

A is for Advent. Advent means, "arrival" or "coming." During Advent, we remember that God comes into the world every day, in ways that often surprise us.

B is for Baby. Everyone was expecting God to come into the world with might and power. Instead, the angel Gabriel told Mary to expect something quite different, telling her:

"The Lord has blessed you in a special way. God is with you! You have nothing to fear. God has a surprise for you: You will become pregnant and give birth to a baby and call his name Jesus." (Luke 1:28-33)

C is for Confidence. Even though she was surprised, even though she was a little scared, Mary was confident - she had faith. She knew God would be with her.

"I serve the Lord," she said to Gabriel. "Let it happen just as you say." (Luke 1:38)

D is for Donkey. A donkey carried the family on their long journey to Bethlehem. Mary and Joseph had to travel 107 miles along the Jordan River to get from Nazareth to Bethlehem - that's the same distance between Richmond, where we live, and Washington, D.C.!

E is for Exhausted. That's how everyone must have felt when they arrived, after three days of nonstop walking! That might be how we felt when we arrived in worship today - with all the cares and worries we carry, with all the ways we have fallen short of what God wants for us - and for the world. Through our prayers, we recognize two things: that God loves us even when we make mistakes, and that God helps us to grow and learn from our mistakes. Let's pray together.

Prayer of Thanksgiving and of the People


