Do What's Right (Part 2) – 2 Kings 18:9-12

2 Kings 18; But before we get there, I want to share some more **Cause For Delight** like I did last week; Especially w/ our ministry year theme of Delight Yourself In The Lord And this weekend, it's notes from SP's in our Fellowship

I'm so thankful for Doug Rowland, our Pastor of Outreach Ministries, and his leadership in this; And I'm so thankful for you, and your desire and diligence to do it What a blessing; And what a cause for great delight (**Summary**)

And one that's obviously resulted in *many thanksgivings to God* as Paul says (2 Cor 9) And I'd like to do the same, and pray for them

<u>Pray</u> – God, would you remind each of these pastors and their wives of your goodness and greatness? (**Title Slide**) Would you bless them for their perseverance? Would you keep them from the evil one, and protect them from difficulty? And would you encourage them with the fruit of changed lives? Bless them and keep them, I pray

➤ That brings us to our study of Isaiah, and part 2 of the account of Hezekiah in chapters 36-37, that we began to unpack last *weekend*

And found that it's one of the significant dates and *events* in the history of God's people – the 701BC failed attack by Assyria

Significant not only b/c of what happened, but b/c it's recorded in 3 places – Is 36, 2 Chron 32, and right here in 2 Kings 18

We also saw that it took place in <u>Judah</u> (**Map – ESV Study p.676**) – the southern part of what used to be a united Israel

And the king or leader during this time, was Hezekiah – a man who did what was right, and was blessed by God for it

The very thing we should do, b/c it was written for our example

IOW do what's right . . .

Because obedience brings blessing (2 Kings 18:1-8)

That was last week; Where we found, based on Hezekiah's experience in the years leading *up* to the attack . . .

That obedience brings the blessings of God's help, success, strength, and victory Not that you'll always *know* that God's blessing you; And not that you'll win a popularity contest for doing what's right; But blessing nonetheless In God's way, and God's time

The key to it all, being v3 – *He did what was right in the eyes of the LORD* (**Summary**) That was last week, from v1-8

This week, it's v9-12; Still talking about the time leading up to the attack on Jerusalem In the fourth year of King Hezekiah [right around 710BC], which was the seventh year of Hoshea son of Elah, king of Israel [the northern tribes], Shalmaneser king of Assyria [he's the predecessor of Sennacherib, the Assyrian king who a few years later attacks Jerusalem] came up against Samaria and besieged it, [10] and at the end of three years he took it.

Now, <u>Samaria</u> was a city at that time, in northern Israel (**Map – ESV Study p.676**)

And though the area in general was attacked and conquered back in 722BC, there seems to have been pockets of resistance that remained, or flared up

In which case, Shalmaneser felt it necessary to attack; And did; Besieging it for 3 years, until he brought it too, under Assyrian rule; Which v10 reiterates

In the sixth year of Hezekiah, which was the ninth year of Hoshea king of Israel, Samaria was taken. [And look at what he did] [11] The king of Assyria carried the Israelites away to Assyria and put them in Halah, and on the Habor, the river of Gozan, and in the cities of the Medes [the Persians; all to the Northeast of Palestine], [12] because they did not obey the voice of the LORD their God but transgressed his covenant, even all that Moses the servant of the LORD commanded [referring to the Law]. They neither listened nor obeyed.

Here's the point – Always do what's right . . .

Because disobedience brings discipline (2 Kings 18:9-12)

Obedience brings blessing, and disobedience brings discipline

In their case, it was being physically carried off to another land, and giving up their homes and property to people who were transplanted in

Not good; And not pleasant; Can you imagine giving up *your* home to complete strangers; Never to return? Pretty harsh

But it gives us insight into the heart of God and the lengths to which he will go to carry out justice; To change our hearts; To discipline his people

All b/c: (A) They did not obey the voice of the Lord their God – v12; (B) They transgressed his covenant; and (C) They didn't listen to God

I'd say that pretty much covers it all in terms of disobedience

- ➤ They didn't do what God *told* them to like worshipping his way and living his way
- (B) They often did what he *didn't* want them to like transgressing his covenant, his promise to be their God in return for their obedience and allegiance . . .
- They often ignored that covenant by adopting the pagan ways of surrounding nations, and failing to set themselves apart as a people for his own possession . . .
- (C) They didn't *listen* to God when he spoke to them; Like through his prophets, and priests, and teachers; People who *applied* the Law to their lives

Or led them in the way of righteousness; Or warned them about their sin

They didn't listen, they didn't obey, and they didn't remain true – true to God and the covenant he made with them

So God brought discipline

And here's the thing – he'll do the same with us if we disobey; You can . . .

