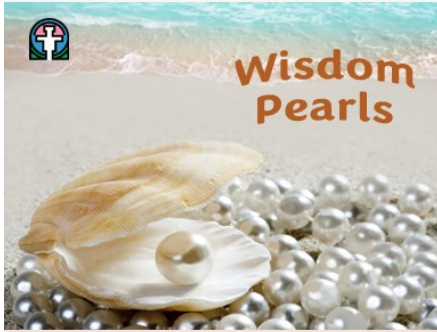


New Addition to St. Francis Woods Family

What can we learn from Herod's decisions? I am sure Herod lamented putting John the Baptist to death, and he regretted making

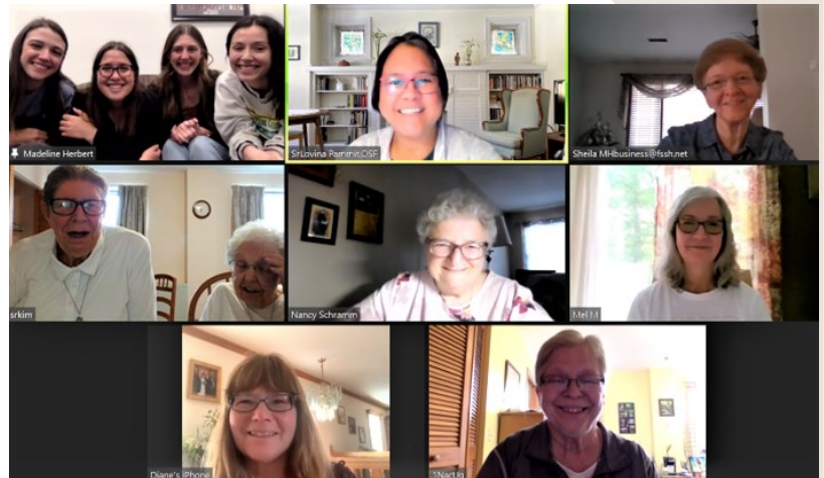

Franciscan Spirituality Program at St. Francis Woods Starts Sept. 13

A Franciscan Spirituality Program will be offered September 2023 to May 2024. It will be held in the Assisi Center on the **second Wednesday of every month, 10:30 a.m.-12:00 p.m.** The first session will be on Wednesday, **September 13.**

The text we will use is *In the Footsteps of Francis and Clare* by Roch Niemier, OFM. Participants are asked to purchase this book and bring it to the first session.