• Expect it

You can expect that disobedience will result in discipline; Not only b/c of the example of *Israel* here in 2 Kings, but b/c of what it says explicitly in **Heb 12:6**

The Lord disciplines the one he loves, and chastises every son whom he receives. Disciplines, as in brings about instructive punishment (Greek "paideuo")

And *chastises*, as in *corrective* punishment; Literally scourge – severely whip Not that chastise here means we will be scourged, but that our discipline may be physical, and may be significant; Just like it was for the Israelites

If you're a follower of Jesus Christ, if you're one of God's children through faith and repentance, faith in who Jesus is and what he's done on your behalf...

And repentance of your sins and sinfulness – you can expect discipline if you disobey You can expect chastisement in whatever form, if you do something you shouldn't, or *don't* do something you should*****

You can expect it, b/c he *loves* you; Just like a good parent loves their kids; And disciplines *them*; And chastises *them*

In fact, **v8** says – *If you are left without discipline, in which <u>all</u> have participated* [all true sons], then you are <u>illegitimate</u> children and <u>not</u> sons. <u>Heb 12:8</u>

God's discipline is a part of being one of his children

• No discipline, no salvation

If there's no discipline in your life, you're not a child of God; You're not a son or daughter of the king; Which is yet another assurance of our salvation . . . And one more reason to thank him for all things, in all circumstances

Does that mean he's up there just waiting to crack the whip? Or that he gives you every punishment you deserve? No

He's also merciful and often *withholds* punishment But not all the time; Sometimes God disciplines us

And when he does . . .

• It's for your own good

That's the next part of this; Discipline for disobedience is for your own good That's v10 – God disciplines us for our good

Which sounds a lot like my mom when I was growing up, just before the Hot Wheel track was about to land on my backside

"I'm doing this for your own good" she would say; "And you're going to thank me for it someday"; Whack!

Great, Mom; I guess I'll have to take your word for it; Not

But I'm thankful now; B/c she and Dad were instruments of God's discipline in my life when I was disobedient; And it really was for my own good . . .

B/c it enabled me to share in God's holiness – to live like him

The very thing that v10 goes on to say – God disciplines us for our good, that we may share his holiness

That our thoughts, attitudes, and actions would conform more and more to his

➤ Unfortunately, it's not very pleasant, is it? That's v11

For the moment all discipline seems painful rather than pleasant, but later it yields the peaceful fruit of righteousness to those who have been trained by it.

Notice how this ties peace in with discipline and training; It's so simple and so profound, and yet so lost on us

So many people want peace in their life, but fail to get it b/c they fail to accept and respond to the training of God's discipline

Discipline *yields the peaceful fruit of righteousness to those who have been <u>trained</u> by it Those who embrace it; Those who endure it; Those who accept it*

And therein lies the key

• You have to accept it

You have to yield yourself to the training of discipline, otherwise its intended effect will be lost on you

The epitome of which would the high recidivism rate among those who get out of prison, only to return within 3 years

Why do they do that? B/c they didn't yield themselves to the training of discipline

Just like we don't; Like when someone addresses an issue they perceive in us, and we refuse to listen; We refuse to accept it

We refuse to consider it; Instead, going to great lengths to justify ourselves

The essence of Heb 12:11 is that discipline yields righteousness, and righteousness yields peace -if, you submit to the *training*

If, you yield to God's correction; If, you listen to his instruction – the application of which often comes from those around you; Just like it came from my parents

➤ That said, it's also important to understand, that just b/c you're going through hardship, doesn't mean you're being disciplined

Expect and accept discipline, yes . . .

• But not all hardship is discipline

It's not; It *could* be that you're simply having to deal with one of the many ill-effects of living in a fallen world

Or that God is testing your *faith*, strengthening it – like clay is strengthened by heat . . . In order to produce steadfastness and maturity (James 1:3-4)

Just b/c you're going through a hard time, doesn't mean you have some huge lesson to learn; I think we agonize and beat ourselves up far too much in that respect Just b/c you're experiencing hardship in your life, doesn't mean God is trying to teach you something

➤ But coming full circle, it could (**Summary**)

If you're going through a difficult time, if people are saying hard things to you, if you're experiencing ill-health, or loss of favor...

It *could* be that he's disciplining you for disobedience

And if he is, accept it – for your good and his glory

Accept it, from your heavenly Father who loves you immensely

Accept it, so that you'll do what's right, and enjoy his blessing

<u>Prayer</u> – Lord, you well know that this is hard; It's hard to endure discipline, and learn from it; But we're thankful you don't leave us to our own devices; We're thankful that you love us so much you want us to be like Jesus; So help us I pray; I know you do And receive our *tithes and offerings* as an expression of our delight – our delight in you
